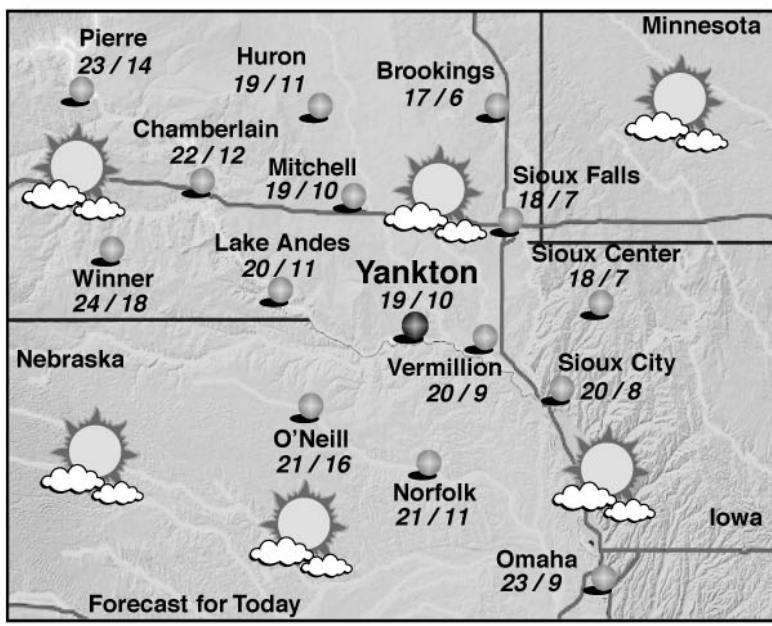
Yankton's Forecast

75 YEARS AGO

Wednesday, November 23, 1938 - Frank Karolevitz, in charge of the collection of discarded and worn toys which are to be repaired and redecorated under the sponsorship of Roy Anderson Post, American Legion, and will be distributed to children of the county who might otherwise not receive visits from Santa Claus on Christmas, says the response in the giving of old toys has not so far been what it should be.

50 YEARS AGO

Saturday, November 23, 1963 - Elevated to the awesome office by the assassin's gunfire that cut down John F. Kennedy, the former vice president (Lyndon B. Johnson), now 55, scheduled a late-morning conference with Dwight D. Eisenhower, the 34th president as he began his first full day as 36th President.

Texas reached the Daily Press and Dakotan news room shortly before 1 o'clock as the Friday edition of the newspaper was already on the presses and was in the mail for most of the readers outside of the city of Yankton. The front page was held up, and the wire was watched avidly by news office personnel for developments in the shooting. The remade front page was then locked up and processed for the press, so that the rest of the mail run and the city deliveries could be readied in time to reach most of the newspaper's readers.

25 YEARS AGO

Wednesday, November 23, 1988 - Students at two Yankton elementary schools learned the most important lessons of Thanksgiving as they peeled potatoes and made cranberry sauce in school kitchens this week. The real lessons are in cooperation, sharing and responsibility.

City Commission To Discuss Highway 50 Project Monday

The Yankton City Commission will consider Monday whether it wants to foot the cost of expanding the width of Highway 50 when it is reconstructed.

The South Dakota Department of Transportation (SDDOT) has the project slated for 2015 and 2016.

In the current plan, the SDDOT has proposed building three 11-foot interior lanes and two 12-foot exterior lanes between Marne Creek and Archery Lane.

City staff are recommending that the state be asked to build 12-foot lanes across the board, with the understanding that the municipality will be responsible for the costs associated with acquiring additional right-of-way and construction of three

additional feet of width.

Highway 50, or Fourth Street, will be reconstructed from Broadway Avenue to Burleigh Street in 2015. The following year, the reconstruction will occur from Marne Creek to Archery Lane. The estimated cost of the project is \$7.8 million.

Also Monday, the commission will hear a presentation from Lynn Peterson regarding taxation of federal credit organizations, consider an update to the Chan Gurney Municipal Airport layout plan, weigh the fate of swimming pool dividers and receive a presentation from Convention and Visitors Bureau director Lisa Scheve.

The meeting gets under way at 7 p.m. in the City of Yankton Meeting Room, located at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St.

CHICAGO (AP) - Grain futures were mixed Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for March delivery rose 2.25 cents to \$6.57 a bushel; March corn fell .25 cent to 4.2925 a bushel; March oats were 4.50 cents higher at \$3.24 a bushel; while January soybeans jumped 28 cents to \$13.195 a bushel.

Beef was mixed while pork fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. February live cattle fell .55 cent to \$1.3180 a pound; January feeder cattle was up .13 cent at \$1.6350 a pound; while February lean hogs were .90 cent lower at \$.8967 a pound.
