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Crofton Volleyball Team Looks To Add To Warrior Tradition Nebraska State Tourney: CHS Faces Palmyra Today At 11 a.m.

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CROFTON, Neb. - Crofton High School has a rich tradition of girls' athletics, with state championships in cross country and girls' basketball in 2013, as well as success in track and field.

This fall, CHS aims to add volleyball to that list of banners in the CHS gym.

The Warriors take a 23-4 record into the Nebraska State Volleyball Tournament, which begins today (Thursday) in Grand Island.

Crofton entered this school year with a run of back-to-back state basketball titles and eight state tournament appearances in nine years, but CHS had not been to the state volleyball tournament since 1993. Still, the young Warriors put as much effort in on the volleyball

court as on the basketball court. "Every morning (this summer)

we were lifting. Most years, there is a lot of basketball after that," said Crofton senior setter Makenzie Johnson. "We had the volleyball net up a lot this summer."

Add in that Johnson (347 assists, 23 ace serves), the lone senior in the rotation, and junior hitters Maria Wortmann (317 kills, 333 digs, 46 ace serves, 131 blocks) and Allison Arens (190 kills, 368 digs, 51 ace serves, 35 blocks) have been together for three seasons, and you've got a good start to team chemistry.

They are really good at working together," said Crofton head coach Susan Johnson. "They all enjoy the game. They all have the same goal." After those three, the Warriors

are young. Sophomores Allison Tramp (29 blocks, 43 kills), Brittany Guenther (286 assists, 114 digs, 31

ace serves), Breanna Allen (233 digs, 23 ace serves) and Katie Petersen (55 kills, 28 blocks), and freshmen Kelsey Sanger (138 kills, 375 digs, 49 ace serves, 39 blocks) and Monica Arens (97 kills, 53 ace blocks) round out the rotation.

But the Warriors are experienced at playing on the state's biggest stage. Five of Crofton's nine regulars and two other players on the volleyball roster saw time in the Warriors' state basketball championship game win.

"I definitely think it's going to help," said Wortmann. "At a minimum we're going to know what to expect."

Coach Johnson noted that even some of the players who didn't see the floor during basketball last season got to feel what a state tournament was like.

"Even some of (this year's) fresh-

men went to state as managers last year," she noted.

Crofton faces Palmyra (25-5), a team led by junior Klaire Phillips (348 kills, 298 digs) and senior Paige Huxoll (265 kills). Senior Kourtney Kempkes (184 kills), sophomore Moriah Calfee (161 kills) and senior setter Shelby Bruss (909 assists) have also provided offensive weaponry for the Panthers.

But the Warriors aren't as concerned about the firepower on the other side of the net as they are keeping their side under control.

We need to stay focused and play our side of the net," Wortmann said. "We have to talk a lot, and have fun with it."

Coach Johnson is hoping to see the traits that sent the Warriors to Grand Island in the first place.

"I'm hoping to see confidence and mental toughness," she said. "I hope they have the confidence to go all the way, because I really think that they could."

Crofton and Palmyra face off at 11 a.m. at Grand Island Northwest. The winner of that match will face the winner of the 9 a.m. match between Hastings St. Cecilia (25-8) and Lutheran High Northeast (23-9) on Friday at 9 a.m. at Grand Island Senior High.

On the other side of the bracket, top-seeded Freeman (25-5) faces Ord (20-11) at 2 p.m., and Humphrey-Lindsey Holy Family (30-2) faces Guardian Angels Central Catholic (29-4) at 4 p.m.

The championship is set for Saturday at 9 a.m. at the Heartland Event Center in Grand Island, with the third place match at noon on Saturday at Grand Island Northwest.

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By signing her name on the proverbial dotted line Wednesday night, Cedar Bar-tos proved that the sport of archery is developing — and quickly — in Yankton. The 17-year-old home-

Wynot's Schulte Headed To Wayne State

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WYNOT, Neb. — Next year at this time, Maggie Schulte will take her small-town, small-school success to the top ranks of the NCAA Division II level.

And that's just the way the 6-foot senior standout at Wynot High School wanted it.

Schulte was one of five players to sign Wednesday to play basketball at Wayne State College, a program that has qualified for six consecutive D-II national tournaments.

"It's more fun when you win," Schulte joked Wednesday.

A key cog in Wynot's three consecutive Nebraska Class D2 state girls' basketball titles, Schulte has guided the Lady Blue Devils to a 76-9 record in her career.

She averagede 13.5 points, 7.8 rebounds and 2.5 assists per game last season as a junior, helping lead Wynot to a 25-4 record and another championship.

Having received interest from a number of regional NCAA and NAIA schools, Schulte said that yes, it was a relief to have her college decision out of the way. "Definitely nice, especially with the start of the season coming up," she said. "I just somehow always knew I wanted to go there." Schulte said she verbally committed over the summer following another stint with the North East Nebraska Extreme in the AAU circuit. Though she has one season of high school basketball left, Schulte said it's not hard to start thinking how she could fit in at the D-II level where the Wildcats won 17 games last season. "I think I'll fit in well; hope I will," she said. "They play just about the same style I like, where you can push the ball and pressure people." Her future coach said as much, that Schulte - who figures to play at the three, but move around — fits Wayne State's style. "Maggie ... will do whatever is needed for her team to win," WSC coach Chris Kielsmeier said in a release. "She is a very smart player that really understands the game.' Not only that, she remains humble, according to Wynot head coach Steve Wieseler. "She's got so much natural ability, but she's so low key about it," Wieseler said Wednesday.
