DCI Completes Probe In Charles Mix Shooting

DANTE — The South Dakota Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) has completed its probe into last Thursday's (Oct. 30) officer-involved shooting incident in Charles Mix County, according to Attorney General Marty Jackley.

No injuries occurred as a result of the rounds fired by the deputy sheriff, Jackley said. The investigative report will be turned over to the Charles Mix County sheriff's office for agency review. No shooting summary will be issued.

The Charles Mix County sheriff's office responded to a call to service near Dante early Thursday morning. Upon arriving at the scene, a deputy approached a vehicle that was occupied by two individuals.

The incident escalated and resulted in a Charles Mix County deputy firing rounds at the vehicle. The vehicle then left the scene at a high rate of speed. The passenger of the vehicle, a juvenile, was located shortly after the incident with injuries not sustained from gunfire.

Russell Duaine Turner Jr., 40, Dante, was arrested on later that day without incident on outstanding warrants. Those warrants include intentional damage to property, failure to appear or report felony and driving with a suspended license.

In addition, Turner has been arrested and charged on five counts: one count each of aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer and distribution of a controlled substance to a minor (methamphetamine), both a Class 2 felony punishable by up to 25 years imprisonment and/or \$50,000 fine; one count each of possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) and ingestion, both a Class 5 felony, punishable by up to 5 years imprisonment and/or \$10,000; and possession of drug paraphernalia, a misdemeanor.

Senate Hopefuls Push To The Finish

SIoux FALLS — Stopping President Barack Obama's agenda. Reducing money in politics. Restoring comity in Washington. Bringing a truly conservative vision to the Senate.

The closing arguments in the South Dakota Senate campaign are as divergent as the candidates in the complex, four-way race. With the final debate concluded, and the candidates in the homestretch before Election Day, here's a look at the closing arguments of the four candidates vying to replace retiring Democratic Sen. Tim Johnson: GOP nominee and former Gov. Mike Rounds; Democratic nominee Rick Weiland and independents Larry Pressler, a former Republican senator; and Gordon Howie, a tea party-inspired candidate.

MIKE ROUNDS

In terms of message, Rounds is finishing the campaign how he started it: Promoting his Republican credentials and promising voters he will slow the plans of Obama. As if to underscore the point, Rounds on Thursday campaigned with Obama's opponent in the 2012 presidential race, former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney. Rounds also promised a hand in ousting Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, a point he hit hard at campaign stops on Sunday.

HHS Offers Surprises For 'Wine And Whiskers'

More than \$24,000 worth of auction items will be available at this year's seventh annual Wine and Whiskers event, organized by the Heartland Humane Society.

The event kicks off at 6 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 8, at Minerva's in Yankton and features wine and beer tasting, a dessert dash, food, shelter updates and an auction with more than 90 packages to take home.

"Last year we raised \$48,000 for the event. This year our goal is \$50,000," said Executive Director Kerry Hacecky. "It is almost one-third of our general budget for the year."

Historically, Heartland Humane Society has sold out all of its 300 tickets for Wine and Whiskers.

"We hope to do that again this year," she said. "We still have tickets available."

Hacecky said that Heartland is bringing a variety of new auction items to Wine and

Whiskers this year.

"What I like about our packages is that it is not a lot of items. It's more about opportunities," she said. "A new package on our live auction that I think will be popular is the salsa, supper and soaring package."

This package includes a supper, dance lesson and a flight at Jake Hoffner's Hangar at the airport.

Another new package offered this year is the progressive supper package.

"This package includes appetizers, a meal and desserts in three of the historic Yankton homes, followed by a Christmas light drive around Yankton with champagne in a limo," Hacecky said.

Other packages such as the Kentucky Derby party package, a pub crawl package and dates for a year package that offers more than \$400 in gift certificates for area restaurants will also be available at this year's event.
