# **Kershaw, Scherzer Easily Win Cy Young Awards**

NEW YORK (AP) — Clayton Kershaw of the Los Angeles Dodgers and Max Scherzer of the Detroit Tigers breezed Wednesday to baseball's Cy Young Awards.

Kershaw won the prize as the National League's best pitcher for the second time in three seasons after posting a 1.83 ERA — lowest in the majors in 13 years. "This is such a cool thing. I

can't even explain what it means to me," Kershaw said in an interview on MLB Network. "It really is a huge honor." The 25-year-old lefty with a

big-breaking curve drew 29 of 30 first-place votes from members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Adam

Wainwright of the St. Louis Cardinals was picked first on one ballot.

Kershaw went 16-9 and topped the NL with 232 strikeouts. He also won the Cy Young Award in 2011 and finished second last year to knuckleballer R.A. Dickey.

Scherzer took the AL honor after leading the majors with 21 wins. He received 28 of 30 firstplace votes. The right-hander lost only

three times and was the lone 20-game winner in baseball. He ranked second in the majors with 240 strikeouts and was fifth in the AL with a 2.90 ERA.

Scherzer smiled and raised both arms when the results were announced.

"It's unbelievable. It just vindicates everything I've done," he said, acknowledging all the run support he received from Detroit's powerful lineup probably helped his candidacy.

"I've been working so hard all these years to get better and better," he added. "I think I took a big step forward in 2013. Yu Darvish of the Texas

Rangers was second, marking the highest finish by a Japanese-born pitcher in Cy Young voting. Hisashi Iwakuma of the Seattle Mariners came in third.

Wainwright went 19-9 for St. Louis and finished behind Kershaw. Miami right-hander Jose Fernandez, picked earlier this week as the NL Rookie of the Year, was third.
