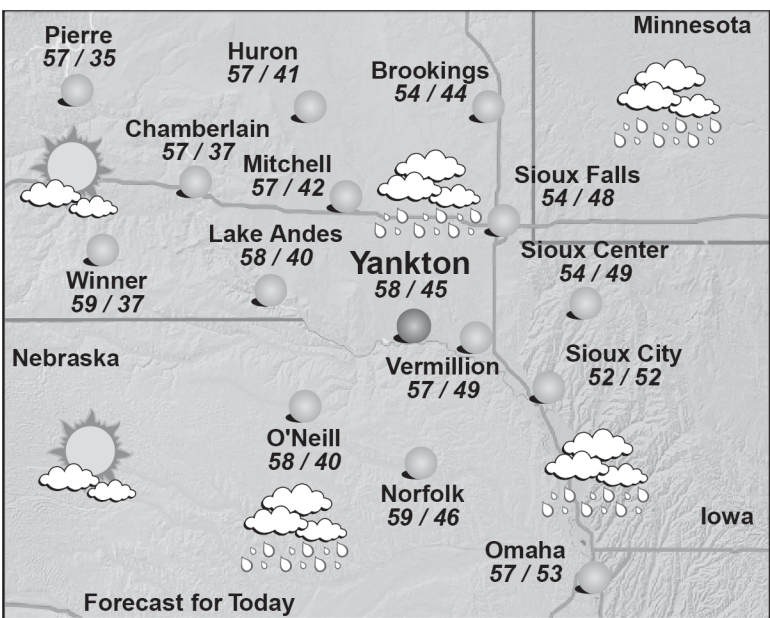

It is asked that patients not enter the building until 5:15 p.m. to allow staff time to completely set up and prepare for clinic. If you are planning on being seen at the clinic, be there by 7 p.m. to allow adequate time to be seen by providers.

Services NOT provided by SHC at this time include dental, diagnosis or treatment of sexually transmitted diseases, HIV testing, prenatal care, treatment for Emergency Medical Conditions, radiology, immunizations and chiropractic care. The staff does not prescribe any narcotics.

Future clinics are planned for the first and third Monday of each month. The date of the next clinic is Dec. 7.

the market," Rutledge said. "A lot of that volume wasn't whole turkey meat. It was product that would've gone into ready-to-eat product."

Business is beginning to improve for Dakota Provisions, with its previously-infected farms being repopulated.

"It will take a while to get back to full speed," said Rutledge. "With our farms repopulated, we should be getting our routine volume of level back in our plant."

WHAT ABOUT COST?

Joan Hegerfeld-Baker, South Dakota State University (SDSU) Extension Food Safety specialist and assistant professor in the Dairy Science Department, has paid careful attention to how turkey prices are differing from last year.

"I always break it down to cost per serving," she explained. "Whenever I tell people to look at the cost of their food, whether it's meat or fruit, what will it cost them per serving? Sometimes people look at the overall price and either think it's very expensive or very

affordable. They should look at what they pay for one can of pop versus one serving of turkey. People should put things in perspective."

According to Hegerfeld-Baker, whole turkey prices are normally about \$1.18 a pound at this time last year and now will be between \$1.32 to \$1.39 per pound for toms and \$1.30 to \$1.38 per pound for hens.

"When people want to purchase a turkey, they should figure one pound per person with the bone and all the rest," she said.

The most recent USDA Turkey Market New Report gave an update on how the market is currently faring:

The market on frozen hens and 16 to 24 pound toms is steady to weak. Demand is light to fair.

The market on white meat and white trims is steady to firm, mostly steady. Demand is fair to good.

know what was going on, the *Plain Talk* reported. In response, the university issued an alert to all students upon learning about the alleged incidents.

At the time, USD spokeswoman Tena Haraldson said she still believes USD students are incredibly safe on the Vermillion campus, the *Plain Talk* reported.

Haraldson added she believed the two alleged victims' decisions to come forward and report the alleged incidents were very important.

"If these women hadn't come forward and this hadn't been reported, we wouldn't

have been able to alert the rest of campus and would not be able to teach people to be safer," Haraldson said at the time.

"We can use this to show people that they can call campus police. If they are afraid to do that, we have community assistants in every residence hall."

USD also offers other resources, Haraldson told the *Plain Talk* at the time.

"We have a counseling center on campus where people can go," she said. "They can always call the dean of student's office, and she will personally offer assistance to the students who have fears or concerns."
