Action No. 2014-155

Member Pietz introduced a resolution authorizing the business manager to enter into a design-build contract with Johnson Controls.

On this 12th day of November, 2013, the School Board of the Yankton School District 63-3 of Yankton, South Dakota (hereinafter referred to as "the District"), during its regular scheduled meeting, issued the following resolution:

WHEREAS the District has utilized the design-build procedures to solicit proposals to provide comprehensive design-build service for the removal of asbestos and construction of the following energy improvements: (1) Lighting and electrical systems upgrades at all locations; (2) Gym air handling equipment upgrades at the four elementary buildings and Middle School; (3) HVAC upgrades in the south wing, computer labs, guidance office suite, breezeway, and split system units at Middle School; (4) Improvements to the domestic hot water system for YHS/SAC; (5) increased capacities for the cooling tower heat exchanger at YHS/SAC; and (6) system wide energy conservation measures; and

WHEREAS the Board finds that it is in the best interest of the public to enter into a design-build contract for the above improvements because the complexity of the project requires close coordination of design and construction expertise and an extreme amount of coordination; and

WHEREAS pursuant to the design-build procedures Johnson Controls, Inc. was the only firm prequalified to submit a design-build proposal and did in fact submit a design-build proposal; and

WHEREAS Chuck Turner, the Performance Criteria Developer for the project has reviewed the proposal submitted by Johnson Controls, Inc. and has issued a written opinion in accordance with SDCL 5-18-B-35 that the proposal is consistent with the performance criteria; and

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WHEREAS the Board has determined that there was adequate competition for the design build project given that: (1) the RFP was published on January 18, 2013 and January 25, 2013 in the Yankton Press and Dakotan Newspaper in accordance with SDCL 5-18A-4 and was also available on the District website during that time; (2) the RFQ was sent directly to two firms that requested the materials; (3) District staff fielded at least one additional telephone call requesting information; and (4) the District was not required to prequalify three design-builders because the project is complex in nature, requires close coordination of design and construction expertise, and does not require significant structural changes, additions, reconstruction, or new construction;

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED

that the business manager shall be authorized to finalize and execute a contract for design/build services with Johnson Controls, Inc. for improvements and a contract price not to exceed \$2,872,667 which includes: FIM MS-6A (2nd floor asbestos) in the amount of \$137,451; FIM BE-5 (meal prep vent.) in the amount of \$16,643; FIM LE-4 (meal prep vent.) in the amount of \$17,522; FIM SE-4 (meal prep vent.) in the amount of \$15,953; FIM WE-5 (meal prep vent.) in the amount of \$17,514; FIM HS-6 (A/C Auxiliary Gym) in the amount of \$155,858; FIM HS-7 (A/C Gymnastics) in the amount of \$65,763; and FIM MS-9 (A/C North Gym) in the amount of \$140,193.

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whatever their end goal is. If they want to be a teacher, we help them get to that stage and help them with placement."

The NICC currently offers two-year programs leading to associate degrees, Oltrogge said. However, most of the students continue their coursework after graduation, he said.

"About 80 percent of our students transfer into a four-year program, so we have an outstanding success rate. I know it worked for me rather well," he said, referring to his NICC associate degree leading to bachelor's and master's degrees.

OFFERING OPPORTUNITIES

The additional space provided by the new Santee campus may lead to more programs and even bachelor's degrees, Oltrogge said.

"In house, we are currently formulating plans and gathering data to create three four-year degree programs," he said. "The basic areas that we are examining are business, human services counseling and teacher education."

In addition, NICC has applied for funding from various sources for programs such as entrepreneurship, construction trades, mass communications and nursing.

The expanded Santee campus and its improved science labs allow NICC to partner with South Dakota State University and the University of Nebraska for chemistry programs, Oltrogge said. The college has also continued successful extension-oriented activities, he said.

In addition, the Santee campus has received a federal grant for constructing a storage and classroom facility. The three-bay garage will store college equipment and be used as lab areas for automotive and construction coursework.

One of the college's most recognizable outreach efforts isn't seen but is heard by area residents. The new campus houses radio station KZYK (88.9 FM), which moved out of its temporary trailer and into its new studio within the college building, Oltrogge said.

"It's a small bandwidth radio station for the reservation that is also hooked up with the Internet," he said. "It's nice having some outreach to the reservation community. It lets some reservation stories be told as well as offer education-oriented programming. We offer the program 'Dakota Hour,' which features (American Indian) traditions."

The station usually runs from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and relies on its executive director, part-time staff and volunteers, the college president said.

"We have eclectic programming because of the DJs out there. We also have a lot of public education announcements," he said. "In the future, our hope is to split (the air shifts) between some of our (NICC) students and local high school students."

As another outreach service, the new campus has hosted community activities, Oltrogge said. He pointed to

this Friday's tribal mental health clinic.

BUILDING THE ECONOMY

The NICC has also started an entrepreneurship program on the Santee campus, according to instructor Garan Coons.

"We started the entrepreneurship program in the summer months with 40 scholarships available. We are currently in our second track which runs concurrent with the fall schedule, also with 40 scholarships available," he said.

"We named the entrepreneurship program OSTEP, which stands for Omaha Santee Tribal Entrepreneurship Program. We teach our classes over NICC's (video teleconferencing) system, which allows us to reach both the Santee and Omaha reservations."

The program uses a text called "Indianpreneurship," created and published by ON-ABEN (Our Native American Business Network), Coons said.

The program seeks to diversify the tribal economy and workforce, Coons said.

"Entrepreneurship is a new concept in our generation. Many people think that we have to be dependent on tribal programs for jobs," he said.

"We have a great deal of ideas, talent and motivation on the reservations. However, it's hard to find resources to fund their ideas as well as give them the knowledge so that they are successful in starting a business."

The participants in the entrepreneurship program have proposed everything from micro-enterprises, such as selling lunches, to very formalized business such as insurance, Oltrogge said. The NICC can help with setting up a website to market these goods and services, he added.

The challenge lies in keeping the entrepreneurship program going after the grant ends, he said. "Based on how many are interested from the community, we haven't had a problem with getting student enrollment (for the course)," he said.

Both the Santee Sioux and Omaha tribes believe in the importance of creating an economic infrastructure, Oltrogge said. "Right now, the vast majority of the money within each reservation comes from the tribes themselves," he said.

Coons believes the OSTEP program can achieve its goal of launching at least five start-up businesses within the next five years.

"In teaching the class, the participants have the desire and motivation to start their own business," he said. "We just want them to have the right tools to be successful."

With a year under its belt at its new campus, the NICC site in Santee is gearing up for the spring semester with registration starting next week, Oltrogge said.

"I think things are moving forward," he said. "I'm just very happy and pleased, and hopefully we can keep growing at all of our locations."
