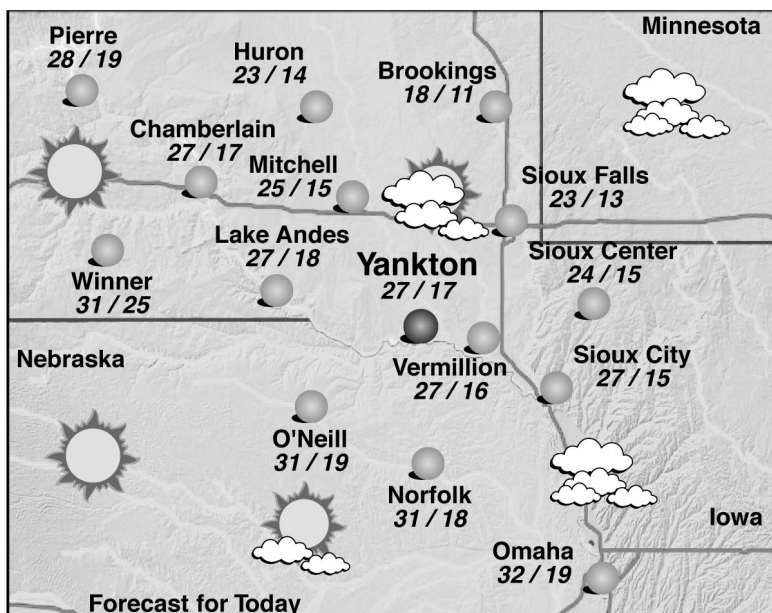

## SD Helps Acquire Hearing Aids For Kids

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Human Services (DHS) has launched a program to provide financial assistance for the purchase of hearing aids for children.

DHS is prepared to begin accepting applications for services for the new Hearing Aid Assistance Program. The aim of the program is to promote the healthy development of South Dakota children who are hard of hearing and would benefit from hearing aids by providing financial assistance.

"Hearing loss may cause problems in language development and the educational and social growth in a child," said DHS Secretary Gloria Pearson. "In addition, many health insurance plans do not cover hearing aids. This means families often incur the entire cost of hearing aids for children."

The Hearing Aid Assistance Program will help purchase hearing aids and associated ear molds for South Dakota children, younger than 19, with progressive or permanent hearing loss who would benefit from hearing aids. The individual must not have received a hearing aid from this program or S.D. Medicaid within three years prior to the date of application. The program is open to families with a household income of less than 400 percent of federal poverty guidelines, and it operates on a sliding-fee schedule, contributing anywhere from half to the entire cost.

The Hearing Aid Assistance Program will begin accepting applications Dec. 1. Applications will be available online at [dhs.sd.gov](http://dhs.sd.gov), can be picked up at many audiologist offices across the state, or can be mailed upon request by calling 800-265-9684.

"The DRS Hearing Aid Assistance Program has the potential to help a lot of South Dakota children with hearing loss and their families," said DRS Director Eric Weiss. "We are pleased to be able to help fill a need that has been identified in South Dakota."

## SDSU Extension Receives Grant To Plan For Potential Food Hub

BROOKINGS — South Dakota is one of only a few states that have not developed a food hub as a model for marketing local food. This is about to change thanks to a recent grant the USDA Ag Marketing Services awarded SDSU Extension a grant that will give producers in southeastern South Dakota a chance to plan for their own food hub.

A food hub is a means of aggregating and distributing local foods to restaurants and institutions interested in a constant supply of local foods for their establishments, explained Kari O'Neill, SDSU Extension Community Development Field Specialist.

O'Neill has led a coordinated effort to research food hubs in other states and to assist producers in developing a plan that can work in South Dakota. She applied for the grant after producers in the southeastern quarter of the state indicated a commitment to planning for some way to collectively market fresh foods in a more coordinated effort.

The food hub model O'Neill would like to research further is one developed in Illinois which uses an LLC structure

which includes 20-member farmers. The group began with only three member-farmers selling to a local grocer. Today the group sells to many restaurants in the Chicago area, even though they are located two hours from the metro area.

## HOW FUNDS WILL BE USED

SDSU Extension's one-year, \$25,000 planning grant is funded through the Local Food Promotion Program.

In addition to producers, input for the planning will be gathered from many statewide resource providers, most of whom are part of the South Dakota Local Foods Collaborative.

The money will be allocated to accomplish the following:

- Local food producers will host regional meetings this fall for producers interested in learning more about how they can become involved in sales to a food hub.

- Local food producers, resource providers and potential clients are offered the chance to participate in a field trip to Fairbury, Ill., to visit the Stewards

Dangel is a native of the Turkey Ridge area near Freeman where he grew up on a farm. He retired from teaching at Marshall in 1993 and returned to Yankton in 2004.

He said he was honored by the recent distinction and that the book has been well-received so far.

"I'm very glad to have it — very pleased," he said. "I guess (the reception) has been pretty good. The publisher just told me they were selling a lot of books."

This hasn't been the only time that Dangel was recognized for his poetic efforts. Dozens of his poems have made appearances in publications such as The Midwest Quarterly, North Dakota Quarterly, Great River Review, Plainsong, Commonweal, Paddlefish, Zone 3 and Nebraska Territory. He's won The Elkhorn Prize and was a finalist twice in the Minnesota Book Awards. Ted Kosser's "American Life in Poetry" column has also

highlighted Dangel's poems in the past. And in 1998, the Lyrical Theater of Minneapolis staged a review of poems from "Old Man Brunner County."

Dangel said Saving Single-trees has even garnered attention from other entities.

"I was a finalist in the High Plains Book Awards," he said. "I didn't win but I got a plaque for being a finalist."

Dangel hasn't stopped writing poetry either, and looks to do more as time goes along.

"I'm always writing poetry," he said. "The last six month,s or so I haven't written too much. I had some health problems for a while, but I can probably pick up again now."

He added that while he hopes to be published again in the future, it's not on his mind at the moment.

"I hope so, but I don't think about that now," he said.
