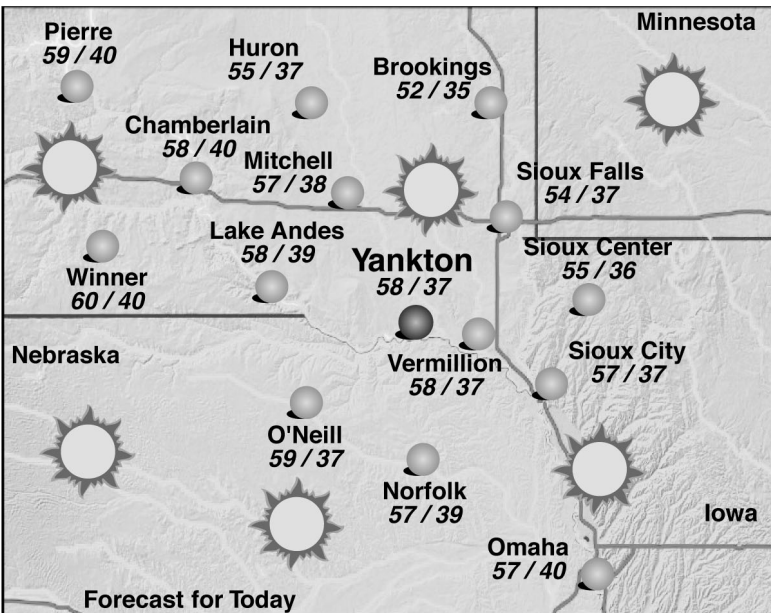

Wismer, Blake Make Final-Day Campaign Stop In Yankton

Democrats Susan Wismer and Susy Blake literally didn't ease up on the gas in the final days of their campaign for South Dakota governor and lieutenant governor.

The women started Friday with stops in Britton, Brookings and Madison. They traveled across South Dakota over the weekend — about 300 miles one way — for Rock the Lakota Vote concerts in Mission, Kyle and Rapid City on the western end of the state.

They returned Sunday to eastern South Dakota for a Get Out TheVote (GOTV) rally in Sioux Falls, then hit Yankton and Vermillion on Monday with a stop at the Press & Dakotan. Their campaign ends today (Tuesday) in Sioux Falls with campaigning and then an Election Night gathering at the Icon Lounge.

"Women can do anything!" Blake said, unfazed by the grind.

Based on polls and voter registration, the Democratic ticket faces an uphill climb. But Wismer and Blake said they remained confident as their campaign entered its final 24 hours.

Regardless of today's outcome, they have already made history. Wismer is the first female to win the South Dakota gubernatorial nomination of a major party. Wismer and Blake form the first all-female gubernatorial ticket in South Dakota.

And for good measure, they are the first South Dakota ticket to feature two Augustana College graduates.

"Susan did it the traditional way (straight out of high school)," Blake said, noting she finished her degree as a non-traditional student.

The two Democrats have sought to introduce themselves to voters. Along the way, the candidates have learned a great deal about South Dakota as they hit the campaign trail.

In the process, Wismer and Blake have either discovered disturbing chal-

lenges facing South Dakota or have reinforced situations they already knew.

"Poverty is a major issue in the state," Blake said. "There is a real problem when 50 percent of the kids in Sioux Falls are on free or reduced lunches. There is something wrong with that."

South Dakota's youngsters are often analyzed not for their potential but for their possible problems, Blake said.

"In our state, they have doubts about who will make it through high school," she said. "They are looking at kids in the fourth grade, determining the degree of possibility they will end up in prison based on things like their reading ability."

The events of recent days have intensified the political races across South Dakota, particularly the U.S. Senate race, Wismer said. She pointed to new developments surrounding the EB-5 immigrant investor program.

The tight U.S. Senate race in South Dakota, which may determine control of the Senate, has drawn new national attention and a flood of new donations and campaign spending.

Amidst the increased noise, candidates in state and local races are work-

Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Dec live cattle rose 1 cent to \$1.6705 a pound; Jan feeder cattle gained 1.33 cents to \$2.2980 a pound; while Dec lean hogs were .83 cent higher at \$8.885 a pound.
