#### **Panthers Place Third In A**

WATERTOWN — Dakota Valley churned out a 25-20, 25-18, 25-16 win over second-seeded Mount Vernon-Plankinton in the third place match of the South Dakota State Class A Volleyball Tournament on Saturday in Watertown.

Both teams came in fresh off of tough semifinal losses the night before, but Dakota

Valley (29-5) proved more ready for the rebound.

The Panthers utilized a balanced offensive attack ignited by Elizabeth Lammers 13 kills. Shayla Johnson punched in eight kills, Meredith Lammers seven and Anne McCabe and Lindsey Smith each six. Jordyn Young logged four aces and 16 digs. Smith added two solo blocks and 31 assists.

Dani Stoltz knocked down eight kills to pace Mount Vernon-Plankinton (28-5). Ivy Haines followed with five kills. Mikayla Weiss recorded 14 assists. Makayla Karst tallied 12 digs and Halley Haak 11.

third place at the State B volleyball tournament at Golden Eagles Arena.

The Pheasants dropped the first set, but rallied to win the next three sets to defeat Sully Buttes. Parker won by the scores of 20-25, 25-18, 25-16 and 25-15.

"It felt really great to end our season with a bang," Parker senior hitter Allison Sanner said. "I knew we could do it. It just started off a little bit slow, but it ended really


Parker bolted out to a 7-1 lead in the first set, but the Chargers rallied and forced a 18-18 tie. Sully Buttes took its first lead at 19-18 and closed on a 6-2 run to take the first

"We just didn't have that fire in us," Sanner said. "We were just still kind of bummed from last night (a three set defeat vs. Warner) and didn't have the energy, but we definitely built it.

The Pheasants definitely got better as the match went along. Parker broke away after a close second set to even the match at 1-1 and built a big lead in the third set en route to staking a 2-1 lead in the match.

"When you get into the state tournament and especially in the night bracket, you are going to face the best teams and you can't let teams get on a four-five point run," Sully Buttes coach Randy Pool said. "Because it is tough to come back and that is exactly what happened to us.

The Chargers got behind in the fourth set and Parker

"It wasn't that we didn't play well," Pool said. "In certain little situations we let them score four-five points. They are a great volleyball team. They got some big hit-

Sanner paced the Pheasants with a match-high 22

kills and added 16 digs. Rylie Christensen added 10 kills for Parker, which finishes its season with a 30-4 record.

"I'm really happy about it," Sanner said about finishing her career with a win. "Now I have three third places under my belt, so I'm glad."

Parker finished third at

the state volleyball tournament in 2011 and 2012. Sully Buttes finishes its

season 29-4.

"We are very happy with our year, 29-4, we had 26game win streak, fourth place," Pool said. "We are not hanging our heads. We are

back available Saturday. Fullback Drew Potter had eight carries for 103 yards, providing one

of the few bright spots for USD. The Coyotes will, though, return all 11 defensive starters from Saturday, as well as many of the backups. In all, South Dakota will graduate 10 seniors, but only four of those saw

the field Saturday. Progress may have been slow in 2014, but the Coyotes know the only way to truly improve is to start working right away, line-

backer John Wessel said. "It's not like every game we were getting rolled, we were in games; in them in the fourth quarter," he said. "Seeing that

progress is great, we just have to keep fighting.

dentials as well, finishing with 38 assists on the night. She averaged 11.8 assists per set in the tournament, the third straight year that her assist average put her in the top 10 in the Class AA rally scoring era.

"We talk so much about our big hitters, but we have such a great supporting cast with this group," Kolbeck said. "We lost six seniors last year, and a lot of them were on defense. We had a lot of big holes to fill, and our defense stepped up and did a phenomenal job.

finished with 11 kills and 23 digs. Larson, an outside hitter, beat out four liberos including teammate Rylie Kooima — for the top dig average of the tournament at 6.7 per set. Kooima, who had eight on the night, finished at 6.1 per set.

Also for the Rough Riders, Bailey Lamb had 23 assists. Paige Rome added seven

Stene, Mieras and Kloth all finished with all-tournament honors for O'Gorman. Kooima, Larson and Madison Tyler, who had 11 digs on Saturday, earned all-tournev honors for Roosevelt.

O'Gorman left little drama in the first two sets. Runs of seven, five and six made quick work of the opening set, while a 7-0 run cemented the second set.

In the third set, though. Roosevelt came out firing. Larson had four kills and a block, and Rome had three kills as the Rough Riders built a 16-10 lead.

"When you play at state, it's such an intense setting," said Roosevelt head coach Holly Lynch. "We fought hard on Thursday and Friday, and whatever we had left we put on the court tonight."

But the Knights, who

dropped just three sets in 22 matches against in-state competition this season, weren't about to coast through the rest of the set and try to win the match in the fourth.

"I've challenged these kids all year: Do you want to come back or go four?" Kolbeck said. "They dug in and went for it."

The Knights found Kloth early and often in their comeback, as the 6-4 outside hitter blasted seven kills in the span of nine points in the match. A Messler block tied the set at 18-18.

"Taryn is a great player on Tuesday and Thursday," Kolbeck said, referring to regular season matches. "You get her in an environment like this, and she's at a whole other

But Roosevelt was not done. The Rough Riders answered with three points of their own to regain the lead, then had three chances at set point before the Knights claimed the match.

The repeat by the Knights completes a run that started with O'Gorman struggling on the volleyball court four years ago.

"You look at their records, their accomplishments, what they did for this program, and there aren't any words for this," Kolbeck said. "They turned O'Gorman volleyball around.'

While the Rough Riders were denied a state championship, the squad still extended a string of title appearances to a state record-tying five, despite graduating most of last year's state runner-up squad.

'If you'd have asked me at the beginning of the season if we would be in the championship this year, I probably wouldn't have answered you," Lynch said. "But we had such good leadership out of our seniors. This team exceeded our expectations.

the 10th time in 11 years that Roosevelt finished in the top three. Roosevelt has three titles in that stretch (2006, 2008, 2012), all under Lynch.

- Yes, this was the fifth straight year that Class AA had an all-Sioux Falls final, but don't be surprised if that changes next year.

Both Watertown and Harrisburg had only two seniors on talented teams. Water-

town is going to have a boatload of seniors next year, with an athletic defense. The Arrows aren't as tall as the other teams, which might hurt their chances, but they will make some waves.

Harrisburg is long and athletic, and played several sophomores and freshmen in its regular rotation. They are coached by Ronette Costain, who took the Tigers to the 2005 Class A title and a runner-up finish in 2008.

Yankton could even be a contender to make some waves. While the Gazelles will have to work to replace some

quality back row players and one of their setters, Yankton has a tall, athletic front line

— If this is the last time that Yankton hosts the state volleyball tournament, I think the city and the Summit Center put on a good show.

Many of the visiting fans and media I talked to throughout the tournament had good things to say about Yankton. I know some fans commuted from Sioux Falls, but I am sure the community put its best foot forward for

those who staved. Next year, all three classes

will be in Sioux Falls. The three classes will be split back up between Brookings (AA), Watertown (A) and Huron (B) in 2016, but the field is wide open after that. There has been some talk about bringing the three classes back to the same facility on a regular basis. which would restrict sites to Sioux Falls and Rapid City, but that is purely speculation
