## Better Choices, Better Health Workshop Coming To Sioux Falls

BROOKINGS — Cooperatively, South Dakota Department of Health and SDSU Extension are launching Better Choices, Better Health® South Dakota (BCBH) in an effort to educate South Dakotans with chronic health conditions on ways to manage the impact of their disease on their daily lives.

The Better Choices, Better Health program is offered as six, weekly, two-and-one-half-hour workshop sessions with interactive group discussion. Better Choices, Better Health® workshops are currently being held throughout the state.

You can register to attend an upcoming workshop being held in Sioux Falls on Wednesday beginning Nov. 5-Dec 17 at the First United Methodist Church (401 South Spring Ave) from 1-3:30 p.m. with exception of Nov. 26. Registration for this workshop will close after the second session on Nov. 12.

"This is not a support group but rather a workshop on how to make small steps toward positive changes and a healthier life," explained Megan Olesen, SDSU Extension Nutrition Extension Field Specialist.

Better Choices, Better Health workshops are an extension of Stanford University's Chronic Disease Self-Management Program. The program is designed for those with chronic conditions that may include, but are not limited to: arthritis, heart conditions, diabetes, depression, cancer, high blood pressure,

breathing problems, chronic pain, anxiety, weight issues and fibromyalgia.

"Living with a chronic condition can be difficult. A few goals of this program are to help individuals manage the impact of their disease, improve their confidence, and encourage behaviors that positively affect their health. We welcome all interested adults to take charge and live healthy," said Lori Oster, BCBH South Dakota Program Coordinator.

Stanford University's research has demonstrated that participants who complete the program have experienced better overall health, have more energy and less fatigue. Data also shows that after participation in the BCBH, workshop participants have fewer visits to the doctor, have fewer disabilities and experience less distress about their health.

South Dakota healthcare professionals involved in Better Choices, Better Health, have expressed support of the self-management approach as an addition to a patient's medical plan of care.

More than 20 professionals, volunteers and community members have recently completed training provided by Stanford University to offer workshops across the state.

## MOURNING ATTIRE

While black clothing is now acceptable for everyday use, until the 20th century, black garments were exclusively worn by those in mourning. During the Victorian era, social custom dictated that widows wear mourning attire for at least two and a half years following the death of their spouses. However, many (including Queen Victoria) chose to wear these garments for the rest of their lives. In the most immediate periods of mourning, women were required to wear unadorned, conservatively cut dresses constructed of a stiff black silk gauze called "crape," which was intentionally spelled with an "a" to differentiate it from the more casual "crepe" textile. These garments were worn for a year and a day following a spouse's death.
