Protesters were arrested Thursday outside Ferguson police headquarters for the second night in a row after around 40 demonstrators blocked South Florissant Road. One of the three people arrested pushed an officer and was hit with pepper spray, according to St. Louis County Police spokesman Brian Schellman.

Calls for peace and restraint emanated from several quarters, including President Barack Obama, Attornev General Eric Holder and civil-rights leaders and business owners.

The most emotional appeal came from Brown's father, Michael Brown Sr.

"Hurting others or destroying property is not the answer," Brown said in the video released by the group STL Forward. "No matter what the grand jury decides, I don't want my son's death

to be in vain. I want it to lead to incredible change, positive change, change that makes the St. Louis region

better for everyone." Holder issued a general reminder to police to prepare for demonstrations and to "minimize needless con-

frontation." His video message did not explicitly mention Ferguson, but it did reference demonstrations over the past few months that have sought to bring attention to real and significant underlying issues involving police practices.'

"I know from firsthand experience that demonstrations like these have the potential to spark a sustained and positive national dialogue, to provide momentum to a necessary conversation and to bring about critical reform," Holder said in the video.

"But history has also shown us that the most successful and enduring movements for change are those that adhere to nonaggression and nonviolence," he added.

Eddie Hassaun of the civil rights group Justice Disciples urged protesters not to be confrontational and for police to follow suit.

South Dakota. Through its sliding fee program, Horizon offers reduced prices on office visits and services for qualify-

ing individuals. Springfield city finance officer Ashlea Pruss declined comment on the local clinic's closing. However, she said city officials are aware of the situation and will look at the community's future health care needs.

"We are meeting next week with our medical board to start discussing our options," she said.

LACK OF NUMBERS

Horizon chief operating officer Jeff Mengenhausen told the Press & Dakotan the clinic's closure was made based on patient numbers or lack of it. On some days, the clinic was seeing only two patients, he said.

"The clinic wasn't bringing enough patients," he said. "There weren't enough people to support the practice. The usage just wasn't there.'

Horizon's departure won't affect Mike Durfee State Prison in Springfield, he said. The medium-security prison operates under a contract with a different provider for medical care for the prison's 1,200 inmates, he said.

Horizon maintained adequate staffing at Springfield during its nearly five years of operating the facility, Mengenhausen said. However, the Springfield clinic lost its physician assistant, Paul Brown, when he accepted a position earlier this year at another Horizon facility, the James Valley Community Health Center

Dr. Mary Miller remained as the lone physician on the Springfield staff, Mengenhausen said. "It's hard keeping the clinic open with just the one provider," he said.

Horizon provided outside staff members who commuted to Springfield, Mengenhausen said. But with the Springfield clinic's uncertain future, staff members sought positions elsewhere, and it became difficult to recruit new staff, he added.

'You couldn't hold it against the staff," he said. Our staff had to take care of themselves. I wrote letters of recommendation for them." The clinic's sudden closure

came when the facility simply ran out of staff sooner than expected, he said.

"All my support staff was done Friday," he said. "The closest Horizon clinic is two hours away, so it's hard to send staff down to Spring-

Horizon officials had planned to give the Springfield clinic more time and then reevaluate the situation. Mengenhausen said.

'We had been talking in September about operating for six more months, until the February or March time frame, to make a final decision," he said. "But the staffing issues forced our hand, and it didn't make sense to continue.'

Mengenhausen admitted some Springfield residents may learn of the clinic's sudden closing through the Press & Dakotan article. However, he said Horizon officials had informed the Springfield mayor and city council this week, along with whatever patients

Many residents will learn of the clinic closure through word of mouth, he said. "It's a small community, so I'm sure the news will spread," he

added. Mengenhausen said he wished there had been more advance warning about the clinic's end of medical serv-

"It's not ideal (by) closing immediately, but we're happy to keep it administratively open," he said. "We are still doing the (prescription) refills, but we're not taking appointments. We will stay open through Dec. 19, but we may be closed next Wednesday, Thursday and Friday (for Thanksgiving)

LONG-TERM CHALLENGES

The Springfield clinic was struggling prior to Horizon's arrival, Mengenhausen said. An area doctor was facing difficulties running the clinic alone as a private practice, he added.

"The city approached us at Horizon and asked if we would take a look at it. We took over the practice, but we couldn't turn it around. The community wouldn't support it," Mengenhausen said. "We were losing money every single year. It was getting to the point on the business side where it didn't make sense."

The Springfield clinic's low patient numbers could be attributed to two major factors. Mengenhausen said, Quality medical care was available in

neighboring communities, and local patients were unwilling to switch from their current providers to the Springfield clinic, he said.

With the low patient numbers and financial issues at the Springfield clinic, Mengenhausen turned to two audiences in recent months.

"We approached the Horizon board on what action they wanted to take." he said. "We also talked to the (Springfield) mayor and city council. We told them, this is what is going on. We wanted to get people to go to the clinic if they were seeking health care else-

From the outset, the problem wasn't a lack of staffing or services, Mengenhausen said.

"We were a full running acute care clinic," he said. "We had primary care physicians. a board certified pediatrician, X-ray, telemedicine, behavior health and urgent care. We were also referring patients to specialists.

Even with the recent low patient numbers, Horizons continued to offer full-time regular clinic hours at Springfield, Mengenhausen said.

"We were open five days a week, from 8 to 5 (o'clock)," he said. "We had to restructure the clinic to make it more efficient and financially viable. It just wasn't working out in today's economy.'

LOOKING AHEAD

In the news release, Horizon officials said they would assist patients with referrals to other health care facilities. The release listed options such as AllPOINTS and the Yankton Medical Clinic, both in Yankton, and St. Michael's Hospital Avera Health and the **Bon Homme Family Practice** Clinic Avera, both in Tyndall.

"Patients can go anywhere they want. We listed those four (clinics) because they are the major health care facilities within the area," Mengenhausen said. "However, All-Point in Yankton is the only clinic where you can pay on the sliding fee scale. All Point is another community health center, like Horizon, and is based out of Elk Point.

While it closed the Springfield clinic, Horizon Health remains strong in South Dakota Mengenhausen said. Most recently, the organization opened Huron and Aberdeen facilities and is looking at starting a Fort Thompson site on the Crow Creek reservation in central South Dakota.

In terms of federal funding,

the Affordable Care Act has benefited Horizon Health by providing additional funding for community health centers nationwide, he said. However, the clinics still need to remain financially strong on their own, he added. "We are officially a non-

profit organization that participates in a federal program," he said. "Twenty-five percent of our budget comes from federal funds, and the other 75 percent comes from good business.

The Springfield clinic's recent history includes a silver lining, Mengenhausen said. Horizon will leave the Main Street clinic with improvements, which should help Springfield officials in recruiting new providers, he said.

'The city owned the building, and they were leasing it to us. There was some equipment in there, and we made a lot of updates," he said.

'We cleaned, painted and freshened it up. (The city) will get the facility back with the equipment, the exam table and X-ray. It will be ready for them.'

Horizon is also seeking to ensure continued local medical care for Springfield and the surrounding area, he said.

"We are trying to work with them to get them local providers so they are at least open two or three days a week," he added.
