WATERTOWN - Sioux Falls Christian and Dakota Valley have been the dominant forces in the recent history of Class A volleyball, capturing the last four state championships between them. High expectations surround both

'We expended a lot of energy in the third set and we just couldn't get going in the fourth set," said Dakota Valley head coach Rick Pruett. "We let them get on a run and then we started playing not to lose. As a team we went away from our type of game. We're an aggressive team with great setters and hitters, but we weren't taking advantage of our opportunities. Despite their dominance late, Sioux Falls Christian had its back against the wall early.
