You already know where you'll sit this Thanksgiving. Your chair is at the kids' table, just


like it always is. Your brothers and sisters, your mom's friend's kids, all you youngsters (as Grandma calls you), even your favorite cousin will be there, too. There's just no way to avoid it unless, as in "The Great Thanksgiving Escape" by Mark Fearing, you can run... fast!

Grandma's house. Another Thanksgiving. Gavin was so not excited.

As soon as they got there, his mother sent him straightaway to the kid's room where all the cousins were — even the babies. She said they'd let him know when it was time to eat. Before he walked away, Gavin's dad said to have fun!

Right. Like that was ever going to happen in a roomful of babies.

But then, Gavin heard his cousin Rhonda, whispering. She was hiding beneath a pile of coats on a bed, and she had a daring suggestion: why didn't they just break out of the place? Sure, they could sneak away, maybe head for the



hills and cool it til dinnertime. Sometimes, she said firmly, "you have

to make your own fun." That sounded like a dandy idea to Gavin.

Silent, like ninjas, they crawled toward the front door because it seemed like the easiest way out - but it became quickly apparent that that wasn't going to work: the door was guarded by two huge, slobbering guard dogs. "RUN!" shouted Rhonda, and they did, right into a whole bunch of cheek-pinchers and bear-huggers.

Ugh. Gavin had bad memories of that from last Christmas.

But before they could get away, though, Rhonda was caught! Bravely and cleverly, she avoided that very close call and they fled for the back door - right

into another roadblock that was disgusting and possibly deadly, so they went yet another creepy, dark and smelly way, which led to something that's simply too scary to discuss.

Were they lost? Was there any way out? Could they keep from being sur-rounded, grabbed, or captured? Was there still time to make their getaway or did Rhonda and Gavin need to make entirely different plans?

Oh, sure. Who doesn't recall pretend games of grave danger on a rainy day, escaping fanciful Bad Guys and bravely fac-ing faux-peril around every corner? Give that a holiday spin, and you've got "The Great Thanksgiving Escape.

Yes, this is a kids' book, but I absolutely loved the imaginations and the naughty glee that author-illustrator Mark Fearing gives his main characters; there's so much mischief in every word and picture of this book that I lingered on the pages, just because I liked the rowdiness it implied. Is there an adult who won't remember that with fondness? I don't think so, and I don't think there's a kid who won't find it hilarious. If your household is like most,

Thanksgiving lasts just a day or two but this is a book that your 3-to-7-year-old will want. year-round. For both of you. "The Great Thanksgiving Escape" is a sure feast.

# **MMC Concert Band Performs Sunday Night**

The Mount Marty College Concert Band, directed by Dean Rettedal, will present the fall concert on Sunday, Nov. 23, at 7:30 p.m. in Marian Auditorium on the Mount Marty College campus. The concert is free and the public is invited. The band will open the con-



# **USD Theatre Presents Classic** Love Story 'Romeo And Juliet'

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota Department of Theatre presents William Shakespeare's tragedy "Romeo and Juliet," Nov. 21-23 and Dec. 3-7 at the Wayne S. Knutson Theatre of the Warren M. Lee Center for the Fine Arts.

The play begins in Verona where servants from the two feuding households, the Montagues and Capulets, begin to duel. Once the duel has been broken up, Romeo (Nick Akins of South Sioux City, Neb.) pines for his love Rosaline. His cousin Benvolio (Kristian Asfeldt of Sioux Falls) and friend Mercutio (Tony Garcia of Sioux City, Iowa) persuade Romeo into attending a ball at the Capulet's house, even though they are Montagues. While at the ball Romeo becomes enamored with Lord Capulet's daughter, Juliet (Ceci Quintero of Centennial, Colo.). Upon confessing their love for each other, Romeo and Juliet plan to marry hoping that their marriage will reconcile their feuding families. They elicit help from Friar Laurence (Casey Coates of Rapid City) who agrees to marry the young lovers. Before the two can

be married Tybalt (Jordan Mitchell of Omaha, Neb.) challenges Romeo to a duel. Mercutio takes Romeo's place and is killed by Tybalt, filled with rage Romeo turns on Tybalt, slaying him. Romeo is then banished from the city. Hearing the news of Romeo's banishment and desperate to avoid her

O Sole Trio consists of Erin Shields, soprano, Giuser Spolentini, baritone, and David Shenton, piano and violin. This is not necessarily a combination one thinks of for an intimate concert setting, but it works beautifully, weaving the styles and languages together into a dazzling musical tapestry.

The show is fast-paced, funny and touching, with two stellar voices and commanding accompaniment. The concert is an eclectic mixture that ranges from opera to pop, with all selections having a decidedly Italian flavor. While there is a set program, the atmosphere is informal: three friends getting together to make both music and merry.

Scale models will be displayed and operated during the open house. This will include models of steam locomotives from the 30's and 40's up to unit trains and Amtrak passenger trains of today.
