WALL ST. RECAP

Major U.S. indexes closed marginally higher, setting another high for the Standard & Poor's 500 index.

The latest milestone for the S&P 500 came on a day when the major U.S. stock indexes mostly hovered between small gains and losses as investors weighed the implications of an economic slowdown in Japan that worsened in the third quarter into a recession. Energy stocks fell as the price of crude oil resumed its slide.

ON MONDAY:

The Dow Jones industrial average gained 13.01 points, or 0.1 percent, to 17,647.75.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 1.50 points, or 0.1 percent, to end at 2,041.32.

The Nasdaq composite fell 17.54 points, or 0.4 percent, to 4,671.

FOR THE YEAR:

The Dow is up 1,071.09 points, or 6.5 percent.

The S&P 500 index is up 192.96 points, or 10.4 percent.

The Nasdaq is up 494.41 points, or 11.8 percent.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for Dec delivery fell 9 cents to \$5.5375 a bushel; Dec corn was 3.75 cents lower at 3.9050 a bushel; Dec oats fell 2.50 cents to \$3.39 a bushel; while Jan soybeans advanced 13.75 cents to \$10.3625 a bushel.

Beef was higher and pork was lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Dec live cattle rose .83 cent to \$1.7210 a pound; Jan feeder cattle was 1.35 cents higher at \$2.3747 a pound; while Dec lean hogs were .13 cent lower at \$.9262 a pound.

MMC Nursing Program Sponsors Symposium

The Mount Marty College nursing program will welcome Susan Luparell, Ph.D., ACNS-BC, CNE as the keynote speaker at the 2014 Endowed Chair Nursing Symposium with the topic of, "Incivility in Healthcare." A morning and a repeated afternoon session will be held on Thursday, Nov. 20, at the Avera Sacred Heart Hospital Professional Office Pavilion in Yankton.

The purpose of the program is to provide nurses, nursing students and nursing faculty hands on strategies and techniques to prevent and deal with uncivil interactions. Participants will discuss general prevalence and types of incivility in the classroom, consider the causes and consequences of incivility from multiple perspectives, and consider rationale for addressing incivility in an assertive manner.

Attendees will also be able to describe proactive strategies for minimizing the occurrence of incivility, identify reactive strategies for dealing with problematic behavior, and create personal action plan for improving the overall learning environment.

Luparell is a nationally recognized speaker and author on the topic of incivility in nursing education. An associate professor at Montana State University, Luparell is involved in both the baccalaureate and graduate nursing programs and has received several commendations for excellence in teaching. Her scholarship focuses on the ethical implications of incivility, including how it affects others and how it can be managed in academic as well as in clinical settings. Prior to joining

the faculty ranks, Luparell practiced as a critical care clinical nurse specialist.

This continuing nursing education workshop is provided by NurseTim, Inc. Participants who attend either the morning or afternoon full workshop and complete the evaluation will be awarded 3.0 hours of nursing continuing education. NurseTim, Inc. is accredited as a provider of continuing nursing education by the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation.
