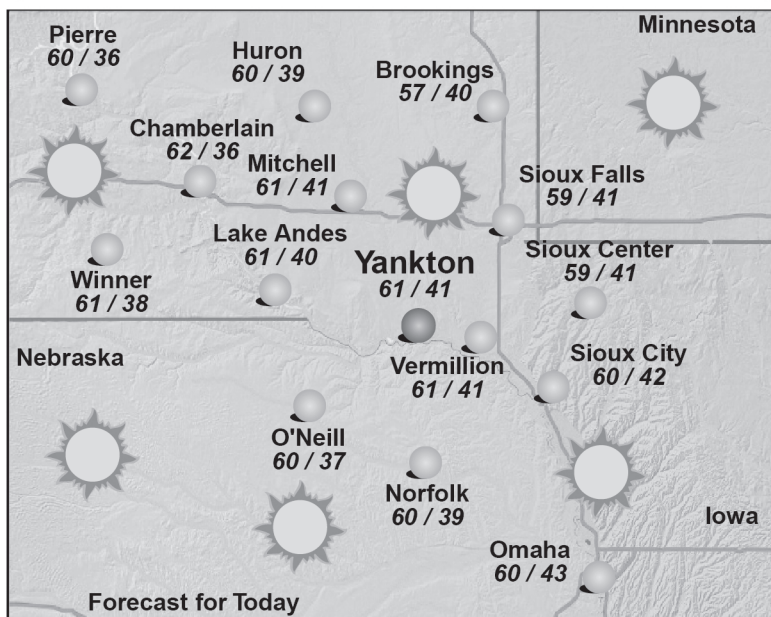

In a press release, Paul Scherschligt, Yankton County Emergency Management director, said he was happy to see the level of cooperation between public and private interests on the project.

"The partnership of these businesses along with Yankton County Emergency Management, Search and Rescue, and the City of Yankton really brings together a unified mission and message to promote water safety in our community," Scherschligt said. "Yankton is a great place for families to enjoy activities on the water. Our goal is to ensure that safety is a priority and be proactive for children to wear them and buckle up."

The station was installed last month and currently holds five life jackets that are free for anyone to use. The station works on the honor system that users will return the life jackets after use.

Conrad-Koupal added that Riverside Park's location as the center for many major events throughout the year also drove the decision to build a station there.

"During the summer, we have lots of events — we have the Fourth of July fireworks display, we have Yankton Riverboat Days and it's just a really popular place for recreation," she said. "So many times, we see both kids and adults down by the dock without life jackets. ... As a recreational place, it's really important to

send a message that people don't float, so life jackets are important."

Conrad-Koupal said having the life jacket station in place is an extension of Yankton County Search & Rescue's mission.

"I think it really sends a visual message," she said. "Part of the mission of Yankton County Search & Rescue is we do try to get out in the public a lot and try to promote public safety. I think having the station there is really a visual tool to bring the message home and put it in people's minds that, unfortunately, bad things do happen on the river. If people are aware about safety and wearing life jackets, then we can prevent some of those bad things from happening."

Conrad-Koupal said there have been similar installations at other sites around the community.

"Locally, there is a station by Lake Yankton and over at the park across from Avera Sacred Heart (Hospital)," she said.

She added that there's potential for more stations as time goes along.

"As of right now, I don't think there are any other plans, but hopefully, with this being there, we'll see a lot of success and look at opportunities in the future," she said. "I know the season is winding down now, but with it there, ready to go for next season, we're hoping to see a lot of success and support for it."

## OBITUARIES

### Donald Gunn

Donald Franklin Gunn passed away on November 6th, 2015 at the Scotland Good Samaritan Center in Scotland, South Dakota.

Don was born on the family farm near Scotland, South Dakota, on July 7th, 1933 to Frank and Emma (Grosz) Gunn. He was the youngest of four brothers and five sisters. Don graduated from Scotland High School in 1950 and worked with his father and brothers on the farm until enlisting in the United States Air Force in 1952. He served as a ground to air radio operator and instructor from 1952 until his discharge in 1956. Upon returning to Scotland, Don once again worked on the family farm until a seriously broken arm sidelined him for over a year. Don decided to try something different and since he always enjoyed cooking for others, he bought the Scotland Café in 1957 and ran that business until 1972. He stayed active cooking for others throughout his lifetime, often catering

for groups and celebrations. Don worked as a meat cutter and butcher before becoming a route driver for Meadow Gold Dairy, which took him to Columbus, Nebraska for a few years. While in Columbus, he started driving a route delivery truck for Kitty Clover Potato Chips, a position that he would hold for eighteen years. In 1992 Don retired due to health issues.

Don's driving job gave him the opportunity to transfer back to South Dakota in 1975, so he bought an acreage near Tabor where he raised sheep, pigs, horses, chickens, ducks, geese, pheasants, guineas and rabbits. After selling the "farm" in 1986, he returned to Scotland and continued to raise a few animals in his back yard.

Although Don could not read music, he was a very good organist and played during the Scottie Stampede Rodeo performances for many years. He occasionally played the organ and the accordion for a few polka bands while living around Tabor.

Don was a lifelong outdoorsman and enjoyed hunting and fishing. He began pheasant hunting with several hunters from Canada and Missouri in the late 1950's that became a yearly tradition that still happens each fall in Scotland and has involved hunters from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Texas and Alaska, as well as Canada. He also loved deer hunting and fishing on the James River and Lake Henry.

Don was one of the founders and a lifelong member of the Scotland Rodeo Club and play to organ at the performances for many years. He was also a Shriner, a member of the Scotland Saddle Club and the VFW.

Don married Rita Barrett in 1959. They divorced in 1962.

Don married Dawn Kruse in 1963 and they had one son, Jim. They divorced in 1986.

Don is survived by his son Jim and wife Carrie of Council Bluffs, Iowa, three granddaughters, Alicia Ware and husband Dwight of San

Francisco, California, Laura Fenner of Omaha, Nebraska and Brooke Gunn of Council Bluffs. One sister, Violet of Daytona Beach, Florida, two brothers Maynard and Jerry, both from Scotland and many nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents Frank and Emma, sisters Marylyn, Eileen, Marguerite and Doris and brothers Howard and Finley.

There will be a military service at the VFW post in Scotland, South Dakota on Saturday, November 14th, 2015 at 2:30 p.m.

## Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The South Dakota Public Utilities Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$21.25 per month and business services are \$32.00-\$38.40 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in a government benefit program (Lifeline) to make residential telephone service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers are those that meet eligibility standards as defined by the FCC and state commissions. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone per household, which can be either a wireline or wireless telephone. A household is defined for the purposes of the Lifeline program as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Lifeline service is not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in the program. Consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain Lifeline telephone service can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from the program.

Lifeline eligible subscribers may also qualify for reliable home high-speed Internet service up to 1.5Mbps for \$9.95\* per month for the first 12 months of service. Please call 1-866-541-3330 or visit centurylink.com/internetbasics for more information.

If you live in a CenturyLink service area, please call 1-888-833-9522 or visit centurylink.com/lifeline with questions or to request an application for the Lifeline program.
