South Dakota Recruits Low-Income Teens With Disabilities To Further Education, Employment

PIERRE — The state De-partment of Human Services recently began mailing letters to recruit 120 of South Dakota's young people with disabilities to participate in a six-state project to improve their educational and employment outcomes.

South Dakota will participate in a joint federal initiative to design and implement interventions for youth ages 14 to 16 who receive Social Security Supplemental Security Income (SSI). Through an experimental design, this five-year, multimillion-dollar project will provide interventions to positively impact the education and employment of this group. Teens with disabilities as well as their families with low incomes are being recruited to participate in this federally funded initiative. U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan said the initiative provides services and support to help some of

the nation's "most at-risk students" so they can focus on their educational and career goals.

South Dakota is part of a consortium called Achieving Success by Promoting Readiness for Education and Employment (ASPIRE) that includes the following west-

ern states: Arizona, Colorado, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota and Utah. ASPIRE was formed to implement the U.S. Department of Education grant under the Promoting the Readiness of Minors in Supplemental Security Income (PROMISE) initiative.

Earlier in October. ASPIRE fered the additional services state agencies mailed the first batch of letters to students who fit the initiative criteria based on SSI. South Dakota will ultimately mail 650 letters to eligible students with the goal of securing 120 participants for the PROMISE initiative. Of the ASPIRE states, Arizona aims to enroll the most at 1.050. and North Dakota will enroll the least at 50. Enrollment ends March 2016.

The teens will be divided into two groups. Sixty of the 120 enrolled South Dakota teens and their families will receive information about existing services in the state. The other 60 will be offered additional case management, benefits counseling, financial-capability training, career and work-based learning experiences, and parent information and training until September 2018. The two groups, those who were of-

and those who receive existing services, will be compared to determine the effectiveness of the additional services.

"This is a great opportu-nity for South Dakota to educate many of its low-income families about programs and services available to support their teens with disabilities," S.D. Department of Human Services Secretary Gloria Pearson said. "This initiative should also show us how effective the programs and services offered through AS-PIRE are when it comes to improving educational and employment outcomes."
