Since July 1, 2013, 186 children in South Dakota were adopted through the Department of Social Services; sev-eral other adoptions also took place through independent and private agencies throughout the state.

These children range widely in age and may have physical or emotional challenges, developmental disabilities or are part of sibling groups, who all need a place to call home. It is a DSS priority to place children in homes that will be able to provide for their individual needs.

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
