Garden Produces More Than 21 Tons Of Food

Community organizations in southeastern South Dakota received more than 21 tons of fresh produce this vear. courtesv of state prison inmates at the Yankton Minimum Unit and the Mike Durfee State Prison in Springfield.

Inmates harvested a total of 43,081 pounds of beets, carrots, cucumbers, kohlrabi, okra, peppers, potatoes, pumpkins, rutabagas, squash, tomatoes, watermelons and zucchini this year. Inmates in the horticul-

ture program at Mike Durfee State Prison start growing the tomatoes and peppers before the plants are transferred to a two acre garden at the Yankton Minimum Unit on the grounds of the Human Services Center. The other vegetables are grown from seed at the Yankton facility. In addition to providing

fresh produce for the in-mates at the two DOC facilities, the produce is also donated to the Yankton Senior Citizens Center; Yankton Banquet; Yankton Área Adjustment Training Center; Human Services Center Dietary; Yankton Monastery; Yankton, Bon Homme County, Scotland and Gayville-Volin schools; Yankton County Jail; Springfield Senior Citizens Center; Scotland Good Samaritan Center; Cedar Village Assisted Living and the Freeman Bethany Food Pantry.

Total produced, in pounds: Beets, 845; Carrots, 168; Cucumbers, 1,665; Kohlrabi, 70; Okra, 570, Pep-pers, 230; Potatoes, 2,440; Pumpkins, 21,015; Rutabagas, 256; Squash, 3,173; Tomatoes, 1,078; Watermelon, 10,113; and Zucchini, 1,458.
