**Circus Cited
For Stunt
That Injured 9**

PROVIDENCE, R.I.—
Ringling Bros. and Bar-
num & Bailey Circus mis-
used a key rigging
component in a hair-hang-
ing stunt, causing a fall
that seriously injured
eight acrobats, federal
workplace safety regula-
tors said Tuesday.

The Occupational
Safety and Health Admin-
istration cited the com-
pany for a serious safety
violation and proposed
the maximum fine, \$7,000,
for the circus' parent com-
pany, Feld Entertainment.
It concluded circus staff
had improperly loaded a
carabiner clip.

The company disputed
the finding and was decid-
ing whether to contest it,
said Stephen Payne, a
spokesman for Feld Enter-
tainment.

OSHA investigators
said the company at-
tached two rings to the
bottom of the carabiner,
rather than one, in viola-
tion of what it said was in-
dustry practice and of the
manufacturer's instruc-
tions. Investigators said
that caused the clip to be
overloaded.

Payne disputed that,
saying the clip was carry-
ing a lower load than it
was rated to hold.
David Michaels, assist-
ant secretary of labor for
occupational safety and
health, called it a "cata-
strophic failure," and said
it demonstrates the circus
industry needs profes-
sional engineers to de-
velop, evaluate and
inspect the structures it
uses in performances.

"We can never put a
price on the impact this
event had on these workers
and their families. Employ-
ers must take steps to en-
sure this does not happen
again," he said.

Payne said safety of its
workers and audience are
the company's top priority,
and it is making the neces-
sary changes.

The eight acrobats were
attached by their hair to a
chandelier-like apparatus
and suspended in the air.
They had just begun their
act on May 4 when the car-
abiner clip snapped, send-
ing them plummeting to the
ground 15 feet below. A
ninth worker on the ground
was hit and was also hurt.

Most of the women were
severely injured. Some were
unable to walk as of June,
and they have collectively
gone through dozens of sur-
geries. Several of the
women hired a lawyer and
at that time said they were
planning to sue the com-
pany. The lawyer did not
immediately return a re-
quest for comment on Tues-
day.

One of the women,
Samantha Pitard, has re-
turned to the circus, but the
others have not and are
being covered by workers'
compensation insurance,
Payne said.

The hair-hanging act has
not returned to the circus.
Payne said they haven't de-
cided when it will return or
what it will look like.

NY Court: No Asylum For Chinese Child-Counter

NEW YORK — A federal ap-
peals court that rejected a Chi-
nese woman's asylum request
found that she helped her
country's government limit
childbirths for over two
decades.

The 2nd U.S. Circuit Court
of Appeals in Manhattan ruled
that 61-year-old Suzhen Meng
assisted in the persecution of
women for 22 years as the sole
public security officer in a re-
gion where she monitored
about 1,100 households.

An immigration court previ-
ously found that she reported
women with unauthorized
pregnancies knowing they
would be subjected to forced
abortions and sterilizations.
China's policy in her region
permitted families to have one
child. The appeals court noted
that Meng had testified to see-
ing women who had violated
the policy being dragged away
forcibly by police.

After arriving in the United
States in February 2008, Meng
sought asylum on the grounds
that she faced political perse-
cution in China. The immigra-
tion judge's ruling said Meng
was working odd jobs in New
York because she got dis-
missed from her job in China
and was not receiving a pen-
sion.

An immigration judge re-
jected her asylum request in
2010, after which she ap-
pealed.

In asylum claims recounted
in an appeals court decision
Monday, Meng said she re-
ported police corruption while
she was a security officer, lead-

ing her to be arrested and held
for two weeks, when a guard
slapped her face several times
and fellow prisoners beat her
on instruction of guards. One
encounter resulted in Meng
having a tooth knocked out, ac-
cording to court documents.

Her lawyer, Gary Yerman,
said Tuesday that Meng was
merely a "statistician, a census
taker" who tracked births. He
said an appeal was possible.

"She didn't actively assist
the persecution of others," he
said.

In court documents, Yer-
man said Meng was the re-
gional police officer for her
district in the city of Wuhan,
Hubei Province, and came to
the U.S. at the invitation of her
sister, a researcher at Johns
Hopkins University in Balti-
more. Yerman also said the
chief of the political depart-
ment at the Hanyang security
office warned Meng not to
apply for asylum when she
came to the U.S. or there
would be consequences.

The appeals court "seemed
to exaggerate Ms. Ming's im-
portance to the family plan-
ning enforcement in China,"
Yerman said.

In a decision written by Cir-
cuit Judge Reena Raggi, a
three-judge panel noted that
Ming sometimes advised
women she would report as
being pregnant to hide or flee,
but it said she was "integral to
the effectuation of persecu-
tion."

It added: "Meng's reporting
of policy-violating women was
no 'minor' action, but the criti-
cal step that set in motion the
entire persecutor scheme of
enforcement."
