O'Gorman got on the scoreboard first with a 27-yard field goal by Kristian Jakowicz. Dodi Makwinja scored a one-yard rushing touchdown to give a O'Gorman a 10-0 lead. Ty Smith scored the first touchdown foe Washington in the first half as he caught an 8-yard pass that cut the lead to 10-7. O'Gorman responded with 52 second left in the first half as Jack Peery scored with 50 seconds left in the first half.

In the first half, O'Gorman racked up over 139 rushing yards as a team and Jack Peery had 50 yards rushing on one attempt for a touchdown.

For Washington, Jack Schelhaas had 134 yards passing and one touchdown. Logan Uttecht had 6 yards on three catches.

In the second half, Chayden Fitzsimmons scored on a five yard rushing touchdown with 11:17 left in the third quarter. O'Gorman responded late in the third quarter with a three yard rushing touchdown from Luke Fritsch.

Washington found the endzone yet again with a 1:00 left to play in the third quarter with a 23-yard pass from Schelhaas to Logan Uttecht.

In the fourth quarter Schelhaas threw a touchdown pass to Ty Smith to give Washington the lead, which turned out to be the winning touchdown.

Jack Schelhaas, who was the MVP, of the game, was at a lost for words after just winning a state championship. "I honestly can't put it into words," Schelhaas said. "It means everything because this is what you dream about when you are a little kid playing in the backyard," he said. "It would have been a lot easier if we could have won by 30 points or so, but that's not fun. Being able to battle our way back that entire game that is a lot of fun."

In the win for Washington, Jack Schelhaas threw for 316

yards and three touchdowns passes. Logan Uttecht had 151 yards receiving and one touchdown. Isaiah Feterl had six tackles.

Washington's Matt Farniok, who was the recipient for outstanding linemen, said that Saturday nights win felt great. "It just feels awesome because for four years we've been working hard and we've always been pushing ourselves," Farniok said. "We've been staying late and we've been doing all the extra stuff, it just feels awesome."

For O'Gorman, Dodi Makwinja had 72 yards rushing and one touchdown. Billy Daniel had eight tackles.

Despite the loss, head coach Steve Kueter said that his team just came up a little bit short. "I think both teams were evenly matched and they just made a few more plays than we did and that was the difference," Kueter said. "We have a really good group and our juniors and sophomores are as good as we've ever had, so I would expect to be back down here next year," he said.

Both teams met during the regular season and Washington won 39-23.

To get to the dome, Washington defeated Watertown

Nebraska Moves With Victory Of Bowl Bid

PISCATAWAY, N.J. (AP) — After being written off by many two weeks ago after losing to Purdue, Nebraska is suddenly a win away from a bowl bid.

Tight end Cethan Carter rambled 32 yards for a touchdown on his first career carry and caught one of three touchdowns passes by Tommy Armstrong as the Cornhuskers kept its bowl hopes alive with a 31-14 victory over Rutgers on Saturday.

All Nebraska (5-6, 3-4 Big Ten) has to do after a bye week is knock off No. 8 Iowa at home on Nov. 27.

"It feels good and I know the players feel good about that," Cornhuskers coach Mike Riley said. "This certainly sets up that game with Iowa and it's a big game for a lot of reasons, but for us, it's really obvious. It's a bowl opportunity, playing another top-ranked team. There is lots of stuff out there for us."

Nebraska, which lost its first five games by a total of 11 points, has rebounded from the loss to Purdue with wins over previously unbeaten Michigan State and now Rutgers.

"It's just another opportunity for us to go show what the 2015 Huskers are all about," safety Nate Gerry said. "People

were counting us out but we are going to show how much character this team has."

Nebraska led from start to finish against Rutgers (3-7, 1-6), getting contributions from all three phases.

Jordan Westerkamp and Alonzo Moore also caught touchdown passes and Drew Brown kicked a 44-yard field goal.

"He felt based on the game plan with more quarterback run type plays that we would start him," Stiegelmeier said. "He made a great move to go with Zach Lujan later on. "And he played pretty close to perfect, in a tough situation."

Lujan, a junior, promptly led the Jacks to a pair of scoring drives, and finished the game 6-of-8 passing for 128 yards. Was it a statement kind of performance? It certainly could be, his coach said.

"Zach Lujan doesn't want to sit on the sidelines. He's a winner in every sense," Stiegelmeier said. "He doesn't like sitting there. I guarantee you he'll have a great week of practice."

Saeger Played Hurt

In passing for a season-high 46 times, USD junior quarterback Ryan Saeger, as it turns out, was doing a lot of whipping the ball around with a bad ankle.

Saeger, who tied a season-high with 26 completions for 266 yards, injured his ankle on a trick play — where he was a receiver on a deep route — late in the first half. That undoubtedly limited what Saeger could do down the stretch.

"Ryan wanted to finish, and with the way he's been playing, we wanted him to finish," head coach Joe Glenn said. "He's got the experience. It's hard to put a freshman in it that situation."

By that point in the game, Saeger had already completed a 40-yard touchdown pass to Brandt Van Roekel, but his earlier injury certainly played a role in his throwing an interception that was returned for a touchdown by SDSU's Nick Farina midway through the fourth quarter.

"There was even some talk of subbing for him, but

he wanted to finish," Glenn said. "He just couldn't put any push on his ankle."

USD's backup quarterback is redshirt freshman Brian Woodward, who had attempted two passes all season prior to Saturday. Saeger did manage to get off a hail mary pass to the goal line with two seconds left on USD's final drive, but the pass was knocked down and the Jackrabbits took a knee to seal the win.

"He made a gallant effort, but really couldn't be the guy he is with the way it was," Glenn said.

but dashed by Saturday's loss to the Jackrabbits, USD is left to fight for its one remaining goal for the final game at Illinois State: Secure a winning record.

The Coyotes (5-5, 3-4), who aren't likely to get an at-large selection with a possible 6-5 record, built a 10-point second half lead and then came within one play — that last hail mary — of fifth-ranked South Dakota State.

Coupled with that earlier upset of North Dakota State, it marked significant improvement for a Coyote program that hadn't been within 15 points of either team since joining the Missouri Valley Football Conference.

"We're trying to get over the hump at that level," USD head coach Joe Glenn said. "If

that's a top-five team, then we should be up there some-where.

"We were better than we were a month ago, I know that."

So too did opposing teams. Stiegelmeier was asked after Saturday's game about USD's improvement this season, from a winless conference team a year ago into one that had playoff hopes coming into Saturday.

"There are certain steps you take as a program," Stiegelmeier said. "They've got a chance to have a winning season, but they had a chance to smell the playoffs, which hopefully his fans, his supporters believe they can do that."

"I know he did."

The key for the Coyotes now is to keep that momentum rolling into 2016, Stiegelmeier added.

"What he's (Glenn) got to do, in my opinion, he's got to go back and say, 'Men, we've developed a pretty good football team here and we're going to carry that into next year,'" Stiegelmeier said. "And they will."
