VERMILLION — University of South Dakota junior goalkeeper Mackenzie Viktor has been voted to the Capital One Academic All-District 6 women's soccer team as selected by College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). As a first-team selection, Viktor advances to the national ballot as one of eight NCAA Division I players to be considered for Academic All-America honors.

Viktor is one of six Summit League players named to one of eight All-District teams. Four from the League were first-team picks. Viktor is the only goalkeeper on the District 6

team. Viktor, who hails from Fort Collins, Colo., maintains a 3.95 grade point average while working towards a degree in political science. On the pitch she has recorded three shutouts and has a 1.52 goals against average. Her 78 saves are the third-highest tally in the Summit League.

and do our jobs."

Junior fullback Jordan Lightner did his job by scoring two touchdowns and was the Bucks' best inside, power runner. Senior wide receiver JJ Hejna paced Yankton's receivers by hauling in six passes for 86 and a touchdown while sophomore Reid Sawatzke also had a touchdown grab.

McKee recorded two of the Bucks' three sacks and played a large role in making sure Mitchell quarterback Kanin Nelson never got comfortable dropping back to pass. Lee Rose intercepted Nelson and returned the ball 45 yards for a fourth-quarter touchdown.

"We really wanted to put pressure on the quarterback," McKee said. "They tried to assert their running game, but we shut it down. Then they really tried to hit that passing game but we wanted to close down on the quarterback and give our backers and defensive backs a chance to make plays."

Yankton made a play early, blocking and recovering Nathan Wahlen's punt at the

Mitchell 8 yard line.

Two plays later, Lightner scored from 4 yards to put the Bucks up 7-0 with 9:01 left in the first.

On Yankton's second possession, the third time was the charm. After the Bucks' first two trips into the end zone on the drive were negated due to penalties, Yankton got a flag-free Reid Sawatzke 13-yard catch-and-run touchdown pass from Strahl to push the lead to 14-0 with 5:51 remaining in the opening quarter.

Mitchell got its initial score on its third possession. Senior kicker Hakon Gustafson Gimmer booted a 27-yard field goal to get the kernels, who got their first positive gain on their ninth snap of the game, within 14-3 with 1:56 left in the first quarter.

The Bucks took advantage of the kernels' second special teams miscue. Matt Larson muffed Brady Hale's high, hanging punt at the Mitchell 7 yard line. Brady Hale snagged a 9-yard touchdown pass from Strahl to push Yankton's advantage to 21-3 with 11:15 to play in the first half.

"The short field, you can't ask for anything more," Arlin Likness said. "It was kind of the opposite of the first time we played them. They ended up with the great field position the first time and we kept

shooting ourselves in the foot. Tonight, it was the reversal."

After Yankton's next possession ended with a wide-left 43-yard field goal by Lane Sawatzke, the Bucks marched 80 yards on their next drive. Lightner capped off the 12-play possession with a tough 9-yard run to make it 28-3 with a minute left in the half.

"We struggled with putting a drive together two weeks ago against Harrisburg," Strahl said, "but anytime you can put together an 80-yard drive like that, give your defense a break, it's huge."

Mitchell ended the half with a 20-yard Gustafson Gimmer field goal after the kernels burnt the Bucks with a 37-yard completion from Nelson to Landon Heugebauer.

Yankton opened the scoring in the second half, as Strahl plunged in from 3 yards out to make it 35-6 with 8:19 left in the third.

Mitchell got its first touchdown of the game with 6:26 left in the game when Nelson found Ethan Jones for an 18-yard touchdown. Yankton answered that score with sophomore Tanner Frick's 10-yard touchdown run with 5:02 remaining. The Bucks got a defensive touchdown as Rose's pick six padded the lead to 48-6 with 4:08 to play.
