The Yankton gymnastics team only has two home appearances, just six days apart and before Christmas. The Gazelles host Sioux Falls Lincoln and Mitchell on Dec. 9. then host Wagner-Bon Homme on Dec. 15. The Gazelles will actually have half their schedule done by Dec. 19, with six events in 19 days.
