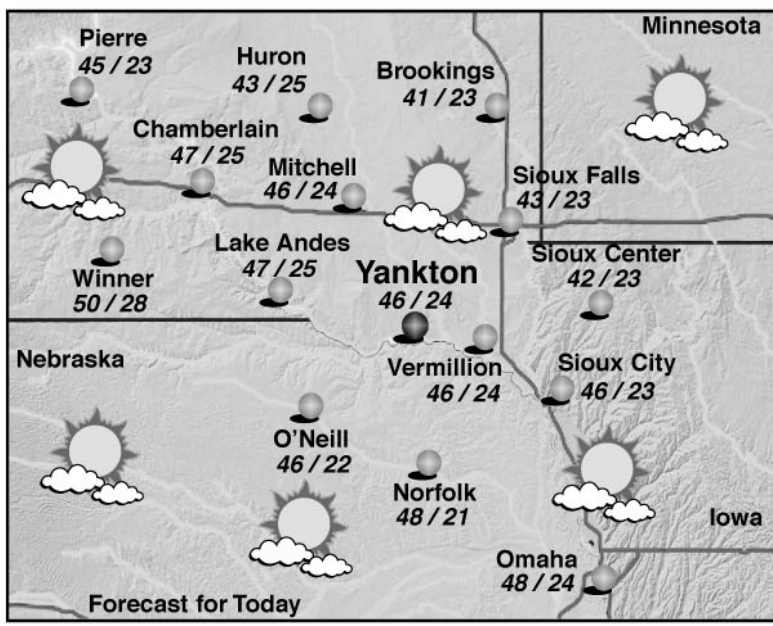

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.  
 Wheat for March delivery rose 5.25 cents to \$6.6875 a bushel; March corn fell 2 cents to 4.2450 a bushel; March oats were 2.25 cents higher at \$3.3150 a bushel; while January soybeans advanced 16.50 cents \$13.3650 a bushel.  
 Beef and pork rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.  
 February live cattle rose 15 cent to \$1.3425 a pound; January feeder cattle rose .15 cent to \$1.6547 a pound; while February lean hogs were .10 cent higher at \$9.057 a pound.

Spend Wisely: Some Holiday Financial Tips

BROOKINGS — Christmas decorations and gift ideas were on display well before Halloween. It is no wonder that families may spend way too much during the holidays, said Karen Slunicka, SDSU Extension Family Resource Management Field Specialist. So to keep your budget intact Slunicka encourages you to consider these tips.

CALCULATE THEN SHOP:

Look at your overall budget and calculate how much you can afford to spend on the holidays. "If your finances are in good shape, spend no more than 1.5 percent of your annual income. But if you're deeply in debt, can't meet your regular monthly expenses or don't have an emergency fund, this isn't the time to rack up additional debt," she said.

MAKE A LIST AND CHECK IT TWICE

Make a list of who you need to give gifts to. Include the dollar amount you expect to spend on each gift. The next step Slunicka said is to determine your overall budget, including holiday meals, gifts, cards, a tree and travel, and see if it is what you can afford. "If not, you may need to reduce some gifts, or find some cheaper alternatives. Then be sure to stick to your budget," Slunicka said. "This takes tremendous discipline. Avoid the temptations of last-minute impulse buying. Carry that list with you as a reminder."

LIMIT YOUR USE OF PLASTIC

Unless you are very good about paying the bill off in full each and every month.

DON'T PROCRASTINATE

Avoid waiting until the last minute to shop so you will have time to shop around and compare prices and take advantage of sales

MAKE YOUR OWN GIFTS:

Give some homemade gifts, such as cakes, cookies or gift certificates for your services/time. "This could include babysitting for young couples, running errands, cooking a meal, or doing handyman work," she said. "Older relatives don't need more chocolates, but could use help with a chore, running errands, or a ride to appointments. Maybe some would just appreciate your company."

KEEP IT SIMPLE

Substitute expensive get-togethers and elaborate holiday dinner parties with inexpensive entertainment at home, such as a neighborhood potluck meal or an evening of caroling. "We are living in tough economic times, and no one should be spending money they do not have," Slunicka said. "Being financially responsible this holiday season is a gift to yourself and to those you care about."
