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OMAHA, Neb. — Yes, I know it's still rather early in the process (not to mention the season), but over the past two weeks, I've gotten a look at two smaller basketball arenas that have provided some comparison to the one the University of South Dakota wants to build.

First came a trip to Sioux Falls last Thursday for a look at the new Sanford Pentagon. Then came Tuesday night when I traveled to Omaha and saw Creighton's D.J. Sokol Arena. Both times, the USD women lost, but like I said, the trips weren't a total loss. At least not from an

aesthetic perspective. USD received formal approval from the Board of Regents on Monday for its 6,000-seat basketball and volleyball arena, which is set to be constructed to the south of the DakotaDome — the location, at least, hasn't changed despite other facility modifications.

The Pentagon in Sioux Falls was built to serve as the home of the Skyforce of the NBA D-League, not to mention as a location for youth volleyball and basketball action. For basketball, the Pentagon seats 3,200, and there really doesn't seem to be a bad seat in the house.

USD, of course, isn't going to construct anything all that similar, but it was still fun to experience an intimate basketball environment.

Down here in Omaha, the Creighton women play their home games in Sokol Arena, an on-campus facility that seats 2,500 for basketball. Unlike what USD will built, Sokol has limited seating behind

each basket — with three rows of bleachers on one side and 10 rows on the other. Still, like what USD will construct, Sokol sits on ground level, with fans walking up to their seats. In

other words, the court is at concourse level. (And selfishly, I loved all the space for media, with one side of the court set up for media).

In time, we'll be able to watch basketball games in Vermillion in a smaller venue; one that doesn't so cavernous when 1,000 people show up.







SE Missouri Fires Coach Samuel After Three-Win Season

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo. (AP) — Southeast Missouri State has fired football coach Tony Samuel with two years left on his contract after a third straight losing season.

Athletics Director Mark Alnutt announced Samuel's departure on Tuesday. Samuel coached at the Cape Girardeau school for eight years and led the Redhawks to their first Ohio Valley Conference title and an NCAA playoff appearance in the Championship Subdivision in 2010.

Southeast Missouri finished 3-9 this fall, tied for seventh in its conference.

Samuel had a career win-loss record of 31-60. The former Nebraska defensive end was an 11-year assistant under Cornhuskers coach Tom Osborne. He also spent eight years as head coach at New Mexico State.

Metrodome's 'Baggie' Fetches \$3K ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Some collectors are bringing the

Metrodome's old right-field wall home after paying a combined \$3,025 for pieces of the "Baggie."

A pair of 16-foot-high, 190-foot-long sections of the famed fence sold during an online auction that concluded Monday. One went for \$2,025 and the other for \$1,000. Together, the items drew 190 bids.

When the Minnesota Twins played at the Metrodome from 1982-2009, left-handed hitters took aim at the dark blue wall that stood only 327 feet from home plate. To make up for the short distance, the fence was extended for a total height of 23 feet. When balls bounced off the wall, it rippled like a garbage bag, spawning the nickname.

Several stadium features are being auctioned off, with demolition looming next year.

The Twins have the Baggie used from their final Metrodome season in team archives.
