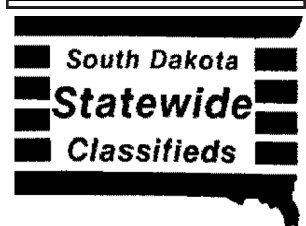

past five years at Twin Spruce Junior High School as an eighth grade science instructor.

Brunson graduated from Bon Homme High School in 2000, then she attended South Dakota State University in Brookings and received her bachelor's degree in Wildlife and Fishery Sciences. Brunson wasted no time obtaining her master's degree shortly after.

She found herself in Wyoming after her husband, Sterling, moved from his ranch in Edgemont (S.D.) to Gillette. She applied for several jobs and found work as a biologist doing land surveying work while tracking different species of plants and animals.

After six months, Brunson noticed something missing.

"It was great that I was doing all this research but I wasn't able to share with other people all of the things that I was doing because you work very much independently in that field," she said.

Brunson recalled a lot of people encouraging her to go into education because of her passion for the outdoors, part of the reason she went into biology.

"With that field, as a biologist, it is more one-on-one work and you publish articles," she said. "You don't get to really verbally express everything. I just felt that maybe education was something."

She got her foot in the door as a para-educator (teacher aid) at Meadowlark Elementary in Gillette under the special education department. She worked with autistic and Asperger kids who needed assistance in the classroom.

Because Brunson didn't have her teaching certificate, she wasn't allowed to actually teach in the classroom, but the feel for education ignited a future flame.

"I had a very good principal," Brunson said. "A lot of it is attributed to him. He knew that I came in as a master's degree student, very overqualified for this position. But he saw that I had a real passion for education, so he hired me."

Brunson worked for one year in that position until another unexpected opportunity came her way.

With the help of the principal, she spearheaded a competitive math and science grant.

"I wrote the grant to provide professional development for teachers as far as science goes," Brunson said. "After we were awarded it, I sort of wrote my own position here as a science research specialist at the elementary level."

Brunson put her skills to work by creating science lessons for teachers and modeling them for classroom use. She even brought in experts from Black Hills State University, who worked with the teachers on improving the science curriculum.

After the three-year grant ran out, she set her sights on obtaining a teaching degree.

"(My friends) kept telling me, 'You have to go back to school. You need to. Education is in your heart. You are so good,'" Brunson said. "People would see me interact with kids and suggest I should go back."

She attended Montana State University in Bozeman, Montana, and earned her endorsement through secondary science to teach middle school kids.

"I knew that my passion was more for advanced sci-

1 Dead, 1 Hurt In University Shooting

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) — One student was shot dead and another wounded after gunfire erupted Sunday near dormitories on the Winston-Salem State University campus.

Authorities were searching for a suspected gunman, but police and university spokesman Aaron Singleton would provide no identifying details. The historically black school urged visitors to the campus to

stay away, but said student services were operating normally and that classes will be held on regular schedules Monday.

The slaying victim was 19-year-old Anthony White Jr., a second-year student from Charlotte, according to campus and Winston-Salem police.

A second student hit by gunfire received hospital treatment but was released early Sunday, city police said. His name and

condition were being withheld.

White was studying information technology and though he was an accomplished football player at Belton-Honea Path High School in Honea Path, South Carolina, about 130 miles west of Charlotte, said his mother, Xavier Martin of Charlotte. He wanted to focus on his studies rather than try for a spot on the college team, his mother added.

August.

"It's a pretty big venue for something smaller like a birthday party but some events are a couple hundred people, some are close to 600 to 800 people," Bernard said.

The Bernards also own the Riverfront Event Center which they donated, along with the brewery, to the Harvest Halloween Festival for the vendor fair, waffle breakfast and chili feed included in Saturday's activities.

"These buildings are historic," Clatworthy said. "They require a ton of maintenance and are very expensive to maintain. We are so lucky that we have people like the Bernards who would take on huge buildings like that and turn them into a usable, functioning space that people can enjoy."

When the idea of a "battle of the bands" concert was brought to the table, the brewery building seemed like a perfect location.

"(The building) was deliberately built in a fireproof fashion — a lot of concrete

and steel, (an) industrial-style building," Bernard said. "Because of the tall ceilings and the hard finishes, it's got a very live feeling to it that is excellent for music."

The bands played alternating sets that rocked the house Saturday night. A large crowd flocked to the event.

The concert added to the live music energy in downtown Yankton. Bernard had a great time watching how the beautiful setting transformed.

"While we provide a lot of space and some of our staff towards set-up, it is really the volunteers who pull it off," Bernard said. "We just opened the door, facilitated and helped out, but it is really the big stack of volunteers that made this event possible."

This past summer, owners constructed a rooftop deck overlooking the Meridian Bridge. They are also working on building a pub room on the roof of the brewery building which will include a bar and table seating surrounded by large veranda windows. Construction is planned to begin in this winter after events for the season have concluded.

have to move grain to rail lines by roads, which is costly and destroys infrastructure in the region, Halverson said. He said using rail transportation adds up to a quarter per bushel to a farmer's bottom line.

Millions of dollars of state and private funds for rail line upgrades to the state-owned Britton Line in northeastern South Dakota and construction of a grain terminal near Britton are also moving forward. Work on the Britton Grain Terminal broke ground earlier this year, and it's expected to be completed in August 2016.

Witnesses Describe Gunman's Rampage In Colorado Springs

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Witnesses on Sunday described a terrifying scene on the streets of Colorado Springs, where a gunman armed with a rifle marched down a city street and shot and killed three people before being fatally shot in a gunbattle with police.

Authorities have released few details about Saturday morning's shooting in broad daylight. The suspect and victims have not been identified, and police are looking for a motive.

A neighbor, Teresa Willingham, said she and her 7-year-old son heard three loud gunshots and saw a bicyclist lying face down in the street, his legs mangled and still intertwined in his bike.

"His last words were 'Please God, no,'" she said. "He was just at the wrong place at the wrong time."

A neighbor, Naomi Bettis, who lives across the street, said she saw a man in a green jacket with a rifle, walking down the street. She saw him go into a house, and come out with a gun. She said the man headed down the block, and a bicyclist came up.

Bettis said the bicyclist begged for his life, but the gunman started shooting.

Bettis said the bicyclist collapsed outside a house. She later placed a bouquet of flowers, a candle and a note where the bicyclist was slain, saying "My thoughts are with you. Praying for the family. I'm sorry for your loss."
