The Yankton Bucks football team is looking for a return to the promised land as they challenge the Brookings Bobcats for the 11AA state championship game tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. in the DakotaDome in Vermillion.

"We have a lot of heart," Yankton head football coach Arlin Likness said. "For us to be undefeated with our schedule going into the state championship is remarkable. But we have the most important game left — the one we have been preparing ourselves for all season."

In the last two weeks the Bucks (10-0) stormed through the playoffs with a 43-21 victory over Huron and a 27-0 victory over Harrisburg in the semi-finals

'Our defense has been solid all year," Likness said. "They took it to another level, and to hold an offense like Harrisburg to zero points is outstanding. It's great momentum heading into the Dome.'

Senior quarterback Mason Strahl is also 94 yards away from becoming the all-time career passer at Yankton High School.

"Winning the game is what is more important," Strahl said. "If I can get the record and the win, it would be awesome. I'm just trying to do whatever I can to help win this football game.

Brookings (8-2) defeated Watertown 34-13 and defending champions Pierre 27-7 to punch its ticket

"Pierre came out and gave us their best shot," Brookings head coach Lee Schmidt said. "They have a good team, but our kids kept their nose to the ground and fought through it.'

The Bobcats came into this season with a lot of hype and expectations, but Schmidt said they have embraced it all throughout the season.

"This group wanted to change the landscape of things and really, the bullseye on our back helped us," he said. "It made us a stronger team and got us ready for situations like we're about to face.'

Brookings, like Yankton, has a strong senior class. The Bobcats are led by 16 seniors, some of whom have played three years at the varsity level. We have had our high's and low's this season,"
