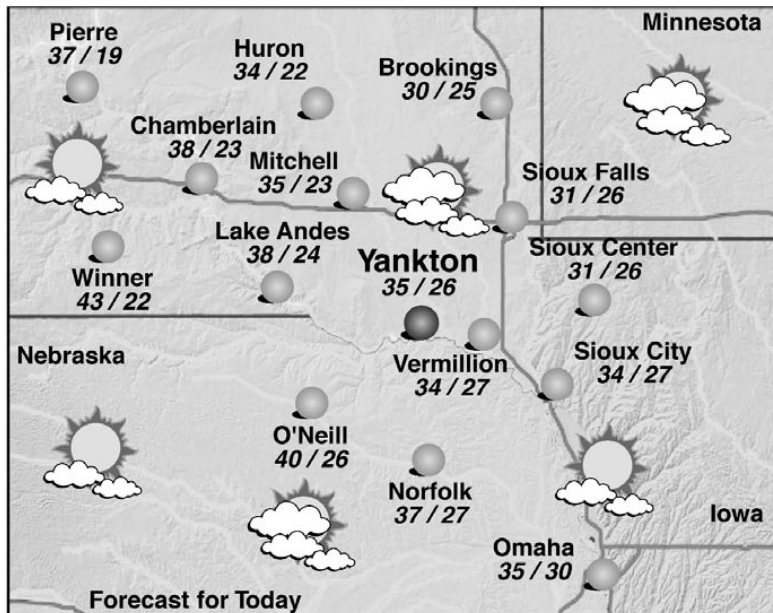

Medical Marijuana Summit Planned

SIoux FALLS — Proponents for medical marijuana legislation invite area lawmakers and the public to attend a legislative summit on Nov. 22 at the Downtown Main Library Meeting Room A, 200 N. Dakota Ave., Sioux Falls. This free event runs from 10 a.m.-1 p.m.

The goal of the event is to discuss preparations for the upcoming legislative session.

The South Dakota Medical Marijuana Summit is a grassroots educational and organizing event for area patients and advocates coming together and accelerating the movement to change state law. Cancer, MS, glaucoma and many other patients of various conditions will call on community leaders to provide a responsible and compassionate plan for safe access to medical marijuana. The three-hour event will feature an informal meet and greet for patients and their families, a short documentary screening, an expert panel discussion and various workshops to inform and train volunteers.

The medical marijuana summit is an opportunity to learn about the science, culture and laws surrounding medical marijuana and will equip supporters with the information and skills needed to be effective advocates. Various regulations and policy approaches will be debated and considered. Elected officials and anyone interested from South Dakota is invited to attend and may inquire about the event or medical marijuana legislation by contacting either Melissa Mentele or Emmett Reistrotter.

A subsequent legislative summit is being planned for a later date in Rapid City.

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. stocks recovered from an early slide to close modestly higher on Thursday, sending the Dow Jones industrial average and Standard & Poor's 500 index to new highs. The Dow has now eked out two record-high closes this week, while the S&P 500 has notched three. Investors were encouraged by good news on housing, the job market and corporate earnings.

"It had been 20 years since the church was used for the wedding," Schroeder said. "The church used to hold wedding at other locations because the church was just too small."

Mutschelknaus said that the immediate family of the bride and grooms would take up most of the space in the old church.

"Attendants that we were not able to get everyone in," he said.

Funerals were also a challenge.

"For a long time we were unable to have funerals at the church," Schroeder said. "We would borrow other churches because they had more space. Getting a casket up those old steps was not easy."

Schroeder said that the new church is now able to hold 260 people, while the old church was only able to hold 130.

"That doesn't include the new fellowship hall that is set for 160 people to eat," he said. "I'm sure if you wanted to you could fit about 400 people in here for service."

Church secretary, Sara Schaeffer said that every single member of the congregation has put a lot of time and thought into every room in the new building.

"We talked and discussed

every possible way we could possibly make the church better," she said.

When starting the building process, the church asked its members what they could commit.

"The congregation is made up of 75 members," Schaeffer said. "Right away, they committed \$100,000 among them. It's pretty remarkable."

Schroeder said that many people who aren't even members have been giving them gifts as well.

"A bunch of people have donated that don't have much to do with the church," Schroeder said. "But they see what we are doing and encourage us."

Schaeffer said that so far the church has stayed on their budget, and there hasn't been any surprise expenses yet.

"We don't have all the final numbers in yet," she said. "But so far, what has been spent has come pretty close to our budget."

But it wasn't just money that made this project possible.

"Whether it was borrowing their machinery or helping build or cleaning — people have just stepped up," Schaeffer said. "I think that the way this all played out has just

been amazing. Even the land that this church sits on is an amazing story in itself."

Originally, the church thought that it owned only a small portion of land south of the church.

"In the process of building and doing some research at the courthouse, we found out that the church owned an extra half of an acre," Schaeffer said.

The land was deeded to the church in 1946 to build a school. Throughout the decades, the land was forgotten about.

"Decades and decades ago, God was already setting these plans in motion," Schaeffer said. "Everything that we have needed has been set up for us: The people to do it, the places to put it and all the resources. We just had to organize it."

Schroeder said that it is clear that he is not the one in charge.

"It's God's hands," he said. "It goes beyond what we ever have ever expected."

Though Martinus Lutheran congregation has a new church, the are not planning to forget about the old one.

"We are not just leaving the old church behind. We are continuing it," Schroeder said. "A lot of people ask what we

are going to do with the old church because people often see it as a landmark," he said. "But we do, too. We have no plan to get rid of it. It stands as a monument from the past. It is nice to be in the new church and still see the old one."

The church has even taken the altar, pews, light fixtures, stained glass windows and other items from the old church to put in the new one.

"We wanted it to feel like the old church," Schaeffer said.

Many of the wood items were refinished by Mike Duff-free State Prison inmates in Springfield.

"The also made the kitchen cabinets," Schroeder said. "They did such a nice job. For a non-profit they are able to do so much. It was good for them and that are really a blessing to the church."

Schroeder said that the church would not have been made without such an amazing congregation and community.

"It has been remarkable," he said. "Praise God."
