

16-Year-Old Killed In 3-Vehicle Crash Near Beresford and sustained minor injuries during the

BERESFORD — A 16-year-old Centerville male died in a three vehicle crash that occurred Friday, Nov. 22, on Highway 46, three miles west of Beresford.

Peter Auch was driving a 2001 Pontiac Grand Am eastbound on S.D. Highway 46 near Beresford. Diane Robertson, 54, from Wagner, was driving a 2012 Buick Enclave westbound on Highway 46. A third vehicle, a 2004 Pontiac Grand Prix driven by Dillon Buchanan, 18, of Irene, was traveling westbound behind Robertson's Enclave. Buchanan's passenger was Jacob Halldorson, 18, of Madison, Minn.

Buchanan attempted to pass Robert-

son and as he moved into the eastbound lane, Auch's Grand Am was occupying the lane. Buchanan swerved left and struck a guardrail cable. The passenger side of his vehicle struck the center of the passenger's side of Auch's vehicle in a head-on manner. The result of the collision spun Auch's vehicle into the path of Robertson's vehicle which struck Auch's driver's side door.

Auch was air-lifted to Avera McKennan Hospital in Sioux Falls. He was wearing a seat belt during the crash, but sustained fatal injuries.

Robertson was wearing a seat belt

crash.

Buchanan and Halldorson were not wearing seat belts. Buchanan was treated and released from the hospital. Halldorson sustained serious but nonlife threatening injuries.

The South Dakota Highway Patrol is investigating. Clay County Sheriff's Office, Beresford Police Department, South Dakota Department of Transportation, Beresford Fire Department, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and Yankton County Sheriff's Office assisted.

at least, or not supportive of it," said Iowa's Secretary of Agriculture Bill Northey, a Republican. "I think it's yet to be seen if that's a smart political position."

U.S. Sen. Charles Grassley of Iowa said he hopes to thwart the administration's proposal in Congress if it survives the 60-day comment period.

Meanwhile, Republican Gov. Terry Branstad planned to press his fellow GOP governors, especially those with possible presidential aspirations, to be mindful of the ethanol industry's economic Jersey Gov. Chris Christie at a governors' association meeting in Arizona this week. On Tuesday, Branstad launched a Website for people to leave comments for the EPA.

For politicians eying the White House, "Whoever comes here better understand the importance of renewable fuels, or they are going to have hell to pay in rural Iowa," Branstad

said in a recent interview. The federal government began actively supporting ethanol, which is made by fermenting and distilling corn, about 40 years ago when pe-

troleum prices spiked and anti-air pollution efforts were ramping up. Refineries initially were given a tax credit to produce the grain alcohol and Congress later required oil companies to blend it in their

In Iowa, the nation's leading corn producer, about 45 percent of its crop went into ethanol last year. The state has 42 ethanol plants that produced 3.8 billion gallons.

Branstad said cutting the federal requirement would lower corn prices that have already fallen this year because of an unexpectedly robust har-

"They're making a huge mistake," Branstad said at the governors conference this week. "And they're going to drive corn below the cost of production

Democratic U.S. Rep. Dave Loebsack of Iowa City said a loss of federal support would be "a devastating decision for Iowa's farmers, rural communities and economy.'

If the federal mandate was reduced or ended, ethanol producers would rely on the handful of states with their own ethanol fuel standards, and on exports which accounted for about 1 billion gallons last year. The proposed change would likely hurt smaller producers more than powerhouses like Archer Daniels Midland and Cargill.


25 YEARS AGO


