Mount Marty senior April Winne made a pair of free throws with 21 seconds left, tying the game at 64. And after being fouled on a trip down court, Sutura went to the line and made the front end of a one-and-one. The Lancers (7-2, 2-2), winners of three in a row,

were just 30 percent from the field and were out-rebounded by 10, but made nine three-pointers. Alex Kneeland scored a game-high 19 points on five three-pointers for MMC, while Winne (15) and Cheyenne Lambley (10), also reached double figures. Sutura pulled down a team-high seven rebounds and Cassidy Gebhart dished out four assists. In the loss for the Defenders (5-4, 0-3), Cassidy Vredevoogd scored 14 points, while Abby Chapman had 12 points.

Battling with Loudenburg at the DakotaDome was Wolsey-Wessington senior threat Lorenzo Williams, who's set to join John Stiegelmeier at South Dakota State University next season. The 6-foot-2, 180-pound quarterback completed 36 of 69 passes for 668 yards and five touchdowns, while rushing 203 times for 2,775 yards and 40 touchdowns in his senior season. The Warbirds' second all-stater is senior guard Cole McGehee. Here is more on the 9A all-state selections: Alcester-Hudson senior running back Colin Walth:

Walth had 132 carries for 1,430 yards and 19 touchdowns this season, averaging 10.8 yards per carry. He racked up 11 catches for 110 yards and three touchdowns, while scoring 144 points for the Cubs (10-1). Philip senior running back Paul Guptill: Guptill finished the season with 199 carries for 2,106 yards for Philip (10-1). He also had 15 catches for 325 yards and tallied 40 touchdowns in his final season. He finished his career with just over 4,100 rushing yards. Alcester-Hudson senior wide receiver Lyle LaFramboise: He hauled in 32 receptions for 549 yards and three touchdowns, finishing his career with 76 catches for 1,331 yards and 12 touchdowns. Sully Buttes junior wide receiver Cody Nelson: He finished the season with 35 catches for 655 yards and 10 touchdowns, and head coach Mark Senftner said, "Cody has the ability to score any time he touches the ball. He turns ordi-

nary plays in extra-ordinary ways. Potter County senior tight end Lucas Vogel: He recorded 19 receptions for 426 yards and six touchdowns this season for Potter County (8-2). Vogel averaged 22.4 yards per catch. Herreid-Selby Area senior center Ethan Deibert: Deibert helped the Wolverines (6-3) record 2,182 rushing yards, 1,033 passing yards and rack up 400 points on the season. Colome senior defensive tackle Colin Stenson: Stenson led Colome (6-3) with 74 tackles, 23 of which were solo. He was a three-year starter on defense and finished his career with 169 tackles. Tri-State senior defensive tackle Paul Zach: Zach helped the Tiger (6-3) defense by tallying 42 tackles — 25 solo — and nine tackles for a loss. He had 16 sacks, including six in one

game, and made two fumble recoveries. Viborg-Hurley senior defensive end Lucas Jacobson: He racked up 39 tackles, two tackles for a loss, six sacks and forced three fumbles for Viborg-Hurley (5-4). Jacobson finished his career with 82 tackles. Warner senior linebacker Derrek Tuszka: Tuszka, a four-year starter, recorded 109 tackles, 15 tackles for a loss, and had three sacks, three forced fumbles and an interception for Warner (7-3). The 6-foot-4, 220-pounder is headed to play next season for the North Dakota State University Bison. Herreid-Selby Area senior linebacker Cooper Schaeffer: The 5-foot-11, 170-pounder made 108 tackles on the season. He had one sack, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and an interception.

Philip senior linebacker Braden Fitch: Fitch recorded 77 tackles — 29 solo — for the Scotties (10-1). He made four sacks and a fumble recovery. New Underwood senior defensive back Brandon Koch: Koch totaled 75 tackles, 15 batted passes, three fumble recoveries, and 10 interceptions, four of which were returned for touchdowns, for New Underwood (8-2). Herreid-Selby Area junior kicker Israel Argullin: He had 65 kickoffs and had an average of 50.23 yards per kick. Argullin was 36-of-41 in PATs for the Wolverines. Tri-State senior punter Dylan Lick: Lick, who also played quarterback and linebacker for the Tigers, punted the ball 17 times in the 2014

season. He had 190 punts for more than 40 yards and two punts for more than 50 yards.
