

Santee College Application Event Set

SANTEE, Neb. — Seniors at Santee Community School will take a critical step in the college preparation process when they participate in a College Application event Wednesday, Nov. 19, at the school.

The event is part of a pilot program of Nebraska's College Application Week led by EducationQuest Foundation with help from college and high school representatives from across the state. Six Nebraska high schools were selected to participate in this first year of what will become an annual statewide effort to get all high school seniors to apply to at least one college.

"Through this program, we encourage all seniors to complete a college application — even those who don't think college is possible," EducationQuest Assistant Vice President Eric Drumbheller said. "By going through the application process, students often realize the possibilities that college can offer and go on to pursue education beyond high school."

Representatives from Santee Community School, area colleges and EducationQuest will be on hand to help students through the application process.

"Completing a college application can be overwhelming for many students — especially those who don't get help at home," Santee Community School Student Services Director Brenda Leader said. "We're excited to be part of a program that will encourage more students to consider postsecondary education."

Nebraska's College Application Week is part of the American College Application Week initiative sponsored by the American Council on Education. All states are now participating in the annual program. States that have participated in previous years are finding that as many as 79 percent who students who submit a college application go on to attend college.

Supreme Court will rule on the issue, the justices tend to defer to the lower courts' decisions, said Anthony Schutz, a University of Nebraska associate law professor.

"The separation of powers argument is a pretty powerful argument," Schutz said. "We've spent a lot of time since the early 1900s finding ways to distribute executive power, and the governor is left with a fairly limited realm of authority."

The high court has two justices appointed by Heineman, a Republican, and five by former Democratic Gov. Ben Nelson.

Project supporters say the pipeline should now be ready to go forward even if TransCanada has to seek the

state's approval once again.

"We believe the federal government has taken entirely too long to make a decision. I don't see any issue with the Senate voting on it and the president approving it" before the Nebraska issue is resolved, said Ron Kaminski, business manager for the Laborers' Local No. 1140, an Omaha-based union that supports the project.

Nebraska officials became supportive of the pipeline after TransCanada agreed to change the route to avoid the ecologically sensitive Sandhills region in the remote northern part of the state. In 2012, the Republican-controlled Legislature passed a law allowing Heineman to give the go-ahead.

But opponents have charged that the state constitution gives that power to the Nebraska Public Service Commission.

The elected commission regulates "common carriers"

that are used to transport goods, energy and people. The panel includes four Republicans and one Democrat. The commission generally takes about seven months to approve or deny an application, said Dave Domina, an attorney for the landowners.

The Nebraska attorney general's office has argued that the 2012 law was constitutional.

The resistance to the pipeline remains strongest in Nebraska on the pipeline's route. Governments of the other states have been supportive, citing the construction jobs it would create. A majority of Nebraska residents now support the pipeline, according to independent surveys, but pipeline opponents say 115 of 515 Nebraska landowners along the proposed route have refused to sign agreements with the company.

Even if the project wins final approval, property own-

ers want assurance that money will be set aside for land restoration in the event of any leaks, said Jane Kleeb, executive director of Bold Nebraska, a leading opposition group.

Kleeb said she's still hopeful Obama will veto legislation that approves the Keystone XL.

"I have no option but to be optimistic," Kleeb said. "These farmers are the reason I do this every day."

Dan Frost, a Denver attorney who specializes in pipelines and infrastructure projects, said regulatory agencies like Nebraska's Public Service Commission would subject a project to a more thorough review than a governor would.

"Generally speaking, they're less politically charged and more technical in nature," Frost said. "...I think they're more inclined to look at the project's technical merits."

released Sunday did not show the decapitation of Kassig or the moments leading up to his death.

"This is Peter Edward Kassig, a U.S. citizen ... who fought against the Muslims in Iraq," said the black-clad militant, who spoke with a British accent that was distorted in the video, apparently to disguise his identity. Previous videos featured a militant with a British accent that the FBI says it has identified, though it hasn't named him publicly.

The footage released Sunday identifies the militants' location as Dabiq, a town in northern Syria that the Islamic State group uses as the title of its English-language propaganda magazine and where they believe an apocalyptic battle between Muslims and their enemies will occur.

The high-definition video also showed the beheadings of about a dozen men identi-

fied as Syrian military officers and pilots, all dressed in blue jumpsuits. The black-clad militant warns that U.S. soldiers will meet a similar fate.

"We say to you, Obama: You claim to have withdrawn from Iraq four years ago," the militant said. "Here you are: You have not withdrawn. Rather, you hid some of your forces behind your proxies." A U.S.-led coalition is targeting the Islamic State group in airstrikes, supporting Western-backed Syrian rebels, Kurdish fighters and the Iraqi military.

Kassig, who served in the U.S. Army's 75th Ranger Regiment, a special operations unit, deployed to Iraq in 2007. After being medically discharged, he returned to the Middle East in 2012 and formed a relief group, Special Emergency Response and Assistance, to aid Syrian refugees.

A certified EMT, Kassig had delivered food and medical supplies and provided trauma care to wounded Syrians before being captured in eastern Syria on Oct. 1, 2013. Friends say he converted to Islam in captivity and took the first name Abdul-Rahman.

In a statement issued as he flew back to Washington from the Asia-Pacific region, Obama said Kassig "was a humanitarian who worked to save the lives of Syrians injured and dispossessed" by war. The president offered prayers and condolences to Kassig's family.

"We cannot begin to imagine their anguish at this painful time," he said.

Burhan Agha, a Syrian who worked with Kassig in Lebanon, wept when recounting his friend's humanitarian work.

"If I could apologize to each American, one by one, I would, because Peter died in Syria, while he was helping the Syrian people," Agha told The

Associated Press by telephone from Switzerland, where he is seeking asylum. "Those who killed him claimed to have done it in the name of Islam. I am a Muslim and am from Syria. ... (His killers) are not Muslims."

British Prime Minister David Cameron said he was "horrified by the cold-blooded murder," saying that the Islamic State group had "again shown their depravity."

In previous videos showing the beheadings of the two American journalists and two British aid workers, the hostages were shown kneeling in orange jumpsuits as they were forced to make speeches before their killer lifted a knife to their throats.
