"You try to get better at what you do," Glenn said. "I don't think you go wholesale out and start chucking.

"In the fourth quarter, we would have gone to more throwing, but look where we were at. We just didn't get a break in the fourth quarter. Their punter just killed us.'

After rolling up 106 yards in the first quarter, when it scored its only touchdown, USD struggled to move the ball. And outside of that 81-yard scoring drive, the next longest drive for the Coyotes was 20 yards.

Northern Iowa coach Mark Farley said his defense settled into the tempo of the game after trying to establish what USD's plan of attack would be.

"I think we figured it out pretty quickly what their thought was moving the football," Farley said.

The best way for the Coyotes to be able to pinpoint what exactly wasn't working will be to examine film, according to quarterback Ryan Saeger.

"The first three drives, it looked like we were able to establish something, but then we just disappeared," Saeger said.

## SIU Up Next

The one main positive that came out of Saturday's loss in Cedar Falls for USD was its defense.

The Coyotes held Northern Iowa quarterback Aaron Bailey

to 44 yards rushing on 23 carries, but he made up for it by passing for 231 yards. The Panthers, though, were limited to two field goals after halftime.

That USD defense will be challenged next Saturday by a Southern Illinois outfit that ranks fourth nationally in total offense (514.9).

The Salukis, which are like USD 2-3 in the Valley, rolled up 398 yards in a loss to North Dakota State on Saturday. SIU, however, surrendered 397 yards on the ground to the Bison, a stat that could bode well for the Coyotes.

NDSU's Brittany Brownot-ter (21:44.75) finished third, edging out USD's Kelsey Barrett (21:46.19). For Barrett, the race was about staying focused on the team goal.

'We sat around and talked about our goals, and I said, 'The whole race, every single second of the race, I'm going to be thinking, "Is what I'm doing right now going to help my team win the race." That was just my approach," she said. "You have to know where everyone is ahead. You have to know what place you're in, and you have to know what you need to do to help your team. That's how we all went

into it.

SDSU's first two runners, Samanatha Anderson (21:56.19) and Rachel King (21:56.24), finished right behind Barrett. That theme would play out for the rest of the scoring runners, as USD's Katie Wetzstein (8th, 21:59.60), Nicole Schmidt (11th, 22:38.19) and Megan Billington (13th, 22:47.14) each had a Jackrabbit finish directly behind her.

"If those places switch, that's a six-point swing," Fitzsimmons said.

Also for USD, Lindsay Joyce (23:11.420, Jessica Feldman (23:17.55) and Erin Wetzstein (23:23.73) finished 24th, 25th and 26th. Bailey Oettel (23:57.03) finished in 35th.

After wondering how his battered team would perform in the conference meet, the forward-thinking Fitzsimmons was happy to leave talk about the NCAA regional in two weeks for another day.

"As banged up as we have been, I just wanted to get through today. We have to weeks to rest and recover before regions," he said. "Like Kelsey said before the meet, "Let's just get through the weekend. We'll cross that bridge in two weeks.'

ished fourth with 87 points. IUPUI edged SDSU 35-39 for a second straight team title, with the Bison placing third.

"Our men's team, we knew they were young coming into the meet. We were hoping they'd battle for third, and they did just that," Fitzsimmons said.

SDSU's Trent Lusignana won medalist honors for the second time in three years, finishing the 8,000-meter course in 24:29.70. Teamamtes Joel Reichow (24:34.40) and Trevor Capra (24:49.57) finished right behind him, giving the Jackrabbits a good

start on scoring. But after USD's Mubarik Musa (24:49.66) came six straight Jaguars. Eight IUPUI runners came in between SDSU's third and fourth runners, clinching the title.

Musa and Isaac Allen (25:27.67), who finished

11th, each earned all-Summit League honors in their final league meet, Musa on first team (top seven) and Allen on second team (next seven).

"You want your two seniors to get all-conference," Fitzsimmons noted. "Musa took a chance at winning and finished fourth. Isaac took a chance at a top-five finish.

Also for USD, Brice Cowman (25:52.46) placed 21st, Matthew Schilmoeller (27:02.28) finished 31st, Nathan Wendt (27:16.26) placed 34th, Pierce Libbey (27:29.51) finished 36th, Zach Welch (28:14.34) placed 42nd and Mach Dojiok (28:30.74) placed 43rd.

"Brice probably had his best race as a Coyote," Fitzsimmons said of Cowman, a sophomore from Yankton.
