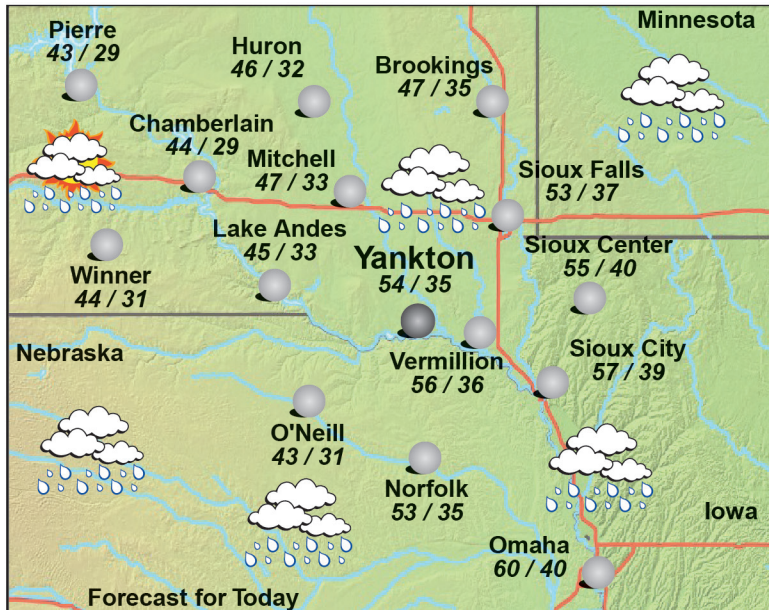

State Capitol Flies Flags At Half-Staff

PIERRE — Former state Rep. Louise Van Gerpen passed away on Nov. 13, 2015. Gov. Dennis Daugaard has ordered flags to fly half-staff at the State Capitol today (Tuesday), the date of Van Gerpen's funeral, in her honor.

She was appointed to the State House of Representatives by Gov. Bill Janklow in 1983 to replace her husband, Rep. Roland Van Gerpen, who had died.

Van Gerpen's son, Bill, is currently a state senator from District 19.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery fell 1.75 cents to \$4.94 a bushel; December corn was up 1.75 cents to 3.60 a bushel; December oats gained 3.50 cents to 2.35 a bushel; while January soybeans rose 4.25

cents to \$8.5950 bushel.

Beef and pork were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle was off 3 cents to \$127.67 a pound; January feeder cattle fell 4.45 cents to \$160.10 a pound; while December lean hogs lost 3 cents to \$5.180 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

The stock market closed higher on Monday, led by gains in energy companies as the price of oil turned higher after a recent slump. Defense contractors rose and travel and airlines companies fell as traders responded to the terrorist attacks in Paris.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 237.77 points, or 1.4 percent, to 17,483.01.

The Standard & Poor's 500 in-

dex gained 30.15 points, or 1.5 percent, to 2,053.19.

The Nasdaq composite index added 56.73 points, or 1.2 percent, to 4,984.62.

The Dow is down 340.06 points, or 1.9 percent.
