THUMBS DOWN, obviously, to the far-too-early arrival of winter, which showed up this week with bitter cold temperatures and strong winds (but fortunately, little snow in the Yankton area). Just last week, most of us where wearing light jackets or lightweight fall coats as a wonderfully mild October melted into November.

But now we've gone straight to the Arctic gear, with high temperatures this week ranging 20 to 30 degrees below normal. It turns out this is NOT a polar vortex, as some have reported; rather, it's been caused by a typhoon that hit Alaska and forced a shift in the weather patterns. One big difference: Whereas the effects of the vortex only lasted here a couple of days, the current cold wave may last for many days or even weeks, according to some forecast models. And, we're still two weeks from Thanksgiving. This makes for a cold start to what could be a long winter season.

Comet Bashing



THUMBS DOWN to the sizable number of people who missed the point of the comet probe landing. For those out of the loop, the Philae probe landed this week on Comet Churyumov-Gerasimenko — a chunk of rock and ice roughly two miles long and a mile wide travelling at 84,000 mph and orbiting the sun once every 6 1/2 years.

Humans just managed to successfully land a complex mechanical contraption on that rock. But it was the European Space Agency's (ESA) contraption, so many Americans took to social media to lament the fact that it was supposedly the wrong set of humans making this great leap in science — that it should be America leading the charge into space. In The Dome Again

Times change, and yet it seems like the old days once again:

The Yankton Bucks are playing for a state football championship tonight in Vermillion. They face Brookings at 7:30 p.m. for the Class 11AA crown.

It's been nine years since Yankton last made the DakotaDome trip. For the most diehard YHS fans, that interval may have felt like forever.

That's because tremendous expectations of Yankton football are a given. They are as much an autumn ritual here as falling leaves and jack-o'-lanterns glowing in the dusk.

Poducing just two losing seasons in 55 years will do that for you. Not even going nine years without a dome berth — which indeed seems like a relative eternity for a program that has won 11 state titles since 1960, or an average of one championship every five years or so — can dim that grand glow.

But in a way, that legacy is a secondary point. It's all in the past.

This is about now — this is about tonight. It's all a little different, at least for me. Speaking of the past as a long-ago sports editor, I notice that a lot has changed in high

school football the last few years. There is this issue, for instance, of Yankton playing tonight, on a Friday, instead of the Saturday night finale. An additional class has been added for the biggest of the state's big schools, with YHS slotted in the second-largest class. Friday night lights, indeed.

Unquestionably, the Sioux Falls schools have dominated high school football recently, capturing numerous titles since the turn of the new century. The splitting of the top class into two was an idea that was actually lobbied for by some Yankton officials, I've been told, because it was felt that schools like YHS could

 ever — is to use the size issue as an excuse. Some fans and former (and perhaps current) players here still want to face the Sioux Falls schools and have that shot at the best the state can offer.

Especially this year, this so-far undefeated autumn of the Bucks.

It would have been interesting to see what Yankton could have done in the old playoff format. Holding victories over Sioux Falls O'Gorman, Brandon Valley, Aberdeen Central and Rapid City Stevens this fall, it seems these Bucks can play with those 11AAA schools after all. Just like the old days.

That says a lot for this group of players and coaches. This year's team has gutted out some clutch victories, it has dominated when it should have, and it even won its homecoming game on the road (which, of course, is something all those other great YHS teams could never claim). This team has shown a lot of character — in short, it's a typical Bucks football team.

And the fans have shown their appreciation in return. Yankton sold out its allotted 1,900 tickets for tonight's game very quickly, and the school was able to get a few more to meet the demand. In Brookings, meanwhile, just 900 tickets for the game were sold by the end of Wednesday. There's no question that Yankton's devout fan base has been as much a part of the Bucks' football success through all the years as the players, the coaches and Crane Youngworth Field. That will be loudly evident in the dome tonight, I'll bet.

In the scheme of things, these Bucks have earned the right to stand with all those great teams and great players of the venerated past. And if they win tonight, they will have run the table in 2014; it would be the eighth undefeated season in those 55 years of superlative success.

So, the landscape may be different, but the game is still the same.

Yes, times change — but tonight, it will seem if nothing has changed at all. Because it really

IN HISTORY

By The Associated Press Today is Friday, Nov. 14, the 318th day of 2014. There are 47 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History: On Nov. 14, 1889, inspired by the Jules Verne novel "Around the World in Eighty Days," New York World reporter Nellie Bly (Eliza-beth Cochrane) set out to make the trip in less time than the fictional Phileas Fogg. (She completed the journey in 72 days.) Ja-warharlal Nehru, the first prime minister of India, was born.

On this date: In 1851, Herman Melville's novel "Moby-Dick; Or, The Whale" was first published in the United States.

In 1910, Eugene B. Ely became the first aviator to take off from a ship as his Curtiss pusher rolled off a sloping platform on the deck of the scout cruiser USS Birmingham off Hampton Roads, Virginia. In 1922, the British Broadcasting Co. be-

gan its domestic radio service. In 1940, during World War II, German

planes destroyed most of the English town

of Coventry. In 1944, Tommy Dorsey and his orches-tra recorded "Opus No. 1" for RCA Victor.

In 1954, the president of Egypt, Muham-mad Naguib, was deposed by the Revolutionary Command Council, leaving Gamal Abdel Nasser fully in charge as acting head of state. In 1969, Apollo 12 blasted off for the

moon. In 1970, a chartered Southern Airways DC-9 crashed while trying to land in West Virginia, killing all 75 people on board, in-cluding the Marshall University football team and its coaching staff.

In 1972, the Dow Jones Industrial Aver-age closed above the 1,000 level for the first

time, ending the day at 1,003.16. In 1986, the Securities and Exchange Commission imposed a \$100 million pen-alty against inside-trader Ivan F. Boesky and barred him from working again in the securities industry. In 1990, it was revealed that the pop

duo Mili Vanili (Rob Pilatus and Fabrice Morvan) had done none of the singing on their Grammy-winning debut album "Girl You Know It's True." In 1997, a jury in Fairfax, Virginia, decid-

ed that Pakistani national Aimal Khan Kasi should get the death penalty for gunning down two CIA employees outside agency headquarters. Five years later on this date,

Aimal Khan Kasi was executed. Ten years ago: Mahmoud Abbas, successor to Yasser Arafat, escaped unharmed when militants firing assault rifles burst into a mourning tent for the deceased Palestinian leader in Gaza, killing two security guards.
