# WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP)

One student was shot dead and another wounded after gunfire erupted Sunday near dormitories on the Winston-Salem State University campus.

Authorities were searching for a suspected gunman, but police and university spokesman Aaron Singleton would provide no identifying details. The historically black school urged visitors to the campus to

ence - more than just beginning level," she said. "I love getting kids excited, but as far as the content level, I wanted to go deeper.'

She was hired at Twin Spruce Junior High School in the summer of 2010 and initiated many after-school programs that encouragef kids to experiment with science.

Brunson runs school programing four nights a week, including five different activities that kids can choose from: science experiment, cooking club with 4-H, inside garden, tinker center and robotics.

She also runs a program called Dirty Fun where she travels to several elementary schools in the area. The program is designed to encourage kids to "make messes" in the science and outdoor world while introducing students to soil experiments.

In addition to teaching, Brunson writes grants for professional development for elementary and secondary teachers in an attempt to seek funds for kids in after-school programming and summer programs.

"I do a lot of hands-on and getting the materials in the students' hands," Brunson said. "I like to do inquirybased lessons, which allow the kids to explore something without me even telling them what we are going to learn about. It is them doing the learning and me serving more as a facilitator.

The Peabody Educator of the Year award honorees are nominated by fellow faculty members. Brunson was nominated by a teacher at Meadowlark Elementary, where she got her start teaching.

"Honestly, because I don't like to be in the spotlight, I was really not going to go to this banquet," Brunson said. "I don't like attention on me. I told that to the teacher who nominated me, but he said, No. You need to go.' I said, 'OK, fine. I will do it for you' and I am really glad I did."

Brunson beat out educators from across Wyoming nominated for the award. But not just teachers: Any member of a school's staff can be nominated for such an honor.

No one knew about Brunson winning the award until the night of the ceremony. And no one was more surprised than Brunson herself.

"I had no intentions of it ever being me," she said. "There are amazing teachers in our district and I am still very young in my career. You would think that the teachers who have been teaching for 33-35 years would get that honor.

This is Brunson's final year teaching at Twin Spruce Elementary. She and her family are planning on returning to South Dakota. Her husband is transferring his business to a ranch they own near Edgem-

"This is a hard thing for me," Brunson said. "It's a hard thing for me knowing that what I have created in Gillette, I'm not sure anyone else will want to continue all that.'

Brunson admits that she did struggle with the decision to continue teaching. But her passion continued to shine through her doubts.

"Whether I make 28 cents an hour or \$28,000 a year, education is a very passionate thing to me," Brunson said. "I'm going to go back into it I'm a South Dakota girl and I have been successful. I will make the best of it and find opportunities for the kids in South Dakota.'


