SDSU Extension Receives Home & Heart: Supporting Older Adults In Rural Communities Grant

BROOKINGS — Grantmakers In Aging Inc. (GIA) and South Dakota Community Foundation recently awarded SDSU Extension a two-year \$104,780 grant designed to connect older South Dakotans who want to learn how to navigate the Internet with tech-savvy teen guides.

"Most younger people are highly skilled in using technology. The challenge becomes, how to translate that knowledge so that someone with limited technology experience can gain understanding," explains Leacey Brown, SDSU Extension Gerontology Field Specialist.

This is where TeachSD comes in. Developed by SDSU Extension, TeachSD is an intergenerational technology program which provides one-on-one training to adults interested in learning to use technology.

Currently the program has one pilot site running in Spearfish. The goal is to launch two additional pilot sites by the end of the year in Rapid City and Murdo. By the end of 2016, four additional pilot sites will be launched.

Grant dollars will be used to establish new launch partner sites as well as identify and secure a project evaluation plan, develop program marketing, recruit and train youth technology trainers,

recruit adult learners and conduct focus groups.

"These grant dollars will allow us to refine the program as well as expand the existing program to reach more adult learners and youth technology trainers," says Kathryn Reeves, SDSU Extension 4-H Science Field Specialist who, along with Brown, trains youth technology trainers.

According to AARP, nearly one third of South Dakotans 50 and older do not use the Internet, making the TeachSD program an invaluable service, Brown explains. "SDSU Extension believes in the value of keeping adults in the home and community as they age and technology is one of the many tools which helps adults retain their independence," Brown says.

Technology can be used to connect with loved ones and a wide array of resources, including, medical providers. "Organizations like SDSU Extension have been providing information and resources online for years – through TeachSD, we hope more South Dakotans can access these valuable resources – and hopefully it results in them being able to remain in their own homes longer," Brown says.

This two-year degree program will be open only to Watertown teachers and will be delivered during the summer of 2016 and 2017 at the MMC Watertown location.

"The partnership MMC has developed with the Watertown School District has made this convenient and practical program possible for Watertown teachers," said Mount Marty College Master of Education program director, Debbi McCuin, PhD. "We are so excited to bring this great degree program to Watertown."

Mount Marty College's Master of Education degree with a concentration in Curriculum and Instruction has been specifically and uniquely designed with the in-service teacher in mind, giving them the opportunity to complete a degree using their own classrooms. Based on enduring trends and current research, this program focuses on quality and effective teaching, arguably the most important variable affecting student achievement. Students in the program will attend just one

full day of classes per week during the summers, with the remaining components being done online.

"We believe that the Master's program from Mount Marty will share effective research in teaching and learning, and our teachers will apply that research in their classrooms and share this research with other teachers in our district," stated Dr. Lesli Jutting, Superintendent of Watertown Schools. "We expect this will lead to stronger student achievement and reflective teachers."

Why Can VW Suddenly Play Music Without A Key?
