Woods, who was the top vote-getter with 4,196 votes for 22 percent of the vote, said he was a little surprised.

Bernie Hunhoff To Senate; Stevens, J. Hunhoff Win

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As the District 18 results rolled in Tuesday night, it became clear that the voters of District 18 were happy with the representation they had in Pierre, returning all three incumbents back to the state Legisla-

In the District 18 Senate race, Bernie Hunhoff (D) defeated Matt Stone (R) 4,300 -3,403 to make the cross over after serving in the House last term.

Hunhoff said that he was very proud to be returning to Pierre.

"I am just very thankful," he said. "Yankton County is just such a spe-

cial place to me. It is a special place in South Dakota. If I could represent anywhere in South Dakota, I think a lot of people around the state

would say Yankton County. He noted that Stone was a great candidate.

"He put so much into it," Hunhoff said. "He has done a great public service and we have had a great discussion of the issues.'

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AP Calls Rounds In **SD** Senate **Battle**

SIOUX FALL — Republican favorite Mike Rounds beat out three oppo-nents for South Dakota's open U.S. Senate seat in a race that was once considered close enough for national

scrutiny — and money.
The former two-term governor pulled out a win in the race with support from men, older

voters, those who identified as conservative and those who felt the government is doing too many things that should be left to businesses and individuals, according to preliminary results of an exit poll conducted for The Associated Press and televi-

sion networks. Democratic opponent Rick Weiland ran strong among those who identified as liberal or Democrats. And former GOP Sen. Larry Pressler, who ran as an independent, could not draw enough votes from Rounds to

affect the outcome. Rounds led his opponents in fundraising and polling for most of the campaign. South Dakota was among the top targets in the Republican Party's quest to net six seats and take control of the chamber for the final two years of President Barack Obama's term. Results elsewhere that will determine the control of the chamber were still coming in as of

8:30 p.m. CST. The race was briefly considered competitive in the final few weeks of the campaign. Rounds' opponents said his support had eroded amid criticism of the EB-5 visa program, causing money from the campaign arms of Senate Democrats and Republicans to pour in. Rounds has defended the EB-5 program, which operated while he was governor and allowed wealthy foreigners to invest in South Dakota projects that created jobs in exchange for U.S visas.

Throughout the race, Rounds attempted to tie his opponents to Obama and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, both of whom he predicted voters in this Republicanheavy state would reject.

Headed into his first term in Washington, Rounds has said he would focus on repealing and replacing the Affordable Care Act, pushing forward on the Keystone XL pipeline and removing bureaucracy and regulatory burdens for farmers and businesses.

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Area: Vermillion Pool Issue Wins Swimmingly

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The calendar says November, but Vermillion voters are looking ahead to a new swimming pool.

In Tuesday's city election, Vermillion voters overwhelmingly approved a \$3.1 million bond issue for Prentis Park improvements by 1,748-576, or a 3-to-1 margin. The bond plays a key part in the \$5.25 million project, which includes an

estimated \$4 million for a new swimming pool.

The new pool will replace the current structure, which is nearly 50 years old.

The proposed pool's new amenities include a lazy river, water slides, floatable water walk, basketball hoop, one-meter diving tower, shade structures and zerodepth entry, water features, bench and shade.

As part of the bond issue, other



would include an updated shell, new basketball

courts, new bathroom facilities at the baseball field and additional parking.

Besides issuing up to \$3.1 mil-

lion in bonds, the financing plan calls for \$1 million each from the general fund reserves and the second-penny fund reserves. City officials would seek to raise the remaining \$250,000 from fundraising and grants.

Tuesday's ballots were also filled with a number of candidate races around the area.

A new state senator is headed to the South Dakota Legislature, as former presiding circuit court

judge Art Rusch of Vermillion won the District 17 seat representing

Clay and Turner counties. Rusch, running as a Republican, defeated Democrat Michelle Maloney of Vermillion by a 3,872-2,798 in a battle of newcomers. Rusch replaces Democrat Tom Jones of Viborg, who didn't seek re-election.
