LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - Gov. Pete Ricketts says he does not want Syrian refugees resettling in Nebraska until the federal government conducts a full review of its screening procedures to ensure

public safety. Ricketts sent a letter Monday to refugee resettlement agencies in the state, urging them not to pursue resettlement of the refugees in light of the terrorist attacks in

Paris. Several U.S. governors have made similar statements amid heightened concerns that terrorists might use the refugees as cover to sneak across

borders. Ricketts says in the letter that while he understands the danger and persecution many are facing in the Middle East, it's important to focus first on the safety of Nebraska residents and Americans.

Ricketts says he's been told no Syrian refugees have been resettled in Nebraska.

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SD Universities Mull Booze Sales At Campus Events

RAPID CITY - Like an inexperienced college student unsure about taking that first offered beer at a party, the state's university system is facing a difficult decision about alcohol.

Should it be sold on campuses? The proposal is coming before the state Board of Regents in December, and it has been a topic discussed by the university system's council of presidents and superintendents, then handed to a task force comprising representatives of the six state universities.

The South Dakota Legislature would have to pass a law allowing such sales.

A central concern: Although selling alcohol on university campuses has the potential to increase revenues for campus activities and scholarships, would the availability of alcohol exacerbate the societal problem of binge drinking among the young?

But the head of the task force studying the proposal told the *Rapid City* Journal recently that the discussion thus far has been about the serving of alcohol in limited, controlled situations.

"I don't think anyone should assume there should be pubs on campus," said Janelle Toman, the Board of Regents director of communications and chairwoman of the task force. "That's not where task force was going at all. No one (at the task force meeting) spoke about it being generally available on campus, nor do I think that's the direction we would go." Rather, Toman said, the focus has

been more about alcohol sales at events and specific locations such as event centers and stadiums.

The task force, which met last week, is in the fact-finding phase of its work,

Members are curious about how campus alcohol sales are handled in other states, what those states' laws say, and what the potential law changes and potential policy changes are, she said.

State law has banned alcohol sales on campuses since at least 1939. The law says no on-sale or off-sale license may be granted to operate on the campus of any state educational institution.

The law defines "campus" as the area immediately surrounding the buildings used for classrooms, administrative offices, athletic facilities and

Representatives of each of the six South Dakota regents schools have been asked to compile information in such areas as the amount of revenues that could result from such sales, what licensing would entail, and where the alcohol would be offered.

Heather Wilson, president of the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, said she has concerns about the

While I would be naive if I said (drinking) didn't exist, it's a caution for me," Wilson said. "As a president, we try to encourage students to make responsible and healthy decisions. We don't want to send mixed messages about that.

At the same time, consumption by adults is legal, and our students are at the point where they're becoming adults. Knowing how to drink responsibly is part of that. It's not an easy situation."

The idea of promoting alcohol sales and profiting from those sales is the heart of the concern at South Dakota State University, said Doug Wermedal, the SDSU representative on the task

With more than 30 years in higher education and experience at five other campuses, he said that concern has persisted for many decades.

"The concern is binge drinking, which is high-risk drinking," Wermedal said. "One way you monitor that is to have trained and experienced persons doing the serving of alcohol."

Trained servers not only would ensure that people are old enough to legally consume alcohol, but also would have the experience to determine if drinkers are at the point that they need to be cut off, Wermedal added.

The vision at SDSU, one that is in favor of the change, is that the sales would be at a wide range of events, including concerts, plays, lectures, art exhibitions and many times in the performing arts

There's also more to the desire to have alcohol sales than just revenue, Wermedal added, because the social atmosphere is also a big plus.

"The theater, for example, allows during intermission sales of coffee and tea and snacks, and that seems to add to the enjoyment of the event," he said, adding that alcohol sales could do the same.

Although alcohol sales are not now allowed on campuses, schools do have tailgating policies that allow students to drink before football games.

Lincoln Puts Pressure On Owners Of Problem Properties

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Lincoln's neglected building registry is putting financial pressure on homeowners to fix or demolish the city's most problematic properties.

Under the new rules, owners of neglected property have 30 days to register and pay \$500. After 90 days, the owner must register again and pay \$500 for another three months. If owners do not voluntarily register, the city will file paperwork for them, charging the \$500 fee

and a \$500 penalty. The Lincoln Journal Star reports the city placed 28 properties on the registry in the past year. Eighteen

of those properties were declared neglected after city inspectors fielded complaints, and 10 properties were declared neglected after they had been condemned as unlivable for two years or more.

Jon Carlson, a mayoral aide in charge of the city's Stronger Safer Neighborhoods initiative, says "It's not a gigantic number in the community, but if you happen to live next door, or you're a Realtor trying to list a house across the street, it's a big deal. It impacts quality

Assistant City Attorney Chris Connolly wrote the registry ordinance after re-

viewing how six other cities handle neglected properties. Connolly says that he would not call the ordinance an unqualified success, but he is encouraged by the progress made thus far.

'We're making these people commit to something. Up to this point, they haven't committed to anything, Connolly said.

The City Council is expected to place liens against eight properties that have been on the registry the longest, and have amassed fines and fees ranging from \$1,000 to \$3,000. The liens will give the city the ability to prompt a sheriff's sale so a new owner can give the

property more attention. The city may be able to recover its money or waive the liens for the new owner.

The registry has a twovear limit so that an owner can end up with \$8,000 on fees and fines, but cannot continue to try and buy time from the city. After two years, the city can possibly seek criminal charges against a property owner or a court order to have the property razed or repaired.

We're using appropriate tools, but when people don't respond, we can increase our tools and increase our activity," Carlson said.

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Officials ID Man Who Died In House Fire

RAPID CITY (AP) — The victim of a weekend house fire in Rapid City has been identified.

The Rapid City Fire Department says the victim was 34-year-old Reggie WhiteBull, a quadriplegic who lived in the back bedroom of the mobile home that caught on fire. Officials have said WhiteBull died from smoke inhalation and burns. Six people made it out of the home and

were treated and released from a local hospital. The department received a report of the blaze around 5 a.m. Saturday. The cause of the fire remains under

investigation. Joshua Vanderploeg, who lives on the trailer park where the fire occurred, tells the Rapid City Journal that he and two other people tried to break the home's windows to reach WhiteBull, but couldn't go inside because of the smoke and flames.

Former Creighton President Dies At 72

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The Rev. John Schlegel, who led Creighton University in Omaha for more than a decade, has died at the age of 72.

University authorities say Schlegel died Sunday at a hospice in Omaha. A university news release said he died

He became the university's 23rd president in 2000 and left the post in 2011. Creighton board member Melissa Kean says that, "as a

person, Father Schlegel was complicated, deeply curious, completely engaging and driven to make the world better. Schlegel was born in Dubuque, Iowa. He earned a theology degree from the University of London and a doctorate from Oxford University in international relations.

Police spokesman Sam Clemens says the girl reported the man threatened her with a gun as they traveled in the van Thursday. Clemens says she jumped from the moving vehicle after she was raped and heard a gunshot.

McAbee didn't immediately return a message left through an inmate messaging system. It's unclear if he has an attorney.
