Women's Soccer: Three From USD Earn Academic All-League Honors

ELMHURST, Ill. — South Dakota placed a league-high three student-athletes on the Summit League Women's Soccer Academic All-League team, as announced by the league office on Wednesday. Juniors Mackenzie Viktor, Elena Tsakakis and Kasha Meyer were honored for the academic and athletic performances this season.

Viktor earns the honor for the second consecutive season. She led the Summit League goalkeeper with 19 games played and recorded a 1.44 goals average for the season with 62 saves. The Fort Collins, Colo., native produced four shutouts and eight victories this season en route to being named to the all-Summit League second team. During her time at South Dakota, Viktor made her mark on the program record book where she has the second-most career wins (15), second-most shutouts (11) and third-most saves (266). A political science and criminal justice double-major at South Dakota, Viktor holds a 3.94 GPA.

Tsakakis collects her first career honor. Starting at midfield, she had a pair of goals and assists this season. The Edina, Minn., native's two assists added to the school-record 42 assists this season. A biology major on track for pre-medicine, Tsakakis boasts a perfect 4.00 GPA.

Meyer earns the honor for the first time in her career. The Lincoln, Neb., native was part of a Coyote back line that recorded a school-record eight shutouts in 2014. The defense limited opponents to 1.32 goals and 10.9 shots per game. Meyer also had one assist for the season. At South Dakota, Meyer majors in health sciences with a 3.94 GPA.

To be eligible for the Academic All-Summit League team, a student-athlete must have a minimum grade point average of 3.30, completed at least one full academic year at the institution and competed in at least 50 percent of their team's games. The academic all-league team is made up of 11 student-athletes that were chosen by votes from the nine institutions' faculty athletic representatives and sports information directors.

SDSU's Wieneke Named Freshman Of Year

ST. LOUIS — South Dakota State University wide receiver Jake Wieneke was named Wednesday as Missouri Valley Football Conference Freshman of the Year, following a vote of the league's coaches, sports information directors and media.

A native of Maple Grove, Minnesota, Wieneke became the first freshman in league history to top 1,000 receiving yards in a season, finishing the regular season with 1,318 yards and 66 receptions. His 15 touchdown receptions are a school record and one shy of the MVFC record of 16 set by Eddie Berlin of Northern Iowa in 2000.

Heading into postseason play, Wieneke has recorded seven 100-yard games and caught a touchdown pass in all eight league games. He holds three of the top-12 single-game receiving yard marks in program history, including a 160-yard performance Oct. 11 at Missouri State that ranks sixth in the SDSU annals.

Hoops

The Hawkeyes used a 16-0 run during a six-minute stretch early in the first half to pull away from Northern Illinois. The Huskies never got closer than 10 points in the second half.

NORTHERN IOWA 61, NORTHWESTERN 42: CUNCUN, Mexico (AP) — Seth Tuttle scored 19 points and Northern Iowa beat Northwestern 61-42 to claim the Cancun Challenge championship.

Nate Buss added 11 points, including three 3-pointers, as the Panthers (6-0) posted their 11th win all-time against a Big Ten team.

Northwestern (5-1) took an 18-14 lead at 10:14 of the first half after a layup and 3-pointer by Alex Olah, but Northern Iowa went on a 17-2 run to close the half, including a pair of 3-pointers by Nate Buss, to lead 31-20 at the break. The Panthers were 14 of 24 (58 percent) from the floor before intermission and 48 percent overall.

The Wildcats got it to 10 to 11 with 11:05 left, but a pair of free throws and a dunk by Tuttle pushed it back to 16.

Bryant McIntosh led Northwestern with 13 points. The Wildcats shot just 30 percent (16 of 53) and were 5 of 21 behind the arc.

IOWA 70, NORTHERN ILLINOIS 49: IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Aaron White and Anthony Clemmons each scored 14 points to lead Iowa to a 70-49 win over Northern Illinois on Wednesday night.

Adam Woodbury had 12 points and six rebounds for the Hawkeyes (4-2). Gabriel Olaseni added 10 points, five rebounds and four blocks in 20 minutes.

Aaric Armstrong scored 13 points on 4-of-11 shooting to lead Northern Illinois (2-1). Jordan Threlkoff added nine points and 11 rebounds.

