

the bluffs route is the winter travel. He said the snow will drop right down at the bottom of the bluffs and if it gets cleaned off, it will be icy for the whole winter season because it will never see any sun at the bottom of the bluffs. He also inquired about the slides of sand coming down off the bluffs onto the new roadway and wants to know if anyone has considered how that issue will be handled.

Mickey May added how dangerous the road will be because the deer traffic will increase partly because of the location and partly because the hunting area will be affected.

"I am probably the most affected," Gary Nielson said. "This proposed road will go right through my feedlot and right in front of my house. I don't want a highway right outside my front door but we have no say. No one cares."

Jo Cameron's family has lived on their land for 100 years also and has been at several hearings in previous years.

"We are still saying the same thing and no one listens," Cameron said. "You look at it and draw it on paper but we live it. Someday there will only be cattails and toads at the grocery store because there will be nothing but swamps here."

She also inquired how many times does a landowner have to give up land in a lifetime.

The Santee Sioux Tribe is concerned how the roadway will impact the economy of the area. Tribal Treasurer Franklin Twipple pointed out the huge improvements made by the tribe with the casino, conven-

ience store and now a \$5 million golf course which has been touted as one of the best new golf courses in the nation.

"We oppose any destruction of the area which will affect our tribal investments," Twipple said. "We are a huge tourism area. Are you considering the effects this roadway will have on our local businesses and their economy?"

Then there is the sediment issue.

"It makes no sense to approve this permit to relocate Highway 12 if you aren't going to address the sediment issue in Lewis & Clark Lake and at Gavins Point Dam," Rick Spellman said. Moving the sediment is vital to the area he said. During an earlier comment by Charles Beda and how the access to his residence on the Niobrara River will be affected, he noted the Niobrara River goes nowhere due to the buildup of sand and sediment at the mouth of the river.

It's not a small problem Spellman said and the Corps need a comprehensive solution to the sediment problem before making a decision on relocating the roadway at an expense of almost a quarter of a billion dollars.

"As a taxpayer I want to point out all you people work for me," Joe Pinkelman said. "I would hope you are making judicious decisions about my money and spending it wisely."

"How can you not listen to all the comments here tonight and see the wall of people who all feel the same way?" Tiedtke said. "Don't you have a heart?"

Comments on the proposed project will be accepted until Nov. 23. According to the proposed timeline, design will begin in 2017 with construction of the new roadway to be finished by 2025.
