Soccer: Bucks' Slate Named To HM List

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Three members of the Yankton Bucks boys' soccer team were recognized by the state's coaches, as the All-State soccer teams were announced on Monday.

Seniors John Dannenbring and Connor Chambers were named to the first team. Sophomore Treyson Slate earned honorable mention accolades.

Yankton head coach Warren Brenner credited both seniors with playing key roles in the Bucks' run to the Class AA semifinals this sea-

"Both John and Connor definitely earned it," he said. "They had to work hard to make a difference on that team. They spent a lot of time on and off the field this season, spending time with other players. That paid off huge for us.

Dannenbring anchored the Bucks' midfield, sparking an offense that scored 35 goals in 11 regular season matches this season.

"John controlled the midfield well this year," Brenner said. "Opponents had to make the effort to shut him down this year.

While Dannenbring would classify himself as a "defensive" player, the senior scored five goals — including two on penalty kicks in the Bucks' quarterfinal win over Pierre and had seven assists.

"I knew I had to play both de-

watched a lot of stuff online, looking at the great players, and tried to replicate what they do. I knew I had to be quicker, faster, stronger than opponents this year.'

Dannenbring would have pre-ferred a state title to individual honors, but said he was "glad he got to represent Yankton soccer.

"It wasn't my goal. My goal was to win state," he said. "But this is a little thing to keep me happy from the loss to Lincoln (in the semifinals).

Dannenbring hopes to continue his playing career at the collegiate level, and is exploring his options.

Chambers anchored a Buck defense that allowed just 10 goals in 11 matches this season. The Bucks shut out five opponents during the

"Connor has been a defensive player almost his entire career," Brenner said. "He was definitely a striker's nightmare. He challenged strikers, and they worked for every shot they got."

Chambers credited his teammates for helping make him a better defender.

"They always pushed me to be the best player," he said. "They kept me motivated.'

Chambers does not plan to continue his competitive playing career collegiately, but hopes to continue playing recreationally.

One of the players who will be expected to step into a bigger role next season is Slate, who helped anchor the Yankton defense despite being just a sophomore.

## Seven **Bucks** Named **AII-ESD**

The best team finish in nearly a decade netted the Yankton Bucks some postseason recognition.

Seven members of the topranked Bucks football team were named to the all-Eastern South Dakota Conference team, as selected by the league's coaches.

This might be the most we've had on there since I've been here," said Yankton head coach Arlin Likness, who took over the program in 1999. "You always want more. When you are 9-0 and having a good year, you want as

many on there as you can." Quarterback Mason Strahl, lineman Nick LaFave, tight end Evan Greeneway and receiver Brady Hale were all selected on offense. Lineman Tim Cross, linebacker Matt Fitzgerald and defensive back Ryan Sternhagen were honored on defense. Players could not be selected in more than one position. Offense was selected first, followed by defense and special teams.

Unlike last year, when more than two-thirds of Strahl's school-record 1,712 passing yards went to allstate receiver J.J. Hejna, the Bucks have spread the ball out, with a nearly 50-50 break between rushing and passing

"Mason's numbers were pretty good, but our running backs weren't high because we do it by committee," Likness said. No Yankton back averages more than the eight carries a game by Strahl. "Brady was a legitimate receiver, but that takes him off as a punter or kicker."

Strahl has 1,391 yards on the season, leaving him just 175 yards away from Michael Rucker's career passing record of 3,278 yards. Hale (33-409, 2 TD), Greeneway (22-349, 2 TD) and Parker Kuchta (21-193) have been leading targets. Strahl also has 135 yards rushing with six touchdowns, good enough for second on the

Helping lead the way for the offense has been LaFave. "He anchored us on the

line last year, and has been a leader for us this year as a senior," Likness said.

Besides his receiving skills, Greeneway has been a weapon in the running game for the Bucks, using his 6-7 frame to clear the way for the Bucks' backs.

"He's a true tight end," Likness said. "He not only gets the ball down field. His blocking has gotten better and better.

Cross has been a disruptive force in the defensive line, leading the team in sacks with six and ranking second with 7.5 tackles for loss. He also has an interception return for touchdown.

"His quickness and strength have allowed him to get to the ball," Likness said. 'He's gelled into place this

Fitzgerald, who was one of the team's leading receivers a year ago, has focused mostly on defense this season with positive results, including 2.5 sacks and a team-best 12.5 tackles for loss.

Early on, however, the game appeared even. New Underwood (8-2) got


within 8-6 on a Brandon Koch 46-yard touchdown run late in the first quarter. Walth scored on a 2-yard
