Nov. 9-15 Is Nurse Practioner Week

SIOUX FALLS — South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard has declared Nov. 9-15 as Nurse Practitioner Week in South Dakota. South Dakota is home to 627 Certified Nurse Practitioners. Of these 627 practitioners, 53 percent are employed in a clinical setting.

Nurse Practitioner Association of South Dakota President Jan Purcell states, "I encourage all South Dakotans to recognize the immeasurable contributions nurse practitioners make to the health and well-being of South Dakotans. We also want to thank Gov. Dau-

gaard for recognizing the importance of nurse practitioners to South Dakotans." In South Dakota, nurse

practitioners are able to assess, diagnose, prescribe and manage patients with acute and chronic conditions as long as the nurse practitioner has a Collaborative Agreement with a physician. Nationally, 64 percent of people surveyed have seen a nurse practitioner for a health care need.

Nurse practitioners provide care to patients in primary, ambulatory and acute care settings and work in urban, frontier and rural

Goverment **Operations And** Audit Committee To Meet Nov. 13

PIERRE — The Legislature's Government Operations and Audit Committee will hold the sixth meeting of the 2014 interim on Nov. 13, in Pierre. The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in Room 413 of the State Capitol. The Government Opera-

tions and Audit Committee, chaired by Sen. Larry Tidemann (R-Brookings) and vice-chair Rep. Dan Dryden (R-Rapid City), will review the 2014 annual report from the State 911 Coordinator. The committee will discuss the use of performance measures with the De-partment of Health. The Department of Agriculture will provide follow-up information on food safety measures for unpasteurized dairy products and the results of the Department's meetings with producers. The Department of Social Services will update the committee on the Medicaid management information system project. The Board of Regents will discuss changes made to the contract authorization process. The committee will review written responses to committee questions about the EB-5 program from Joop Bollen, President of SDRC, Inc. The meeting is open to the public.
