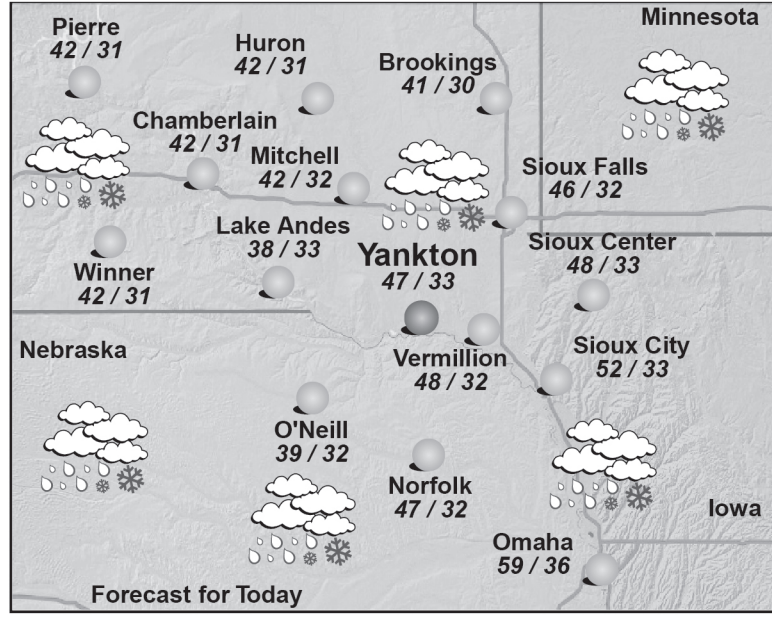

VERMILLION — The Clay County Democratic Party will be hosting a watch party for the second of six Democratic debates on Nov. 14 beginning at 7:30 p.m. The watch party will be held at Howlers (912 N Dakota Street, Vermillion) and is open to voters or interested individuals of all political parties. The event will be broadcast live from Drake University by CBS News, KCCL, and

the Des Moines Register with John Dickerson moderating. As of Nov. 8, the confirmed candidates include Martin O'Malley, Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders. The Clay County Democrats emphasize the open nature of this watch party. "Our first watch party drew good numbers of interested voters from all walks of life," Chair Mark Winegar said, "and we hope to continue

along those lines. This debate should be of even greater importance to area voters due to its broadcast by our neighbors in Iowa." actually learning about ourselves and our community." Another story Hunhoff shared with the audience was about a 23-year-old Belle Fourche native Don Smith and his part in Doolittle's Raid on Tokyo in 1942. Led by Lt. Col. James "Jimmy" Doolittle, the raiders were a group of 80 volunteer airmen who took part in an attack on Japan after the attack on Pearl Harbor. The raiders flew 16 B-25 Mitchell planes to Tokyo and other places on Honshu Island during World War II. Their mission was to drop their bombs and fly on to land in a part of China that was still free. "Smith is the last guy you would have thought who

would volunteer because it looked like a suicide mission," Hunhoff said. "He had just learned how to fly B25s, but he felt it was that important." Smith dropped his bomb on a steel factory. His plane later landed off the coast of China, but he was able to get himself and his crew members out before it sank. Despite devastating odds, the raiders completed their mission, with 73 of the raiders surviving. "There is nothing more awful than war, but when it is necessary, there is also nothing more important than war," Hunhoff said. "Those stories are not just about Don Smith and Jimmy Doolittle. They represent us and fight for us. Telling their stories is one way to honor the men and women who served for the United States." During the day's presentation, audience members

also heard from several students who shared important history and beliefs about remembrance. YMS principal Todd Dvoracek addressed the importance of making the school's Veterans Day a student program. "We want them to understand what the importance for all our veterans and the importance of them living in our community," he said. "There are many tangible ways that we can acknowledge their sacrifice, but the easiest is to simply say thank you." In the program's 12th year, the event also included a slideshow of local soldiers, music by the YMS band and choir, as well as an YMS student who shared a winning essay on freedom. YMS eighth grader Lauren Bruenig competed in this year's VFW Patriot's Pen youth essay contest. VFW Post 791 in Yankton chose

Bruenig as Yankton's local first place winner. The program was organized by a committee of 10 YMS faculty members including: Brooks Schild, Heidi Moser, Jamie Tramp, Ryan Hage, Stephanie Burgeson, Kim Olson, Pauline Rhoades, Gwen Wenish, Todd Dvoracek, Heather Olson and Cierra Voeltz — all of whom worked to make the ceremony possible to continue the tradition of this holiday. "It is with great pride that we as Americans take this time to honor those who have served and who are currently serving," Dvoracek said. "We are their friends, their family, their coworkers and their neighbors. It is up to us to ensure that every veteran feels that his or her service to this country is appreciated."
