






Services NOT provided by SHC at this time include dental, diagnosis or treatment of sexually transmitted diseases, HIV testing, prenatal care, treatment for Emergency Medical Conditions, radiology, immunizations and chiropractic care. The Staff does not prescribe any narcotics.

Future clinics are planned for the first and third Monday of each month. The date of the next clinic is Nov. 16.

NE Department Of Roads Opens Environmental Impact Draft For Public Viewing

OMAHA, Neb. – The Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the Nebraska Department of Roads' proposed Nebraska Highway 12 project is now available for public review.

A public meeting on the proposal Monday, Nov. 9, at the Niobrara Secondary School – East Gymnasium. An open house will start at 4:30 p.m., with the public hearing set for 6 p.m.

The project, coordinated by the Nebraska Department of Roads seeks authorization to place fill in waters of the United States in connection with the proposed highway project. NDOR submitted a permit application on Sept. 11, 2015, to place fill material east and west of the Village of Niobrara, Nebraska.

As part of its permit review process, the Omaha District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has developed a Draft Environmental Impact Statement, in compliance with the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. The Draft EIS is available for review on its website.

The Draft EIS was prepared to inform decision makers and the public of the environmental impacts of the proposed roadway design

project. In addition, the Draft EIS reviews the reasonable project alternatives that would avoid or minimize adverse impacts or enhance the quality of the human environment.

The USACE, Omaha District is seeking written comments on the proposed NE Highway 12 Draft EIS from the public; Federal, State and Local agencies and officials; Native American Tribes; and other interested parties.

The Draft EIS and comments received provide USACE information to make an informed permit decision under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (33 United States Code [USC] 1344).

The Draft EIS will also be used to aid in the decision required by the permit decision under the National Park Service, a cooperating agency, as it related to the National Wild and Scenic Rivers Act.
