The current House Republi-Justin Cronin, R-Gettysburg, Cronin, 34, has served in that post for the past four sessions and declined to run for the No. role against Gosch.

Wink, as the new speaker, will make committee assignments. Cronin likely will be named as chairman for the House Appropriations Committee.

Rep. Fred Romkema, R-Spearfish, has been House Appropriations chairman the past two sessions. He likely will remain on the committee.

The other top slot opening is speaker pro tem. Reportedly unchallenged for that post is Rep. Mark Mickelson, R-Sioux Falls. Mickelson, 48, will be starting his second term in the House. He would be in line to become speaker in 2017.

His father, George S. Mickelson, and grandfather George T. Mickelson also served as speakers before being elected as governors respectively in 1986 and 1990 and in 1946 and 1948.

House Democratic leader Bernie Hunhoff of Yankton won election Tuesday to the Senate. Hunhoff, 63, has served a total of 12 years since 1993 during two periods in the Senate and the House.

Hunhoff might be the new Senate Democratic leader.

The current Senate Democratic leader, Jason Frerichs of Wilmot, indicated during the 2014 session that he would be willing to step aside if Hunhoff won election to the Senate.

Rep. Julie Bartling of Burke is the current House Democratic assistant leader. Bartling, 56, has served 12 years during two different periods in the House, Senate and House again since 2001.

House Democrats will need to fill the two spots.

In the Senate, Democrats gained one seat to increase their number to eight while Republicans continue to have a super-majority of 27.

All three of the Senate's top Republicans won re-election and are expected to continue in their same roles without challenges.

Sen. Corey Brown of Gettysburg is the Senate president pro tem, making him responsible for committee assignments and the No. 2 presiding officer behind the lieutenant gover-

Brown, 40, will be starting his fourth consecutive term in the Senate.

The Senate Republican leader is Tim Rave, R-Baltic. He rose from the No. 2 spot after the resignation of Russ Olson, R-Wentworth, in 2013. Rave, 47, will be starting his thirteenth consecutive year as

The Senate Republican assistant leader is Dan Lederman, R-Dakota Dunes. He was selected when Rave moved up. Lederman, 41, will be starting his seventh year as a legisla-

Nearly one third of the senators-elect weren't members of the Senate in the current

They include four Democrats and seven Republicans, nearly all of whom have intricate political stories.

THE REPUBLICANS ARE:

Rep. Brock Greenfield of Clark, who defeated Democratic Sen. Chuck Welke of Warner. Greenfield, 39, will be starting his fifteenth consecutive year as a legislator. He was in the Senate 2001 through 2008 and had been in the House since 2009. His mother, Lana Greenfield, R-Clark, was elected to his current House seat

 Rep. David Novstrup of Aberdeen, who defeated Democrat Mark Remily of Aberdeen for the seat held by Sen. Al Novstrup, R-Aberdeen. David Novstrup, 31, was term-limited in the House. He and

his father ran for each other's current seats. Both won Tuesday;
• Terri Haverly of Rapid City, who is married to a Republican former legislator, Jeff Haverly. She was unchallenged for the seat held by Sen. Mark Kirkeby, R-Rapid City, who didn't seek re-election; • Rep. Gary Cammack of Union

Center, a freshman who was un-challenged for the seat held by Sen. Larry Rhoden, R-Union Center. Rhoden ran for the Republican nomination for U.S. Senate. Rhoden, 55, served 14 years as a legislator;

· Rep. Betty Olson of Prairie City, who defeated Democrat Oren Lesmeister of Parade for the seat held by Sen. Ryan Maher, R-Isabel. Maher was term-limited. Olson, 68, was term-limited in the House;

· Arthur Rusch, a retired circuit judge from Vermillion, who beat De-mocrat Michelle Maloney of Vermil-lion for the seat held by Sen. Tom Jones, D-Viborg. Jones didn't seek

re-election; and
• Rep. Jenna Haggar of Sioux
Falls, who beat Democrat Michael Schultz of Brandon for the seat now held by Sen. Shantel Krebs, R-Renner. Krebs was elected as South_Dakota's next secretary of state Tuesday.

Grief is a Dutch Shepard while Ares is a German Shepard/Belgium Malamar mix.

When the canine program first started for the YPD, the cost of Babe was about \$4,000. The department spent \$7,000 on Grief and \$8,000 on Ares. Foote noted that the current cost of a police dog is nearly \$9,000 because of all the training that goes into preparing the dog for police service. Those costs don't include the cost of the 16-week training com-

pleted in Sioux Falls. Nolz noted that Grief is coming to the end of his

service with the YPD. "I think that we will be retiring Grief in the more short-term future." he said. 'Once that happens, we will begin the process of purchasing another dog and then going through the train-

The 16-week training is completed with the police handler as well as the dog. Once certified, the dogs and handler must recertify every

"We never know what the test will be," Foote said. "We will do the written test, and then when they test the dogs, they will try to distract the dogs using different diversions. They are scored on how well the accurately find the hidden items.

Foote said that the dogs are such an important tool in what he does while on patrol that it would be impossible to identify how many cases the dogs are actively involved with each year. 'We use them in our

school searches, for sure that is probably what most of the students would be most familiar with," he said. "Yet they are with us every day, every case because they are in the car with us. Many times they will indicate something before we have even asked

the suspect about it.' Foote added that the dogs save the department a lot of

time, particularly when doing searches. "It will take the dogs,

maybe an hour, to search a school and parking lot," he said. "They are very tired when they are done; it is a lot of work for them. Because of that, we will usually bring in other dogs from the Highway Patrol to help with the searches. Likewise, we will go help them when they are

doing searches.' Nolz said being a part of the canine unit has been a

dream for both he and Foote. "I enjoy working with the dogs," he said. "It is something we both always wanted to do. When we are out in the community, we want people to not be afraid to come up and talk to us and learn about Ares and Grief. But we also want them to be aware that the dogs are trained to protect us if attacked, so not to come running up to the dogs.'
