Pheasants Outlast Arlington In Class B Opener

ABERDEEN - It turned out to be as good as advertised.

In a match that featured 28 ties, 10 lead changes and a ton of momentum swings, Parker finally subdued Arlington 23-25, 25-23, 18-25, 25-23, 15-10 in the opening round of the State B volleyball tournament Thursday afternoon. The match at Golden Eagles Arena included the two winningest coaches in state history and pitted the fourth and fifth seeds against each other.

That was a really emotional win for us, because to be perfectly honest I'm not even sure how we did it in the end," said Parker coach Jill Christensen, who raised her state record win total to 725 career victories. "The girls just pulled together and came up with some really great plays when we needed them

The fifth set was tied at 2,

3, 4, 5, and 6 before the Pheasants eventually gained control. Parker was able to take advantage of three missed serves down the stretch to help fuel the win.

'We just weren't able to connect there at the end to get the win," said Arlington coach Anita Boeck. "I thought we had way too many errors in the last one.'

Interestingly enough, it was serving that proved pivotal in a previous five-setter between the two squads.

"A couple of years ago when we were in the state tournament and got beat by them in five sets, that's kind of what doomed us in the fifth set was a few missed serves," Christensen recalled. "And today it kind of turned around the other direction."

The momentum turned around many directions throughout the most recent slugfest. Parker bolted out to a 7-0 lead in the opening set and led 19-9 before the Cardinals exploded for a dramatic comeback victory.

Parker again led for a good share of the second set, only to have Arlington creep to within 23-22 before the Pheasants held on.

Arlington controlled the third set and put the pressure back on Parker, which responded by pulling out a tight fourth set which was tied at 19, 21 and 23.

'We have talked all year about trying to finish," Chris-tensen said. "Obviously, we didn't finish in that first one, so that was tough to take, but they just hung in there and they never gave up and found a way to pull it out."

A big key was staying calm, according to Parker middle hitter Contessa Harold.

"We just need to keep steady," she said."We just have to keep it cool. It was crazv.

At 6-foot-3, Harold poses a major problem for opposing defenses and the junior had three solo blocks and one as-
