Dakota Valley Opens Class A Title **Defense With Sweep Of Pheasants**

WATERTOWN — Dakota Valley took its first step toward repeating as the state Class A volleyball champion with a 3-0 victory over Redfield-Doland Thursday afternoon in the Civic Arena.

The fifth-seeded Panthers took down the fourth-seeded Pheasants 25-14, 25-19 and 25-11 in the opening round of the tournament.

Dakota Valley (23-3) will meet top-seeded Šioux Falls Christian in the semifinals tonight (Friday) at 6 p.m.

That was a really good match to get the cobwebs out on and get some state-tournament experience," Dakota Valley head coach Rick Pruett said. "We start three freshman, so we are pretty young and we got them into the swing of things in a state tournament."

Despite the seeding, the

Pheasants were prepared for a tough battle.

'Dakota Valley is the defending champion for a reason, they are a very good team." Redfield-Doland head coach Joel Osborn said. "We knew going in we were the underdog and had talked about that as a team."

The match opened with Elizabeth Lammers, one of the Panthers' freshmen, slamming a pair of kills and notching an ace. Senior Emma Tuttle connected for three of her team-high five aces to help Dakota Valley build an 18-10 lead on the way to the opening-set victory.

We stayed calm and eliminated unforced errors,' Pruett said. "We are very aggressive in our serving.

The Panthers definitely created problems for Redfield-Doland.

The biggest area we struggled with was our serve receive," Osborn said. "We couldn't get the ball to our setter."

The second set was closer with the teams trading the lead and finally being tied 15-15. From there, the Panthers went on a 10-4 run to seal the

Redfield-Doland again broke out in the third set, keeping it close early. After a 5-5 tie, Dakota Valley went on a 17-5 run to close out the match.

The Panthers finished with 29 kills, 18 assists, 30 digs ,13 aces and two blocks. Lammers tallied eight kills while her twin sister Meredith totaled six. Senior Lindsey Smith finished with 17 assists and nine digs.
Redfield-Doland tallied 16

kills, 15 assists, three aces, 31 digs and one block.

Senior Danielle Levtzow lead the team with five kills. Juniors Sarah Rozell and

Jamie Tebben accounted for four kills each. Junior Allison Tschetter added 12 assists and senior Roni Levtzow eight digs.


The Pheasants (24-5) will meet fellow Northeast Conference foe Sisseton in the consolation semifinals at noon today (Friday).

Friday evening's first match will be the third of the season between Dakota Valley and Sioux Falls Christian. The Chargers won the first two meetings this year.

Dakota Valley also was 0-2 in the regular season last year against Sioux Falls Christian before snapping the Chargers' three-year reign as the state Class A champion with a semifinal victory in the state tournament.

I hope it is like last year and the third time is the charm," Pruett said. "It is going to be a battle of two really good teams.'

For the third time this season, the Watertown Arrows volleyball team defeated the Harrisburg Tigers. The Arrows defeated the Tigers in three sets by the scores of 25-15, 25-19, 25-20 on Thursday evening in the opening round of the AA state volleyball tournament at the Summit Activities Center in Yankton.

'This was such a big confidence booster for these girls," Watertown head coach Kim Rohde said. They're a team you can't take lightly. We've played them three

To start the match, Watertown (20-4) came firing on all cylinders. Early off, they took a 4-1 lead, showing consistency on both aspects of the game.
