## **USD Ready For 'David And Goliath' Battle At NDSU**

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VERMILLION — To close out its 2013 season, the University of South Dakota football team traveled four hours north for arguably its biggest

Waiting for USD in Fargo, N.D., is top-ranked and two-time defending national champion North Dakota State, which hosts the Coyotes today (Saturday) at 2:30 p.m.

Is it a challenge the Coyotes (4-7, 3-4) have embraced?

"Oh yeah, always," senior center Cody O'Neill said this week. "Going up against a team like that is something everybody wishes for; it's a David and Goliath thing.'

adopted this week: Making noise in its season finale.

"Like coach (Jason) Petrino told us, 'Why wouldn't you want to go out facing the best team?' said senior safety Aaron Swift, who is the only current Coyote to have played in the Fargodome — back in 2010.

We're not saying the season's over yet. We're playing like we have five more games left.'

That's where the two teams will separate after today's game.

While the Coyotes will begin their off-season reflections and get an early jump on recruiting, the Bison (10-0, 7-0) will head into the FCS playoffs as the overall top seed — seeking their

needs, getting a chance to derail NDSU's perfect season, which would be its first since 1990.

"Anybody welcomes a chance like that," USD head coach Joe Glenn said. "To go against the best team in the nation and see where you stack up. "And to see if you can get what

they call an upset." Considering what happened last year, that might be asking a lot.

About the only reference to last year's 54-0 drubbing by NDSU which held USD to 76 total yards — in Sioux Falls involves proving to themselves that the Coyotes are improv-

ing.
"Nobody has done much on

them," Glenn said. "If we can get in there and make a little noise, it'd be something good to finish on.

"Knowing we gave the Bison too much. We want to know that we were better than we were last year, too."

Win or lose today, the Coyotes, though, aren't completely unfamiliar with the challenge of facing the No. 1

USD hosted and beat top-ranked (and defending national champion) Eastern Washington back in 2011 at the DakotaDome.

You have to look at it as though it's just another game, but yet it's not," O'Neill said. "That was the mentality of the guys we had two years

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## Volleyball **USD Sweeps Tournament** Opener 3-0

INDIANAPOLIS — Kendall Kritenbrink recorded 13 kills and Melissa Firtko added nine kills as the South Dakota volleyball team topped Western Illinois 25-18, 25-21, 25-19 in the first round of the Summit League Tournament in the IUPUI Gymnasium on Friday.

Kritenbrink finished the match with 1,403 career kills and moved into second on USD's all-time career kills list by passing her sister Kristen (2007-10) at 1,395. The junior needs 48 kills to pass Becky Olson (2000-03) at 1,450 for the most in USD history.

Firtko recorded the highest hitting percentage from a USD player this season, tallying nine kills and no errors on 12 attacks for a .750 hitting percentage. Kaitlyn Hastings and Riley Haug led USD defensively with 16 and 14 digs respectively, while Tori Kroll tallied 32 assists.

Western Illinois (12-18) was led by Ann Miller's 17 kills and Molly Murphy's 10 digs. Sarah Fetter tallied 31 assists for the Leatherneck

South Dakota committed just 11 attack errors while forcing the Leathernecks into 20. The Coyotes trailed just once in the first set, taking the lead with a 12-4 run to make it 18-11. They ended the second set with a 6-2 run and used 9-4 run after a 10-10 tie to seal the third set.

USD will face Denver in the second round of the tournament today (Saturday) at 3:30 p.m. Central.

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The sounds of bowling balls striking pins is far from a foreign noise in But when those sounds emanate

during a high school level competition, yeah, that's a new concept. For the first time since the 1970s

- nobody really knows how long it has been — Yankton High School hosted a club bowling competition. The opponent? Sioux Falls O'Gorman. The venue? Yankton Bowl.

"This is our maiden voyage," cocoach Pat King said as he looked out on the action across multiple lanes.

"What a cool event, to see all these kids and their parents from Sioux Falls.'

King, along with fellow coaches Don Casey and Todd Kautz, were able to pull in kids who were already participating in junior leagues every Sunday — including a handful who were

relatively new to the sport.

King credited Jim Palmer, the new owner of Yankton Bowl, as a key reason the idea of starting a team got rolling. Palmer spoke at the Yankton School Board meeting in mid-September, where he said he voiced support of club sports.

The whole issue is that sports are not just Bucks and Gazelles," Palmer said while monitoring the action Friday. "Bowling is as much of a sport as anything else, and it reflects on the

Where as sponsored sports receive funding, club sports like bowling do not. So to help pay for equipment, shoes and practice time, the team sought donations.

A number of local businesses do-

nated money, as did avid bowler Don Boyd, according to Palmer. That money undoubtedly helps the team meet the \$160 per bowler requirement by the state association, Palmer

Yankton joins nine other schools in the South Dakota High School Bowling Association, which includes all four Sioux Falls schools and Vermillion — which also competes at Yankton Bowl.

Most of the states in the country have club level bowling, including Nebraska. States like Iowa and Kansas
