

## **MVFC: Coyotes Aim To Ice The Penguins**

#### Football: USD Heads East Looking For First League Win Of Season

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VERMILLION — The season turnover figures for the University of South Dakota football team may not look all that one-sided, but of late, it's been a reason for concern.

And a constant theme this week for head coach Joe Glenn and his Covotes.

The season totals for USD (2-6, 0-4)? Thirteen giveaways and seven takeaways. The total over the last four games? Six giveaways and zero

We have to be as mistake-free as we can," said Glenn, whose team plays at No. 11 Youngstown State

today (Saturday) at 1 p.m. Central. Not only have the Coyotes averaged 11 points through four Missouri Valley games, they haven't recorded a defensive turnover — a fumble recovery or an interception - in five games.

The result has been four consecutive losses, by an average of 25

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regret it in the end," senior left tackle Matt Huffer said. "Our game plan is good, we just have to eliminate those

Adding to the struggles has been sacks.

which don't technically count toward a team's turnover total. In the last four games, USD has surrendered 15 sacks and has recorded just one — a week ago against North Dakota State.

"It just comes down to the small plays that people need to be making," Huffer said. "We've come up short every time, but we have to stay positive and keep playing."

Last Saturday against the topranked Bison, the Coyotes had three turnovers — two interceptions and a fumble.

"We've really got to get those down," Glenn said. "Make good choices with the football, and score some points; we've really got to get going with the scoring."

The task now for USD is cleaning

all of that up against the Penguins (6-2, 3-1), who won at South Dakota State last weekend.

Working in the Coyotes favor, at least, is that the last two meetings with Youngstown State have been tightly contested. Two years ago in Ohio, the Penguins won 13-10, and last year in Vermillion, YSU scored with 14 seconds left to win 38-34.

"We just want to build off that performance," said junior receiver Eric Shufford, who joined the program this season. "We know what we can do against this team, we should be able to take advantage of that and make some plays.'

Keeping with the turnover theme, the Coyotes didn't turn the ball over last season against the Penguins and recorded three takeaways on defense — three fumbles that turned it 17 points.

The USD defense also recorded

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# Coyotes Drop 'Dons 3-1

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VERMILLION — Fort Wayne gave one of the league's first-place teams quite a scare on a Halloween night meeting.

But again, the University of South Dakota volleyball team used its home court advantage.

Extending their Summit League home winning streak to 15, the Coyotes used the energy from its DakotaDome 'Den' crowd to rally past the Mastodons 3-1 on Friday night. Set scores were 21-25, 25-22, 25-20, 25-18. It just took a little bit of time for the

Coyotes to get going, according to junior middle Kelsey Biltoft.

"And I don't know why. This is our home court, we should be able to relax," said Biltoft, who had six kills and five total blocks (one solo). "Once we got over that, things started flowing a little bit better.

And it was no surprise that USD did so at home.

In winning their 15th straight conference home match, the Coyotes (15-9, 9kept pace with Denver and IUPUI both won Friday to move to 9-2.

It's now been just over two calendar years since USD lost a league match in Vermillion, and the streak happens to coincidence with the program moving its home matches from the DakotaDome turf to the upper level.

The intimate atmosphere has clearly helped the Coyotes, according to senior Kendall Kritenbrink.

Our fans yell for us when we're serving, and other places they're yelling against us," said Kritenbrink, who had 23 kills Friday. "So that helps a lot, knowing they're backing us up and distracting the other team."

In the opening two sets against the Mastodons (10-16, 4-7), it wasn't so much the crowd as it was the visitors that gave USD issues. The Coyotes committed seven attack errors in each of the first two sets, but had one each in the

"We didn't have a lot of energy until that last little run, but having our crowd here made a difference," Williamson said. "It helped us get through that lack



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A much-improved Mount Marty College volleyball team and stands full of costumed Lancer fans could not scare off Concordia, as the Bulldogs claimed a 25-19, 25-15, 25-17 victory over the Lancers in Great Plains Athletic Conference action on Friday night in Laddie E. Cimpl Arena

Concordia jumped out to a hot start and did not look back. The Bulldogs controlled the opening set, taking a 25-19 vic-

"We had a hard time getting our offense going," said Lancers head coach Candice Climer. "It seemed like we were never really in sync tonight."

Concordia, who currently ranks third in the GPAC, dominated sets two and three, eventually winning the match 3-0.

'We did not take Mount Marty lightly coming into tonight, as they have played us tough the last two games," said Concordia head coach Scott Mattera. "It was a great environment, and I never really felt comfortable with our lead at any point tonight."

Lancer sophomore Kayla Jones recorded a match-high nine digs, while Amber Dysthe added 11 assists. Laura Groseth led the Lancers offense with five

The Bulldogs totaled 12 ace serves in the three-set match, five coming from Claire White. Paige Getz also had nine kills to help the lead the Bulldogs to the win.

"Our serving game was huge for us tonight, we wanted to be very aggressive with our serves and create some scoring oppor-

tunities," said Mattera. Concordia will head to Mitchell for a Saturday matchup against Dakota Wesleyan, while Mount Marty will have a home double-

header Saturday afternoon. We are going to put tonight behind us and get ready for Saturday's games," said Climer. "We need to respond to adversity and come out and play well.

On Saturday, Mount Marty will take on Hastings in GPAC action at 1:30 p.m. The Lancers also play No. 18 Jamestown (N.D.) in a non-conference match at 5 p.m.

#### Matured Husker **QB** Armstrong Set Go Face **Purdue Today**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Tommy Armstrong Jr. has grown up a lot since he last faced Purdue.

The Nebraska quarterback turned in one of his worst performances while making his first career road start against the Boilermakers last vear.

Sure, the Cornhuskers won by 37 points against an overmatched opponent. But that didn't do much to make Armstrong feel better about being off target on 12 of 18 passes and throwing three interceptions.

The Boilermakers (3-5, 1-3 Big Ten) figure to see a much improved Armstrong when they visit the 17th-ranked Cornhuskers (7-1, 3-1, No. 15 CFP) on Saturday.

The sophomore is one of only three quarterbacks with more than 1,500 yards passing and 500 yards rushing. Mississippi State's Dak Prescott and Nevada's Cody Fajardo are the others.

Armstrong is second in the Big Ten with an average of 276 yards of total offense, and is first in the nation among quarterbacks with 6.5 yarders per carry.

Yeah, he has come a long way since that afternoon in West Lafayette 12 months

"Last year I was young, so they threw a lot at me and I wasn't ready," Armstrong said. "But I have seen a lot of lefenses so I'm prepared for

Armstrong, 14-2 as a starter, throws one of the best deep balls of any quarterback in the Big Ten but continues to struggle at times making short passes. He also threw a bad interception last week against Rutgers.

Still, he leads an offense that's generating better than 500 yards a game and features one of the nation's premier running backs in Ameer Abdullah and playmakers such as Kenny Bell, Jordan Westerkamp and DeMornay Pierson-El.

The Huskers are threetouchdown favorites against Purdue. They have an open date next week before finishing against three straight contending West Division

opponents. Armstrong said he knows Nebraska probably needs to win out in convincing fashion and get some help from other teams to have a chance at making the College Football Playoff.

"I've told our offense and our team, respect is only given when it's due," Armstrong said. "We have to keep winning. That's the only way that we are going to earn respect here in Nebraska."