Iowa scored 22 points off 17 turnovers, blocked 12 shots — one shy of tying the school record — and held the Huskies to only 27.9 percent shooting.

that Miles turned to social media to keep his program in the public eye. In 2009, the CSU athletic marketing director thought it would be a good idea to have Miles use Twitter and Facebook to engage fans. Miles said he would do one, not both, and he chose Twitter.

The marketing director, Ben Chulick, set up Miles' handle and password, gave him a quick Twitter lesson, and Miles took it from there. On Chulick's recommendation, Miles began tweeting at halftime to offer a quick thought about how the game was going. He continues to send out those halftime tweets at Nebraska through a media assistant who has access to his account.

@CoachMiles now has more than 75,000 followers.

And though that's but a small fraction of Kentucky coach John Calipari's 1.3 million, and less than the 96,000 following the little-used account of Nebraska football coach Bo Pelini, Miles' reach is notable at a school with such little basketball tradition.

"I'm not surprised at all," said Chulick, now in athletic marketing at Arizona. "I knew once he got that job at Nebraska, with the amount of fans they have, he was about to blow up on Twitter."

Miles regularly posts random thoughts, interesting or funny pictures, and responds to tweets from his followers if they are not disparaging. He even responds to yardward tweets meant for LSU football coach Les Miles, redirecting them to the handle (@)LSU-CoachMiles.

Beyond social media, Miles uses old-fashioned, face-to-face interaction to cultivate and keep fans. He won't blow off someone who wants to chat him up. He won't refuse someone who wants to

take a picture with him.

"This has got to be great for the fans because, A, we've got a long-suffering fan base and B, we've got one of the most loyal fan bases you can imagine," he said. "I'm just excited to be their coach, and I really want to build a winner for them and exceed their expectations."

Miles said coaching is more a lifestyle than a job, especially at the highest levels. He said he won't let it consume him or become detrimental to his family life. He and his wife, Kari, have a daughter in high school and a son in grade school.

"I'm not going to let my job be bigger than my life," he said. "I want my job to be part of my life, and a huge part of my life, but I'm going to enjoy life. I'm going to enjoy the job. I'm going to do the right thing for the job and work my butt off for that university and fan base and student-athletes and my staff. But I'm going to have fun doing it, bottom line."

ever it takes to be successful."

WR — Heath Schindler, Elkton-Lake Benton: A 3-year starter on offense, who had 56 catches for 1,055 yards and 14 touchdowns. He also had 50 carries for 387 yards and was 4 of 6 passing for 85 yards and a touchdown. During his career, he had 126 catches for 2,228 yards and 25 touchdowns and rushed for 1,235 yards. He also was 5 of 7 passing for 141 yards.

"Heath not only improved each year-game but made others around him so much better," E-LB coach Tai Farnham said. "He holds seven school records and is second in three others. He was a very durable player and never missed a game from third grade to his senior year. He is a go-to, big-time player that impacted every game he has played in and is the best receiver I have coached in 27 years."

WR — Adam Aughenbaugh, De Smet-Iroquois: Had a touchdown reception in every game this season, finished with 49 catches for 746 yards and 15 touchdowns. The past three seasons he has 62 catches for 930 yards and 18 touchdowns.

"Adam has great hands as a receiver. Ninety percent of the time, if the ball is in the area, he will make the catch," De Smet-Iroquois coach Mike Warner said. "He saw double coverage in most games this year and still averaged 83 yards receiving per game and caught at least one touchdown in every game."

TE — Tanner Lemme, Arlington: A three-year starter, who had eight catches for 256 yards and four touchdowns this season. He also blocked for an offense that rushed for 3,087 yards this season and averaged 10 yards per carry. He finished his career with 40 receptions for 1,039 yards and 15 touchdowns.

"Tanner is a three-year starter who loves the game of football," Arlington coach Steve Gilbertson said. "He is a talented athlete, who was a big-play receiver for us the past three years."

G — Kyle Stegeman, Arlington: A repeat selection to the Class 9AA all-state team, who was a three-year starter on the offensive line. He blocked for a team, who rushed for 3,087 yards and threw for 780 yards this season.

"Kyle is a very dedicated football player, great teammate and leader," Gilbertson said. "As a three-year starter at offensive guard, Kyle was an integral part of a run of 29-5 during that time."

G — Nathaniel Schroeder, Kimball-White Lake: A three-year starter, helped Kimball-White Lake to an 8-3 record this season.

