WAKE UP CALL

In step one, Huether said it's paramount that locals realize there's an issue in the present day.

"I do believe a wake-up call is needed," he said. "If we're not willing as a city to recognize that we have an issue, then we might as well just stop right now and leave.

Families have to deal with this — if you have an issue in your family and you're not willing to address it, it just continues and the family is really never going to get stronger. Business is the same thing — if you've got an issue within your business and you're not willing to tackle it, your business isn't going to succeed at the level that it should. The same thing for a city. I do believe a wake-up call is needed when it comes to downtown Yankton."

Huether said the second step is to build a solid foundation in infrastructure, perception and cooperation. He said while infrastructure is currently solid in the downtown area, the perception needs work.

"I do think there's a perception issue, and that is that downtown is not growing," he said. "In fact, the perception is that downtown

is struggling. That perception impacts your ability to get others excited about coming into downtown.... Changing that perception and building confidence is really going to be important as we tackle downtown Yankton."

He added that it's important for businesses to join the Historic Downtown Yankton Association, even if they might not be in downtown proper.

"Every single business in downtown Yankton should be part of that association," he said. "If they're not, that's a challenge for you. ... I hope that you've got 25-50 other businesses and other organizations that are not part of downtown Yankton in the Historic Downtown Yankton Association."

YOUTH MOVEMENTS

Huether also spoke of the need to pay attention to young people, or millennials, when considering how to go forward.

"They ultimately are going to be the future leaders, the future investors of Yankton, South Dakota," he said. "One thing millennials really enjoy is playing downtown — that's where they want to be. They really don't want to go 'out,' they want to come 'in.' They want all of their friends, all of their coworkers and they want to come downtown to play, so you want to create an environment."

Additionally, Huether said there's a need to take advantage of housing potential in downtown.

STIMULATING DEVELOPMENT

Huether said one of the keys to stimulating of the downtown area is to go through with ideas rather than waiting for them to come to fruition.

"Go on the offensive when it comes to this city," he said. "Think of, 'What should we do?' or 'What do we need to do?' and then go do it."

He added that it's ok to make mistakes as long as an attempt is being made at fulfilling an idea, and not to be afraid of creating TIF districts and using other economic incentives to help create business opportunities.

DEFEATING 'THE SPIRIT OF NO'

Another key to revitalizing downtown, according to Huether, is to stand up to opposition.

"You do have to stay on the offensive with the naysayers and the critics," he said. "I know that there are some very organized people in the city of Yankton right now. They were organized when I was a kid, they were organized when I was in high school and college. There's an organized group of folks that will immediately go on the offensive in the spirit of 'no', and they are very successful in Yankton. Their odds of winning are

very, very good because they're organized, they're passionate, they're vocal and, ultimately, they've got a great pattern of success."

Huether made note of recent electoral defeats of opt-outs for education and a levy for road and bridge repairs as deterrents for investment.

"Not only are (potential residents) noticing, but others are noticing such as businesses that are looking for places they want to relocate," he said. "They're noticing these things because, remember, one of the greatest challenges that we have in the City of Sioux Falls, the City of Yankton and the State of South Dakota — and it is a crisis — is workforce. We're trying to attract workers to our towns and to our state. Well, who in the world is going to want to move to a place where you're not investing in infrastructure, you're not investing in education, you're not investing in development and there's this perception of 'not here.'"

Huether said the city ultimately needs to do a lot to move forward on downtown.

"Just get stuff done," he said. "Take a risk, make a mistake, make a decision, challenge each other and get stuff done, all in the spirit of the love of this town."

WALL ST. RECAP

Stocks retreated modestly Wednesday after comments from Federal Reserve Chair Janet Yellen implied that Fed policymakers are still considering raising interest rates in December. Yellen's comments pushed the U.S. dollar higher. The dollar's rise had a secondary impact of causing oil to fall, which in turn pushed oil, gas and energy stocks lower.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery advanced 9.75 cents to \$5.2625 a bushel; December corn was unchanged at 3.8050 a bushel; December oats were rose 1 cent to 2.26 a bushel; while January soybeans were gained 5 cents to \$8.84 bushel.

Beef and pork were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle was off 3 cents to \$1.3722 a pound; January feeder cattle fell 4.50 cents to \$1.7767 a pound; while December lean hogs lost .85 cent to \$.5737 a pound.

cifically for that purpose," Weaver said. "This is a giant decision."

Klatt countered that it would be a mistake to not allow a 14-year-old boy to change back at age 17.

"You have to let him, because God made him a boy," she said.

Another board member, Bud Postma, the Madison High School athletic director, suggested tongue in cheek that perhaps students should be allowed to go back and forth multiple times.

"Where does a change of mind quit as a teen-ager?" Postma asked.

The newest board member, Sioux Falls superintendent Brian Maher, said he would be interested in looking at a hardship exemption.

"What options are there?" Maher asked. "I think the

policy is an important policy to put on the books."

Another board member, Sanborn Central principal Linda Whitney, said the process to get the first approval is extensive.

"Should there be something else? Possibly," Whitney said.

But, she noted, "there is a commitment" if the student and the family go through the process.

The association's staff was directed to work on language for an exemption that the board could consider next year.

The transgender policy sparked attempts in the Legislature to overturn it this year. An interim committee of legislators narrowly defeated two attempts Friday to recommend anti-transgender measures.

Several lawmakers have indicated they will support legislation in the 2016 session to attempt again to overturn the SDHSAA policy.
