# Mystery Overheating In Pickup May Be All In His Head (Gasket)

**Dear Tom and Ray:**  
I have a 1993 Toyota pickup truck, a 4-cylinder base model. It keeps overheating. Usually it happens in the morning and on the way home. Once it is running awhile, it seems to run at a normal temperature, according to the gauge. I had the thermostat replaced twice and the water pump replaced. I had the system flushed and re-filled twice. Nobody knows what it is. This is a great truck, with 200,000 miles on it. The mechanic at the shop wants to buy it from me since it has almost no rust on the frame or elsewhere. I'm grasping at straws. Could it be some type of sensor? I get lots of hot heat in the cabin when it's overheating. What do you suggest I do next?

**TOM:** When you take it back to your mechanic again, Mel, write "For Sale" on the windshield.

**RAY:** Actually, since you're obviously attached to this truck, I'm going to recommend some exploratory surgery.

**TOM:** My guess is that you have either a bad head gasket or a cracked head.

**RAY:** Having a cracked head is far worse. I mean, look at my brother.

**TOM:** What's happening is that right after you start the car — in the morning or in the evening — the very hot exhaust gases created inside the cylinders are getting through a breach in the cylinder head gasket or the cylinder head, and they're getting into the water jacket (the passages inside the cylinder head that carry the coolant).

**RAY:** Once those exhaust gases — which are several hundred degrees Fahrenheit — mix with the coolant, they heat the absolute bejebebers out of it.

**TOM:** It's possible that once the whole engine gets hot, things expand and the

hole in the head gasket or the crack in the cylinder head closes up. That allows the cooling system to catch up and get the engine back down to normal temperature — until the next time you start the cold engine.

**RAY:** But eventually, that breach will get bigger and it won't close up at all, and your truck will overheat all the time. And then you'll warp the head and fry the main bearings, and even your mechanic won't want to buy the truck from you then. So you need to fix this, Mel.

**TOM:** If the truck is mechanically sound, other than the overheating (a question your mechanic should help you answer on a 20-plus-year-old truck with 200,000 miles), then I'd pay your guy 300-400 bucks to remove the head and see what's going on.

**RAY:** Once the head is off, he might see a clear breach in the head gasket. That'd be the best-case scenario, and I'd say there's an 80 percent chance that that's what he'll find. Then he cleans up the head, replaces the head gasket, puts the engine back together, charges you \$1,000 for the whole job and sends you on your merry way.

**TOM:** If he doesn't see a tear in the gasket, then it's likely that your head is

cracked. At that point, you'll have three options.

**RAY:** Option one is to buy a used head. Then the whole job will run you about \$1,500, since there's a lot of work to be done prepping a used head for installation.

**TOM:** Option two is to buy a used engine. Believe it or not, that would cost about the same. You've already disconnected most of the stuff to pull off the head. And it's such a simple job on this truck that even after you pay a few hundred bucks for a used engine, you'll still get out for about \$1,500, maybe a little less.

**RAY:** And if you go that route, you'd also be smart to replace the clutch while the engine is removed. The extra labor at that point is trivial, and for a few hundred bucks more, you'll walk away with a brand-new clutch, too.

**TOM:** Option three is to turn to the mechanic and say, "Hey Frank, any chance you still want to buy this?"

**RAY:** So see if it's the head gasket. If it's not, I'd put a used engine in it. Then you'll be stylin', Mel.

up with old friends instead of getting something done. They came up with a daytime program over coffee, and 1 Million Cups was born.

A wide range of cities have launched their own chapters, including Chicago, Detroit, Anchorage, Omaha, Des Moines and Cedar Falls, Iowa. Others in South Dakota include Brookings and Sioux Falls.

The group, which meets at 9 a.m. Wednesdays at the Avera Professional Pavilion, has a standard meeting layout according to Hanten.

"One or two businesses pitch what they're doing, what problem they're solving, why they're the best to do it and what struggles they're running into," he said. "They have six minutes to do that, and then it's 20 minutes of feedback, advice and questions from the crowd."

The audience is primarily made up of local business and civic leaders that impart their advice on entrepreneurs. Hanten said it helps to

bring attention to these new businesses.

"The community gets to see people who are doing really cool things right in their own community who might be invisible otherwise," he said. "And the startup founder gets advice from the business community and feedback so that they're not just working alone."

He added that another business venture inspired him to bring the program here.

"I have another business called Think 29 where we're trying to connect entrepreneurs throughout this region," he said. "I had actually been a presenter at some of these other 1 Million Cups (events). I've presented at Sioux Falls, Brookings and Fargo. When I saw that it was working at Brookings, in particular, it made me think that Yankton could do it, too. Brookings has got a lot going for it, but it's smaller and they were having big crowds and an engaged community. I thought, 'If they can do it, we can do it too.'"

One of those helping Hanten bring the organization to Yankton is Carla Hummel, director of volunteer services at Avera Sacred Heart Hospital. She had been involved with

Think 29 and said that experience helped draw her into the process.

"It took a while to make the time to go to the coffee on Friday mornings with Think 29," she said. "When I started going and just making it a part of my calendar, what I found was it was a group of people, instead of just talking about what the issues are in Yankton — it was, 'What can we do about them?'"

Hummel said Yankton holds an advantage over other communities that don't have a similar program.

"I think it brings everybody together that needs to come together, have the conversations and get that action put together instead of working as (solo) saying I'll do this or I'll do that," she said. "It gets everybody talking about what they can do together. Together we can do more."

During last Wednesday's meeting, which featured Monte Froehlich of U.S. Property presenting plans for the old Post Office building on Walnut St., nearly 100 people attended. This was the group's second Yankton meeting.

She added the group has been well received everywhere it's gone.

"It has grown in almost every community that it is in," she said. "Brookings, Fargo, Sioux Falls have all grown - in fact, they've moved locations because they've had so many people show up that they've been bigger than what they

had room for."

Hanten said the program is also intended to get out information on opportunities that might otherwise be missed.

"I think for Yankton, there are a lot of gaps that we have in attracting second incomes," he said. "We might be good at creating manufacturing jobs for one person in the family, but what's the spouse going to do? I think 1 Million Cups helps by showing there are other opportunities available right here in Yankton. We know about the big employers in town, but do we know about the small businesses and the startups? I'm hoping that helps us bring more people to town and prevent others from leaving."

He added he hopes the Yankton area gets to see the impact this group can have in the near future.

"If you fast-forward a year from now, hopefully we will see a couple of businesses that were trying to launch, had the courage to get out there, present to a group and really get their business off the hump," he said.

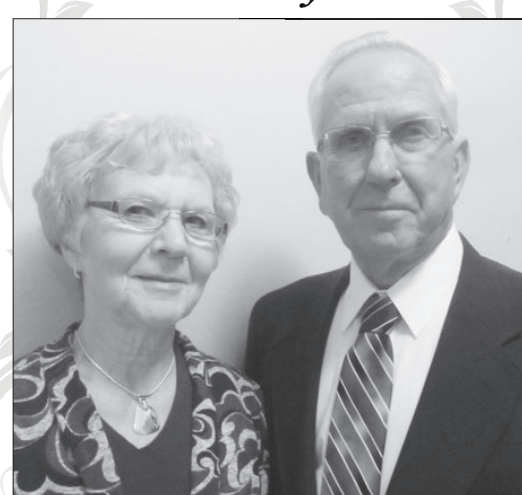
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## 50th Anniversary Celebration