"Offensively, Nathaniel anchored our running attack," Kimball-White Lake coach Dale Taylor said.

C — Brody Gilbertson, Arlington: A three-year starter, who was voted by his teammates as the Most Valuable Line-man in 2013 and 2014. He blocked for a team, who rushed for 3,087 yards this season.

"Brody is a good student, extremely dedicated football player, leader and teammate," Gilbertson said.

Defense

T — Chase VonEye, Woonsocket-Wessington Springs-Sanborn Central: Recorded an average of 5.8 tackles per game and had two sacks.

"Defensively, Chase was immovable in the middle," Koloušek said. "He worked down the line to make plays."

T — Noah Beck, Gregory: Had 64 tackles, 15 tackles for loss, three sacks and one fumble recovery.

"Noah consistently makes plays despite facing constant double teams this season," Alimendinger said.

E — Garrett Larson, Woonsocket-Wessington Springs-Sanborn Central: Has started in each of the past three seasons. He had 7.7 tackles per game this

season and nine sacks. The past three years he has a total of 14 sacks.

"Garrett is the hardest worker we have. His motor never quits," Koloušek said. "He is a leader who would not let anyone take the easy way out."

E — Kenner Landenbau, Hill City: Had 41 solo tackles this season, including seven for a loss, and 28 assisted tackles. He had three sacks, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. During his career he had 98 solo stops and 126 assisted tackles to go along with 14 sacks, eight fumble recoveries, nine forced fumbles, 21 hurries and a defensive touchdown.

LB — Turner Blasius, Kimball-White Lake: Had 98 total tackles this season, four sacks and an interception.

"Turner has been our leading tackler for two years and has started for three years," Taylor said. "He also started on a state champion team as a freshman."

LB — Jonah Beck, Gregory: A four-year starter, who had 54 tackles, 10 tackles for a loss, four sacks and a fumble recovery this season. He finished his career with 275 tackles, 43 tackles for a loss, six sacks and seven fumble recoveries.

"Jonah was a four-year starter on both sides of the ball and an exceptional leader," Alimendinger said.

LB — Alex Heuer, Arlington: Had 72 tackles and six tackles for a loss this season.

"Alex is an extremely dedicated athlete with an excellent work ethic," Gilbertson said. "After being hampered by injuries last season, he was healthy this season, which made our team much better."

LB — Tyler Wagner, Webster Area: Recorded 114 tackles in eight games for an average of 14.25 tackles per game. He had eight tackles for a loss, forced three fumbles, recovered three fumbles and had three sacks. Finished his career with 236 tackles (7.6 tackles per game), 12.5 tackles for a loss, three forced fumbles, eight fumble recoveries, four interceptions and 3.5 sacks.

Wieneke is the second Jackrabber player to be named MVFC Freshman of the Year, joining quarterback Austin Sumner in 2011. He also is a finalist for the Jerry Rice Award as the top freshman player in the Football Championship Subdivision.

Wieneke also placed second in the balloting for the league's Newcomer of the Year, finishing behind Illinois State quarterback Tre Robertson. Jackrabber running back Zach Zenger finished third in the balloting for the MVFC Offensive Player of the Year award, finishing behind Illinois State running back Marshaun Coprich and Northern Iowa back David Johnson.

The MVFC Defensive Player of the Year Award went to North Dakota State defensive end Kyle Emanuel, while Illinois State's Brock Spack was named MVFC Coach of the Year.

The full all-conference team will be announced Dec. 1.

South Dakota State, 8-4 overall, will make its third consecutive appearance in the FCS playoffs with a matchup Saturday at Montana State. Kickoff is slated for 2 p.m. Mountain Time (3 p.m. Central) at Bobcat Stadium in Bozeman, Montana.

MLB Minimum Salary Rises To \$507,500

NEW YORK (AP) — Major League Baseball's minimum salary is rising to \$507,500 next year from \$500,000.

The sport's collective bargaining agreement called for a cost-of-living adjustment based on the yearly increase through October of the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, rounded to the nearest \$500. There will be a similar adjustment for the minimum in 2016, the final season of the labor contract.

The commissioner's office said Wednesday that the minor league minimum for a player signing a second major league contract goes up to \$82,700 from \$81,500. The minor league minimum for a player signing an initial big league contract rises to \$41,400 from \$40,750.
